Floods Continue To Plague Manitoba

WINNIPEG, May 7—(CP)—Manitoba continued the hardest hit of the Western Provinces tonight from flood waters.

Saskatchewan and Alberta have presented a steadily-brightening picture in the last few days with few exceptions.

Waters of the Assiniboine River continued to rise at Poplar Point, lapping over narrow dykes and adding steadily to the 10,000 acres of farm territory previously hidden by water.

In British Columbia, the Fraser River mounted six inches during the night. Sunshine swept the Fraser Valley, lending a hope that the river waters might be lapped up if normal temperatures prevail.

Margarine Prank In Ottawa Backfires; Customs In Trouble

Cruel Hoax Is Played On Peasants By Communists

One of the most cruel hoaxes being played on some of the Communist-subjugated peoples of Europe is in the much touted matter of land "reform."

The longing for a little land of their own has been one of the driving forces for years among the peasants under the old feudal agricultural systems.

The Reds have made much of it in an attempt to win over the people of every country they have invaded. It was one of the chief baits held before the people of Southern Italy in the recent elections.

It doesn't always work out too well, especially in wheat country where cultivation of small plots is not economical, but the peasants love it. They short-sightedly trade their liberties for it.

And then comes disillusionment. An example of what happens is given by emigres from Estonia.

The Estonian peasants got their land in 1946 with assurances that "no power on earth" would deprive them of it.

However, as the Estonians tell it, early this year the Bolsheviks took a new turn. They decided that individual tilling of land is inefficient, and began to set up kolkhozes, Russian-type collective farms.

When the land-loving peasants declined to respond as rapidly as desired, the Communists knew how to put on the heat.

Many, however, have tried to make shift, as evidenced by the fact that the Government still is forced to conduct an intensive propaganda campaign.

Now, in fairness it must be said that collective farming of the Russian type has some advantages. Better machinery and professional direction increase production.

But they never, or seldom, have owned land. It is a different matter, as the Estonians put it, to the man "whose independence has made him the backbone of his nation and the keeper of its traditional aspirations to freedom."

Dosco Annual Meeting Yesterday

MONTREAL, May 7—(CP)—Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, Limited, at its annual meeting here today, announced consolidated net income of \$1,735,207 for 1947 of \$1.72 a share.

The report showed ingot output for last year aggregated 589,483 tons, an increase of 139,296 tons over 1946 when a four-month strike slowed down production.

Canadian Rail Workers Wait For Strike Vote

OTTAWA, May 7—Railway workers across Canada were waiting today to vote on the question of a wage strike that would paralyze the Dominion's rail transport system.

Following a settlement before the poll ends, a majority vote for a strike is a certainty, but Government officials said they are confident a compromise will be negotiated before the 140,000 employees are taken off the job.

Willingness to compromise was indicated yesterday by the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees and other transport workers (C.R.E.) as it rejected the recommendation of a conciliation board for a seven-cent-an-hour increase.

Churchill Urges Immediate United European Assembly

THE HAGUE, May 7—(AP)—Winston Churchill today urged immediate formation of a united European assembly and asked European countries to sacrifice some measure of national sovereignty to permit eventual establishment of a federation.

Churchill addressed 800 members of a 22-member "Congress of Europe" in a city decorated with a new flag for the proposed European federation.

Nations' heads of the past must be forgotten so the continent can live in peace, Churchill said. He described the movement for European unity as one of peoples and not of political parties.

"We aim at the eventual participation of all peoples throughout the continent whose society and way of life are not in discord with the charter of human rights and sincere expression of free democracy," Churchill said.

Churchill did not elaborate on his call for the establishment of a European assembly. However, the delegates from 22 countries attending the forum have before them a resolution urging the establishment of such a body.

The three powers presented their opinions in the form of a report to the Security Council which they urged the Commission to approve. If it is approved, the Commission will be the first major U.N. organization to acknowledge failure.

The blame for the failure to write an atomic pact was laid by the three powers directly upon Russia.

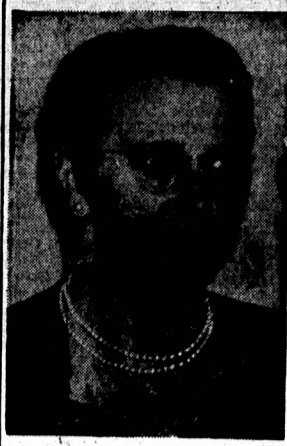

Seek Details Of Greek Executions

ATHEENS, May 7—(CP)—The British Embassy said today that it had asked the Greek Government for "details and an explanation" of the execution of 213 prisoners this week.

Eighteen more were executed at Aegina Island prison just outside Athens this morning. Nineteen were executed there yesterday, 13 in Athens, and 11 in Salonika yesterday, and 152 at several places in Greece Tuesday—all convicted on murder charges in most cases in connection with the leftist revolt against the Government in 1944.
