THE prize list for the Prince Edward Is-
land Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition
to be held in the buildings and grounds of
the Charlottetown Drying Park and Pro-
vincial Exhibition Association on Tuesday
Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, Sep-
tember 25, 26, 27 and 28th, has been laid
on our table by Mr. C. R. Small-
wood the Secretary reasurer. Now
that the farmers of the province have
an opportunity to compete with the pro-
ducers of the Maritime Provinces, it is
to be hoped that the farmers will co-
operate with the management in the
effort to bring the stock and cereals of
this province up to a high standard. The
prize list can be obtained by sending a
card to Mr. C. R. Smallwood the Secretary
Treasurer who is doing his utmost to
further the Exhibition and to make it the
greatest meeting ever held in the Province
of Prince Edward Island. His office is in
the Cameron Block. The printing of the
list was done at the office of Mr. J. D.
Taylor and is a credit to Mr. Taylor's abili-
ty to rush a job. It will be remembered by
all interested in Exhibitions that three
years have gone by without the farmers
in this province deriving the benefit of
meeting and comparing the products of
the farm and stockyard. The Exhibition
held three years ago was the last of a series
of eight held on the Association grounds.
While the Provincial Exhibition had done
much good, in creating a spirit of emula-
tion in the people, and had proved itself
to be a valuable educational institution,
yet it was felt that it had pretty well
reached the limit of its usefulness in that
respect, and that for the purpose of afford-
ing facilities to our farmers and others to
gain further knowledge and to improve
their methods, it was desirable to extend
the field of competition. Already the
neighboring Provinces, Nova Scotia and
New Brunswick, had established Inter-
provincial Exhibitions at which the people
of this Island, particularly stock-raisers,
were very successful competitors. The
advantages to be derived from competi-
tion in the larger field appear manifest.
If Exhibitions are considered in what is
their true light and their real purpose,
viz., as educational institutions, the
wider and more varied the competition
the better results will be achieved. With
a view of extending the field as well as
to fall into line with our sister Provinces,
it has this year been decided to throw the
Exhibition open to Nova Scotia and New
Brunswick. We have no doubt but that
our local men as hitherto, will be quite
capable of holding their own, and if
their rivals from across the Straits wrest
the prizes from the Island exhibitors, the
latter will benefit, more than the value of
the prizes, by the practical lesson im-
parted.
