A Message For Labor Day

(By A. R. Mosher, President, Canadian Congress of Labour.)
Labour Day this year will be celebrated, as usual, with parades and picnics, and perhaps not the least of the contributions which the organized Labour movement has made to the people of Canada and the United States is a holiday which has become one of the most popular and widely-observed on this continent. There is, however, another aspect of Labour Day which is often overlooked and which deserves serious consideration on an occasion when the institution known as organized Labour is commemorated.

The basic function of the Labour movement is to protect and promote the interests of the organized workers. This is accomplished primarily by obtaining through collective bargaining agreements governing wages and working conditions. The worker's wages determine the standard of living of himself and his family, and his working conditions determine his health, and, to a considerable degree, his attitude towards his work and the satisfaction which he obtains from it. These are extremely important matters, and they will always be given great attention by the Labour movement.

Wider Fields of Interest
As the Labour movement has developed, however, in Great Britain and in Canada at least, it has become increasingly apparent that the welfare of the workers and their dependents was bound up closely with the welfare of all the people, and that this could not be improved merely by negotiations with employers. The interests of Labour have therefore become more extensive, particularly in recent years, and without losing sight of the immediate needs of the workers, Labour speaking generally, is now deeply concerned with economic and political conditions and with national and international affairs, to an extent which could scarcely have been foreseen by the founders of the early trade unions.

The people of Canada have a right to know what is in the minds of the organized workers. They should know that, while there are still serious divisions in the ranks of organized Labour and other internal problems which must be solved, Labour speaks more and more unanimously regarding fundamental principles, and the kind of social order which it hopes to see established. There is general agreement that the machinery of the nation and of the world must be utilized efficiently, with a view to providing the highest possible standard of living throughout the world, and the utmost human happiness. That is a large order, and it calls for the removal of a great many obstacles which stand in the way of progress, as well as a positive application of human intelligence to the whole question of human welfare and survival.

Practical Problems Demand Solution
So far as the Canadian Congress of Labour is concerned, it is confident that its objective of a good life for the workers and the people of Canada, and ultimately of the whole world, is not unattainable, and it is prepared to do everything it can to promote progress in that direction. The workers whom it represents feel keenly the maladjustments of modern industrial society, and they are not only endeavouring to understand the nature of the problems involved in building a better world, but are taking practical measures for the realization of their ideals. They have been deeply concerned in recent months with the drastic increase in the cost of living, and have strongly urged the imposition of price-controls and the reduction of prices to reasonable levels. They have been forced to demand higher wages, and in the endeavour to maintain their living standards, but they realize that every increase in wages has been used as an excuse by industry to increase prices, whether or not such increases are justified, and that their wage-in-

creases left them in many cases no better off than they were before.

Political and Economic Affairs

The failure of government and industry to protect the interests of the workers and the people of Canada has convinced the workers that they must no longer leave political affairs to professional politicians, or leave the industry to the tender mercies of industrialists whose sole concern is the making of profit. The competitive economic system is not working satisfactorily, and it is becoming increasingly more evident that the public welfare demands a greater measure of economic planning and co-ordination. It is evident also that the financial system must be reformed in order that money be used for the benefit of the people.

There can be no excuse in a country so richly endowed as Canada for the poverty and distress which are rampant throughout the Dominion. Although the organized workers have been able to protect their interests to a considerable extent, the many workers are unorganized, and the living standards are far from adequate to maintain health and decency; the lack of housing and there is still widespread economic insecurity.

Labour Anxious To Co-operate

All progress stems from co-operation; people must have food, clothing and shelter, and once these are ensured through the efficient production and distribution of goods and services, it will be much easier to solve the problems which now stand in the way of universal peace and goodwill.

As a national institution, the Canadian Congress of Labour is eager to co-operate with other institutions which have for their purpose the promotion of the common good. The Labour movement is opposed only to evils of every kind; it wishes to encourage justice, freedom and happiness, and on this Labour Day, it is glad again to have the opportunity to make its aims and aspirations known and understood by the Canadian people.

Literature And Life

TOO LATE

Browning has three little poems called "Pisgah Sights"—the suggestion for the name came from the Old Testament scene where Moses climbed to the top of "Nebo's lonely mountain to view the Promised Land. They deal with life and death. The first two represent the author at the end of his life looking at it from a hill. It lies out there and a mixed enough thing it is. Now I see all of it he says—"alls lend and borrow, good, see, wants evil, mixed—man's existence I see all of it, only I'm dying." The last line is suggestive and pathetic. Now at the end he sees what it is but it is too late. In the second "Pisgah Sights" he says that if he were to live his life over again, he would be only a learner; he would not try to reform the world, but do the best he could. The third "Pisgah Sights" is about a lady, who died very suddenly and set his mind working. It is his "In Memoriam" in honour of a Mrs. Smith, and deals with immortality.

The line, "Only I'm dying" suggested this article. It occurs as I have said in the first poem and it illustrates in human experience take the school-boy. He begins normally at the age of five or six to attend school, and for a while it is very interesting, but when he reaches his teens perhaps he wishes to get out and go to work to earn money, which is so much needed these days. He leaves school and finds a job; the years slip past and quickly when he perceives he realizes that he left school, but it is too late now. From the vantage ground of his year he looks at life. He is now harassed up with the industrial machine. "Now I see all of it, only I'm dying"—that is a chance a gone beyond recall.

"Of all sad words of tongue open, the saddest this—it might have been." Carlyle realized this after his death. They had been married forty years and he said she had walked with him for that length of time life's stony road. He must have been a hard man to live with and keep in good humour. He had the sco's reserve and never told her that he loved her till it was too late. He saw all of it, only he was dying—a part of his life had gone. He said that his home was quiet and lonely. She died very suddenly, in 1866 and he lived on till 1881. He stood on his Pisgah and saw then what he had lost but it was too late.

This is often illustrated in life. How often are plans laid and death comes and interrupts. We have the "Grammarians' Funeral" by this same writer where he deals with this a favourite subject of his.

"Oh, such a life as he resolved to live. When he had gathered all books had to give. That before living he'd learn how to live."

What's time? Leave now for Goggs and open a man has forever. There is a verse in the book of "Wisdom" which has much comfort in it; it is, "he that has begun made perfect in a short time hath fulfilled a long time." This has been a wife for a long time. Why the good die young often and those whose lives are dry as summer dust live on.

Milton deals with this in his "Lycidas" where he writes about his friend of much promise—King—who was drowned and was such a loss to the church, "when hungry sheep looked up and were not fed." He blamed the "abhorred

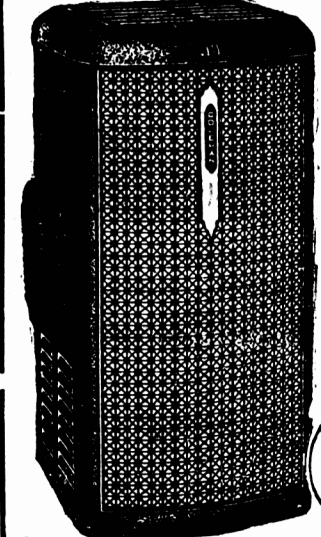
