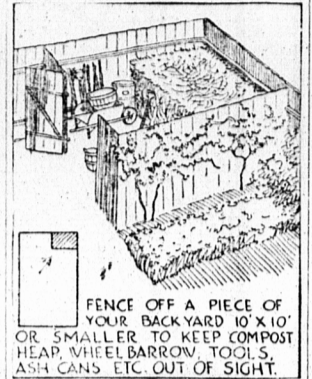
THE COMPOST HEAP IN MAKING

Composting is an ancient and valuable means of fertilizing that is seldom practiced but which we must now depend for our chief manurial supplies since the automobile has displaced the horse and supplies of stable manure are not available in cities and towns except at great expense. The chief value of barnyard manure in addition to the actual fertilizing elements it contains is in providing humus for the soil. Humus is decayed vegetable matter, the chief constituent of the light, black soil we find under forest trees, brown upon the surface with the finely powdered but not yet thoroughly decayed forest leaves. It is the chief component of the black prairie soil made by hundreds of years of vegetation rotting annually while fresh vegetation springs up to repeat the process.

We may hasten and increase this process of renovating and replenishing the soil by the compost heap in the backyard. This is merely a pile of vegetable material collected during the year and piled up to decay—autumn leaves, lawn rakes, weeds pulled from the garden, pea vines, bean vines and other vegetable refuse from the garden. None of it should be burned or thrown away.

Pile it in a flat-topped heap with a depression in the center to direct the moisture from rains or from the hose in dry spells to the center of the heap. Moisture hastens the rotting. Add to the pile all season, wetting down occasionally and the following spring the upper portion can be removed and the decayed and partially decayed matter at the bottom of the heap should be spread into the garden beds. Let the top layer become the bottom layer of the new compost heap as it is already well on its way to decay.

The compost not only adds fertilizer in itself but it improves the texture of the soil. Humus is a vegetable sponge which holds moisture in suspension and is the

FOUR RULES FOR THE NOVICE

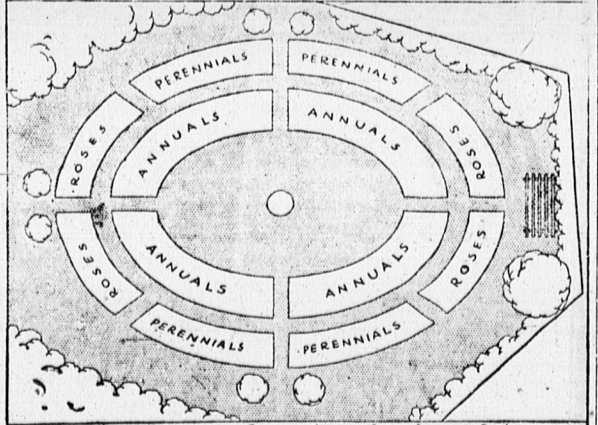
For beginners in vegetable gardening four rules may be laid down which, if strictly observed, will place them at once in the front rank of amateur.

One difference between novices and experts in any enterprise is in the finish of their performances. The beginner is usually sloppy; the expert is exact and orderly. Whether it is in swinging a golf club or making a cake perfection is to be obtained by attention to details.

BACK YARD DESIGN—OVALS

Irregular-shaped lots caused by diagonal or curving streets often offer a troublesome problem to the home garden planner. Nothing approaches a circular oval—along the usual lines seems to fit the situation. The oval garden is the best means of pulling one of these odd-sided lots into a semblance of regularity.

An elliptical outline is drawn to as great a width as the lot permits with the ellipse running the long way of the ground area and making allowance for space about it to be planted with shrubbery. Concentric ellipses are drawn with cross paths and the garden is laid out. The corners may be filled with shrubbery and the central oval space will pull the lot into an ap-

pearance of regularity which is glaringly apparent with the usual circular or rectangular designs. The laying out of an ellipse is as simple as that of a circle. Instead of the one central stake about which the series of circles are drawn there are two "centers," or more properly speaking, foci. A cord is looped about the two focal stakes placed a short distance apart the long way of the lot and stretched taut and the ellipse is easily drawn. The distance between the focal stakes or centers

The man with the HOE says—

If you had had luck with the perennials lupins, plant the annual varieties, save a season, and they are as fine for cutting and offer as fine colors. They are easier to grow but don't give them rich fare. Poor soil is best for them.

