**CREW WERE SAVED.**—Mr. H. McEwen, Superintendent of the P. E. I. Railway, Charlottetown, has just received a telegram informing him his Italian liner "Coria," of which his son, Mr. W. A. McEwen was first officer, was torpedoed and sank in the Mediterranean, between Leghorn and Naples on the 10th of November. The Coria, a steamer of 3,200 tons, left Liverpool on the 9th for Gibraltar, intending to call at six other Italian ports, discharging cargo at each port. All the crew were saved and returned to Liverpool overland.

**PROPERTY IMPROVEMENTS.**—The large brick building containing two stores known as the Duncan Queen and Dorchester Streets has been purchased by Carter & Co., Limited. The interior of this building will be entirely remodelled and fitted as a whole sale Seeds and Seed Grain Warehouse. The outside of the building will also receive attention. An up-to-date elevator will be installed in the building. Messrs Carter & Co. will also remove their seed cleaning plant from their present warehouse on Water Street instead of gasoline engine power. Electric motor power will be installed. The freight elevator will also be connected and operated by electric power. When the above alterations and improvements are made Carter & Co. will have one of the best equipped Seed Warehouses in the Maritime Provinces. 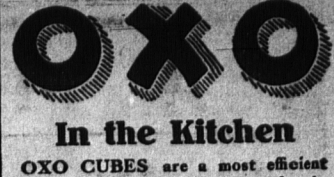
