THE Halifax poorhouse has now 375 inmates and the number is rapidly increasing. It is thought that before January the record of last year—426—will be considerably exceeded. About 25 per cent of these paupers are insane.

An Ottawa despatch says: The secretary of state to-day received from the clerk of the crown in chancery the returns of the plebiscite vote, which were 543,042 out of a total on the list of 1,288,849 voters. The division was: For Prohibition, 278,463; against prohibition, 245,979; majority for prohibition, 13,884. By provinces the majorities stood as follows: Majorities for—Ontario, 39,224; Nova Scotia at 29,216; New Brunswick, 17,335; P. E. I., 831; Manitoba, 9,412; Northwest, 3,414; British Columbia, 988. Majority against—Quebec, 94,015. Total majority for prohibition, 13,884.

BRAM, it is reported, may have a new trial, on these premises: He was convicted of the murder of Blumberg, 2nd mate of Herbert Fuller; he had been indicted for the murder of the same, and it is actually averred that it would be a good technical point to take that he should not have been convicted on the modified count by which he escaped capital punishment, and was sentenced to life imprisonment. And further that unless another trial is had on a new indictment and Bram should be convicted again, there would be no reasonable certainty that the government can hold him in case the Supreme Court should ever decide in favor of Bram, on the exception as taken above; and it is feared that when the witnesses are beyond reach, Bram's counsel may raise the point of the constitutionality of his conviction. Law is law!

THE Sackville Post says: Probably never in the history of the hay trade in this part of the province has the prospect been so dull for those who have hay to sell. Westmorland, Cumberland and Albert counties are full of hay, and there is simply no demand at all; nobody wants hay. The farmers in these counties held over a large amount of last year's crop expecting better prices this year. This together with the present year's crop is still on hand and the prospect of it changing hands is not bright. Usually the hay growers in this county can dispose of the produce of their marshes at from \$7 to \$8 per ton. In recent years the price has seldom if ever fallen below \$7 per ton. But the man who asks \$7 this year would be looked upon as crazy. A leading farmer of Sackville told the Post a day or two ago that he had been offering good English hay at \$4 per ton and could not make a sale at that price. A few small shipments are being made, but it is understood the price to the farmer is only about \$4. A number of Westmorland county farmers have despair of selling their hay and have purchased all the cattle they can take care of. In this way they can convert the hay into beef, and good beef will generally sell for a fair price.