3. Cultivate regularly throughout the season; no matter what the temperature may be. Do not allow weeds to raise their heads in safety. 4. Apply fertilizer and spray to kill insects and prevent disease. Both are needed not merely as insurance against possible loss, but to prevent otherwise certain loss.

Seeds sown in drills are those which produce vegetables that are grown in regular rows, evenly spaced in the rows. A drill is a tiny groove drawn in the soil. In contrast to the drill is the hill, which is not a mound of earth, but merely a spot in which several seeds are sown to produce a plan or group of plants separated by some distance from the next plant or group in the same row. Radishes are sown in drills, cucumbers in hills.

It is necessary to sow some seeds that one expects to mature because conditions may reduce the germination percentage. In vegetable gardening one never expects to raise 100 per cent of his seedlings; always there is an excess which must be discarded, even though the process of pulling them up and throwing them away may rent the heart of the beginner. In spacing the rows in the home garden eighteen inches is sufficient for the small crops grown in drills. It is even enough for Golden Bantam sweet corn. More space must be given for the vines, for tall perennials and beans and for larger varieties of sweet corn. Tomatoes should have two or three feet each way between vines. Where room is sufficient and convenience requires wider spacing between rows it may be given. The proper width where a horse-drawn cultivator is to be used is three feet.

WILTING IS DESIRABLE BEFORE ENSILING LEGUMES.

(Experimental Farms Note.)

Silage from legume crops or mixtures of legumes and cereals appears to be of a much more desirable quality if these crops are wilted for several hours before ensiling. The wilting of alfalfa, in particular, seems to be essential. If good silage is to be made, alfalfa, sweet clover and a mixture of oats, peas and vetches were sown at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, in small wooden silos during the summer of 1924. Each silo was 6 feet high, 3 feet in diameter and held approximately half a ton. The various trials with these crops, which occupied 21 silos, included cutting at different stages of maturity, ensiling before and after wilting and storing for periods of six and nine months. The silos were opened during the winter of 1924-25 and the silage was in every respect comparable to that which is produced in large farm-silos.

The results of one year's work, though not conclusive, indicate that the stage of maturity and the amount of moisture in these crops at the time of ensiling have an important bearing on the silage produced, the reduction of the original moisture content of the crops by wilting showing the greatest benefit.

There seems to be a greater likelihood of securing a desirable silage from full bloom alfalfa than this crop cut at an earlier stage of maturity. There is an advantage in cutting sweet clover when the flower buds are well formed but before the crop blooms because there is a greater probability of securing a second cutting if the crop is mowed at this stage than if left to until the full bloom stage. Silage of good quality was secured from oats, peas and vetches ensiled when the oats were in the milk and in the dough stages, but the later stage or just when the oats show the first signs of turning appears to be the most desirable time to cut this crop.

From alfalfa which had been mowed when one-tenth in bloom and wilted in the sun for at least five hours or for a relatively long period if the sun was not shining, a fairly good silage was secured, while full bloom alfalfa wilted in a similar manner gave a silage of better quality and of considerably greater palatability. Alfalfa ensiled immediately after cutting no matter what was the stage of maturity, gave an undesirable and unpalatable silage. The wilting of sweet clover, and oats, peas and vetches for several hours resulted, in the production of a type of silage which was somewhat more palatable than that produced by the unwilted material. The length of the period of storage appeared to have little effect upon the silage which was produced.

CLEANING FACTORY EQUIPMENTS TO PREVENT MOULD IN BUTTER

Improperly cleaned factory equipments is the most frequent cause of mould in butter, after the cream has been pasteurized. Vats should be rinsed with warm water and steamed for at least five minutes. They should be washed daily with a hot solution of alkali washing powder, using a scrubbing brush. Pumps and pipes should be taken apart and cleaned every day and afterwards steamed. The churn should be first rinsed, then washed with a boiling solution of alkali washing powder, revolving

It for five to ten minutes. Then rinse the churn again with boiling water, drain thoroughly and turn the doors up and open. Before using rinse again with hot water, then with cold. Churns should be timed at least once a week with a strained solution.

CLEANING FURS. NEEDS MORE SALT. WASH HOSE FIRST.

To clean the fur on coats or neckpieces lay the collar on a newspaper and sprinkle full of coarse cornmeal. Let it lie for several hours, then shake out the meal.

If a vegetable is to be served in a sauce, the water in which it is boiled must be salted as the sauce will not be salty enough to season the vegetable.
