FISHERMEN TO BENEFIT FROM ONTARIO TRADE

Hon. W. M. Lea Impressed With Possibilities in Trade With Central Canada for Island Fish Products and Potatoes.

"I regard the Commission as a test of the feasibility of developing Maritime trade with Central Canada," said Hon. W. M. Lea, Minister of Agriculture, when interviewed by The Guardian concerning the recent visit of the Trade Commissioners Burnaby and Prof. MacPhee to this province. "Personally I am convinced that Prince Edward Island can not benefit from its establishment, so greatly and so directly as can New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. The products which we produce, so largely agricultural, are now produced in enormous quantity by Ontario farmers and I believe that not in our time will they be unable to satisfy the demand in Ontario cities. Freight rates supply for them a protection from our invasion just as effective as could any tariff."

Mr. Lea, however, had strong hopes of working up a potato business with Ontario. "If we can produce potatoes sufficiently superior to over-balance the cost of transportation then our farmers will directly benefit from the mediation of the Commission. There is also in a few cases, a possibility of exporting superior breeding cattle to Ontario." An important point which should not be overlooked in Mr. Lea's opinion is the indirect benefit which will be conferred upon the farmers by the awakening of industry in the mining and manufacturing towns of Nova Scotia. "If by reason of the efforts of the Commission, manufacturing increases in Nova Scotia a demand for our farm products will be created."

For Prince Edward Island fishermen, Mr. Lea saw great possibilities in the way of business with Central Canada. "We have the difficulty to face that Nova Scotia is a little further advanced in the marketing of fish than ourselves. Their travelers can fish in any weather and ensure a continuity of supply. We will be obliged to establish cold storage facilities and co-operate for marketing purposes, if the fishing industry is to advance."

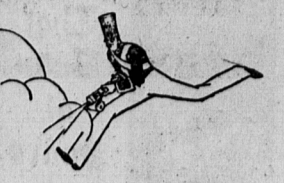

 The Hon Mackenzie King took responsibility for the representations made by the Hon. Vincent Massey and questioned the propriety of Mr. Cahan in discussing a matter which had been referred to arbitration. Mr. Jacobs, Montreal, also took the position that the matter was sub judice and should not be discussed. Mr. Cahan denied that it was sub judice, as the arbitrators had not yet been appointed and the court of arbitration had not been formed.

The House then went into committee of supply to consider the estimates of the office of Privy Council and External Affairs which were passed. Another move for hastening progression was taken this afternoon when it was decided that morning sessions should begin on Monday next. "I have been looking for something to support the prime minister on for nine years, and I have found it at last," said Hon. R. J. Manion (Conservative, Fort William), who favored morning sittings. He reminded the House that some of the members had worked to do at home, and wanted to get through with the session.

The matter of Nova Scotia's coat of arms came up in the House of Commons today before the orders of the day were called. W. A. Black, Conservative, Halifax, drew the attention of Hon. Fernand Rinfret, Secretary of State, to the fact that in the correspondence tabled some days ago, several documents appeared to be missing. He asked that the file be

completed. Mr. Black was proceeding to enlighten the House on how Nova Scotia at confederation was the only province in Canada to possess a coat of arms, having received an armorial escutcheon from King Charles I. in 1625, when the speaker informed him that the time to take up the matter was during the estimates of the secretary of state.

EXPORT OF LIQUOR

This afternoon's proceedings were unusually interesting by a speech made by Mr. Woodsworth, Labor leader, upon the House going into committee of supply. He did not move an amendment which might be regarded as a vote of want of confidence, but it was a severe arraignment of the government for not agreeing with the United States' request for the cancellation of clearances of liquor bills of lading to that country. He regarded it as a most unfriendly act towards a friendly nation and one in direct violation of the resolutions of the House in 1926 and not in accordance with the report of the committee on the customs scandal of that year and the royal commission subsequently appointed by the government itself.

Mr. Spéakman and Miss MacPhail, Progressives, followed on much the same lines. The latter said that if the people of Canada had no more sense than to drink "poison" let them go on doing it, but that was no reason why it should be sent to the United States, where the people do not want it.

The Hon. Mr. Euler replied on behalf of the government. He declared that Mr. Woodsworth's question was one of considerable interest and had become more so in recent months. It was true that there was a strong body of public opinion in Canada opposed to the export of liquor to the United States, and that was not wholly confined to prohibition centres. It was equally true, however, that there was just as strong and possibly a stronger body of public opinion opposed to the suggestion Canada should assist in carrying out the laws of another country.

