BUTTER AT LOCAL POINTS.

Butter ranged in price from 28c to 38c a pound on the farmers' markets on Saturday last, as follows: Bellefleur, 30c to 32c; Berlin, 30c; Brantford, 32c; Chatham, 35c to 38c; Harriston, 28c to 29c; Hamilton, 35c to 37c; London, 30c to 36c; Owen Sound, 32c to 35c; Peterboro, 30c to 32c; Port Hope, 30c to 33c; St. Thomas, 33c, to 35c; Stratford, 33c to 32c per pound. The extreme range of prices were 2c below last week.

BUTTER AT MONTREAL.

Higher grades of butter at Montreal are firm at last week's prices, but the lower grades are still 1c higher than a week ago, as follows: Finest—new milk creamery, 35c to 36c; finest held creamery, 33½c to 34c; fine creamery, 33½c to 34c; seconds, 32½c to 33c. Butter receipts at Montreal last week were 2,899 packages, as compared with 1,817 of the previous week and 3,674 packages for the same week last year. Since May 1, 1914, to date a decrease of 72,317 packages is reported, as compared with the corresponding period last year.

BUTTER AT NEW YORK.

While all the changes noted in butter at New York this week are advances on last week's prices, still the market is in an unstable condition and may see at least slight reductions.

DAIRY MARKETS.

TORONTO, April 4.—Butter has continued holding its own at Toronto this week, and the only change in last week's price is the addition of a spread of from 32c to 33c. per pound for creamery prints. The make is increasing, but the shortage was so great that it is all being taken up by the trade. No grass stuff has been coming, though a few good rains would bring it.

Guns quote butter this week as follows: Creamery prints, fresh make, 32c to 33c per pound; solids, 32c; farmers' separator prints, 30c; separator solids, 29c; fresh dairy rolls, 27c to 28c; and cooking butter, 18c to 20c per pound.

Butter receipts at Toronto last week were 7,553 packages, as compared with 7,525 for the previous week.

MEXICANS FIRE ON U. S. AVIATOR

BROWNVILLE, Texas, April 23.—A United States army biplane flying over Fort Brown, near here, was fired upon by Carranza soldiers in Matamoros. About twenty rifle shots and fifty shots from a machine gun on the Mexican side, it is believed in army circles here, were fired at the air craft. The machine landed safely.

LATEST FROM THEATRES

NEW YORK HIPPODROME

New spectacular effects, requiring extended employment of the famous tank and indescend fountains and a condensed version of the ever-popular light opera, "Chimes of Normandy" ushered in the current week at the New York Hippodrome. The cast includes Katherine Irving, Bernice Mershon, Vernon Dalhart, Harry Luckstone and William F. Myers, supported by the large Hippodrome chorus.

"Glimpses of Art"—the living picture revivals introduced at the Hippodrome—have proven such a popular feature that they are being retained. New subjects have been added to the program.

Changes and additions have been made in the symphony orchestra which contributes a complete concert programme to the bill.

The moving picture programme includes a Charles Chaplin comedy, the usual topical weekly scene features, "Picturesque Greece," in natural colors and a film production of W. A. Brady's successful play "Woman and Wine" with William Elliott in the stellar role.

This standard old play with its strong sentimental appeal, its tense situations, heart interest and true old time melodramatic "punch" has all the elements that go to make up an ideal moving picture.

Arthur Shirley, the author of the play took his inspiration from a French source and scenes are laid alternately in New York and P.P.A.R., the underworlds of which great cities are both drawn on for material.

"Dick" Seymour, the son of an artist, has a pretty sweetheart, and he comes into some money; a combination of circumstances that should make for happiness. In stead of which the "Great White Way" and an unscrupulous girl claim him. Thence to Paris (for his money and more "Woman and Wine" with the immediate result that he finds himself charged with a murder that he did not commit.

His blind father and his sweetheart are loyal to him, however, and being freed of the charge of murder he forsakes his evil ways, and all end happily.

COMPULSED WIFE TO SEE HER HUSBAND SHOT
LONDON, April 23.—A Belgian just arrived in London from Ghent said: "The saddest incident of recent weeks was the shooting by Germans last Wednesday of M. Lenoir, a Belgian railway official, divisional chief at the railway ministry. The Germans accused him of espionage. After a summary trial, he was sentenced to death by execution."

A parade was called for the municipal rifle range of Ghent and about 200 persons were forced to be present, including the condemned man's wife. Lenoir was aware that his wife was among the crowd gathered behind the soldiers, but faced the firing party without flinching, and died with a smile on his lips. An appeal to the Duke of Wurttemberg who is in command of the Fourth Army in Flanders, had been previously rejected.

PEACE NOW WOULD BE SIN
LONDON April 23.—"I agree it would be a sin to pray for peace until the barbarous world-enslaving pretensions of Germany are killed," declared Earl Grey at the Royal Colonial Institute meeting here. "No peace will be acceptable to us which is not also acceptable to the Overseas Dominions, which rallied so gallantly to the flag. If we are true to ourselves we shall, at the conclusion of the war be more powerful than ever. Let us see that we give the wide world reason for its confidence," he said.
