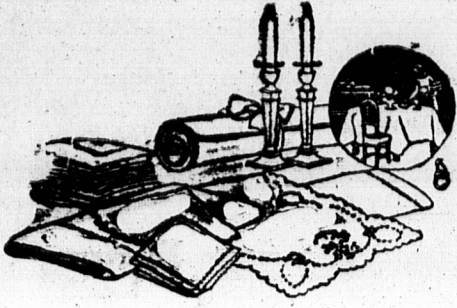

—Mr. Eugene McKernan of Charlottetown, was a visitor Monday to Summerside.

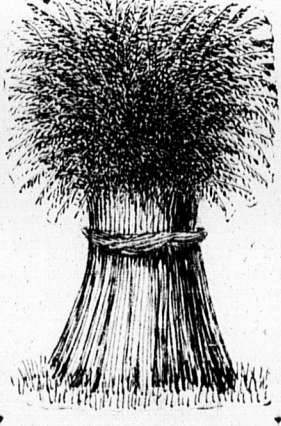
—It is understood that Mr. Albert Finnan of Howlan has been appointed as supervisor for Loc. 5.—V.

Notes By The Way

Even now Premier King sits on a precarious throne and borrows leave to be. The scalping knives of the Progressives are always in hand awaiting their victim, even if for the moment held behind their backs. The game is not played out yet by a long sight. Nothing has been decided by this first vote beyond a little sparring for position. The weakness of the King government's position is exposed already by half a dozen of his newspaper organs which are arguing that a government is not bound to resign if one or more of their measures are defeated! They thus show their fears for the future; also their willingness to trample on British parliamentary precedents when the emergency shall come.

As for the Bell government's road policy, it is already condemned so far as it has gone. The condition of the "improved" roads in the fall and in the spring when farmers' wagons sunk to the hub and motor cars were stuck in the muck and mire by the half dozen on one single road, are their condemnation in the eyes of the people. What were before good roads have been irretrievably damaged by these so-called improvements (for which the country is being plunged into debt by a spendthrift government. The people have called a halt in this business by honest representatives, but the warning is not heeded.

No amount of pretty speeches in the House, no diarrhea of laudation spattered upon the government, no smiling tributes of self-praise and mutual admiration of each other by the promoters of this audacious scheme can hide from the country the plain facts of the case. Mud and dust scraped from the roadsides and ditches and piled on the carriage tracks, do not make permanent roads. Yet this is what has been done, is being done and will be done in the future if the scheme is carried on.

As for its financial character, the scheme is contrived to deceive the people, a fitting corollary of the Great Betrayal of 1919. By a process of financial thimble-rigging they are mortgaging the provincial revenues for thirty years to come and telling the people that it will not cost them a cent. The

motor license fees are as much a part of the provincial revenues as the Dominion subsidy or the income tax. They treat it as if it were a new gold mine just now discovered. The pretext that the scheme will cost the people nothing is as false as the promises made by the Bell aggregation three years ago and as mushy as the mud roads they are building.

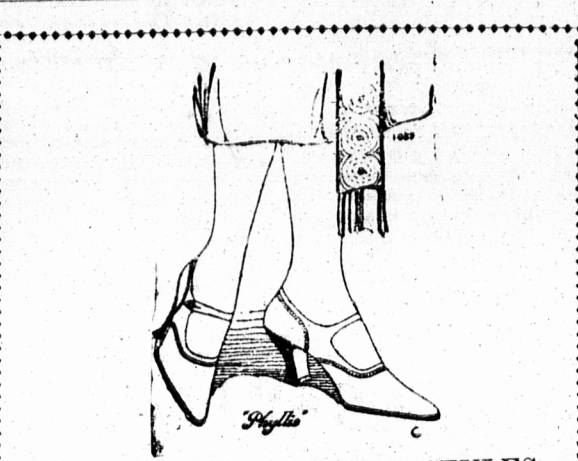