The situation was one which must inevitably arise where two adjacent countries deal with the liquor problem in a different way. In seven of the nine Canadian provinces, the sale and purchase of liquor was legal; in the United States there was a drastic prohibition law, as far as liquor was concerned, it seemed to be a commodity in a class by itself so far as it affected the individual. Laws dealing with liquor were never regarded in the same light as others.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

During the year 8 regular meetings and 1 special meeting were held with an average attendance of 19. During Exhibition Week in 1923, the usual luncheon was served in the Exhibition Building, and the sum of \$908.91 realized. Owing to the Exhibition being held in August a great many of the workers were out of town, also many who usually gave donations. In addition to this, the number to be served was so much greater than in former years that we were compelled to buy large quantities of food. Taking all these things into consideration, the net proceeds of the luncheon were very satisfactory.

Last year money was voted for a Ceiling Light for the Operating Room but on the request of the Medical Staff, this was changed to a Cameron Electric Diagnosis Outfit. The doctors and Staff have voiced their appreciation of these lights, many times, and we are glad to have been able to provide this outfit for the Hospital.

During the year 5 Gatch Beds were put in the Hospital. 2 of these were donated, one by Mrs. F. P. Taylor, for her room, and 1 by the Faithful Circle of the King's Daughters for their room. The remaining 6 were purchased by the Aid. A fracture bed was also placed in the Hospital. Two new bed couches were purchased and old couches made for several of the sick couches and chairs.

In October a sitting room was furnished for the Superintendent, using the room at the foot of the stairs for this purpose.

The Ladies' Aid carried out their usual custom of providing the Christmas dinner for the nurses, and cut flowers were sent to the Lady Superintendent as in former years.

Commencing in February the churches of the City held their Annual Cake Sales for the Hospital, and from these the splendid sum of \$469.50 was realized.

In February the Ladies Aid purchased new chairs for the Nurses Dining Room. These were badly needed, and add much to the comfort of the nurses as well as to the general appearance of this room.

Flag Day was observed on Easter Saturday as usual, and the sum of \$283.00 realized from the sale of flags.

In April the Nurses Home was provided with several articles which go to improve the comfort and appearance of the Home—among them new Congoleum squares, curtains, lamp shades, door bell, etc., etc.

The Nurses Graduation exercises were held on Tuesday, May 14th, and were very largely attended. The Ladies Aid, as in former years, made all the arrangements for the Hall, program, etc., and presented each member of the Graduating Class,

Also the Superintendent and Assistant Supt., with bouquets. Ice cream was also provided for the Reception at the Nurses' Home after the Graduation Exercises.

This spring the Ladies Aid, under the Conventorship of Mrs. E. R. Brow, secured donations of upwards of 150 bottles of preserves and pickles for the Hospital. Needless to say, these were greatly appreciated.

In January of this year our Secretary, Mrs. E. T. Higgs, found it compulsory for her to resign from her office. Her resignation was received and accepted with sincere regret, as she had filled her position most capably and agreeably at all times. The undersigned was appointed for the balance of the year.

The Treasurer's Report gives you a detailed report of the expenses for the year, but the following list will give some idea of the sewing activities of the Aid.

 46 doz. Towels, comprising Doctor's Hand Towels, Face and Bath Towels, and in addition 273 yds. of Surgical cap and roller towelling.
 Also 144 Face Cloths.

There were 99 new tray cloths placed in the Hospital this year. Of this number 89 were a much appreciated donation from the Faithful Circle of the King's Daughters of Trinity United Church. A donation of 8 linen towels was also gratefully received from Mrs. R. E. Mutch of this city.

In addition to the above the Ladies Aid has provided the china flat silver, trays, cooking utensils, etc. for the Hospital.

We feel that we cannot close this report without voicing our appreciation of the splendid service that the Lady Superintendent, Miss Malr, is rendering to the Hospital. She is at all times so interested, untiring, and conscientious in her work that it is a pleasure for the Aid to work with her in providing the necessary supplies for the Hospital.

We also feel that the Trustees were very fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. McNutt as Dietitian of the Hospital, and with her assistance we have been better able to keep in touch with the needs of this department of the Hospital work.

The Ladies' Aid wish to thank all friends who have supported them in their work this past year, and trust that many more women will join our Aid and help in this work which is so necessary for the good of our Province.
