—Dr. Bonnell saw Hitler twice while in Germany. He also saw Goebbels. He heard Hitler speak shortly after the "blood purge" in an effort to justify his deed. Referring to this purge, the speaker said the leader's took it down their own comrades in a scramble for power. "Hitler is a murderer" who shot and killed his own best friend. Goering also shot down his best friend, he added. Dr. Bonnell went on to say he did not hate the Germans but see in them the greatest menace to our civilization in a century. The only word which describes them is gangsters. He told of visiting youth camps and finding that the idea of Nazism is drilled into the young people. All the results that they are led to believe that they are going to bring peace to the world. They never had a chance to know any different and it is necessary to visit Germany to fully realize this, he added. The outside periodicals were not allowed on the news stands of Germany and the radio was censored during the time of the purge. They are blindly following this ruthless leadership. Dr. Bonnell expressed the belief that this struggle against Germany would be a long and difficult one but would result in a victory for the British Empire. "We need courage and faith in Canada," he said, "to hear the struggle which lies ahead." Referring to the National Registration to be held in Canada this month, he said that the Government was acting with the "fullest wisdom" in having this done. MacNutt explained that the potential resources of the United States is behind Great Britain in this struggle. Hitler had used strategy in making war in this time as the Presidential election of United States is about to be held. He said that "the greatest human melting pot in the world" is being created across the Atlantic. There are more Italians and Germans in New York than there are people in the Maritime Provinces and the press is clamoring to keep out of war. The problem of the leader in United States is not as easy as it seems.

—Asks Co-operation—Referring to the National Registration he said, "I want all our citizens to register—not only to register but to give every assistance to those carrying out registration in this province." He also spoke of the need for a military training centre being established in this province. So far there has been over 3,000 men enlisted from this province—a large number per capita than any other province since the war started. At one time this province was a military district and it is to be hoped it will be made a sub-military district soon, he said.

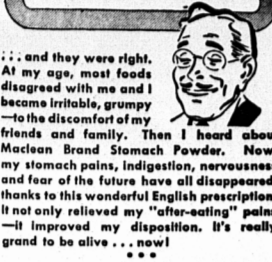

The Legion Auxiliary

RESOLVED that this Convention of the Prince Edward Island Command of the Canadian Legion, B. E.S.L., once again acknowledges and places on record its appreciation of the splendid work of the Ladies Auxiliaries of the Legion in this Command.

Necessity of Defence

WHEREAS, the maintenance by Canada of adequate and efficient forces on land, sea and in the air, for the defence of Canada and for the discharge of those obligations which rest upon Canadians by virtue of the Dominion's partnership in the British Empire, has been one of the Principles of the Legion since organized in 1925.

AND WHEREAS this Principle has been placed before successive Governments and the people of Canada on many occasions, but unfortunately has not been heeded.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Convention places on record its absolute belief that, after the war, the Voluntary Defence System of training, in operation since Confederation, should be abandoned in favour of a system of universal compulsory training, as it is not only a system best suited to Canada but one which will give our young men the best training for the defence of Canada and the Empire in future years.

RESOLUTIONS

The King

RESOLVED that this Convention of the Prince Edward Island Command of the Canadian Legion, B. E.S.L., assembled at Charlottetown, desires to place on record its loyalty and devotion to His Majesty the King, George the Sixth, and to express its admiration for the untiring leadership shown by them in these days of great national and world crisis.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED that it is the prayer of this Convention that His Majesty the King will be guided aright by Providence in their efforts to bring the present unhappy conflict to a speedy and victorious end, together with a peace founded on right and understanding—a peace which will endure.

The Governor-General

RESOLVED that this Convention of the Prince Edward Island Command of the Canadian Legion, B. AND WHEREAS it is the considered, and unalterable opinion of the Canadian Legion that of all the citizens of this country the most entitled to the right to exercise the franchise, are those who now serve their lives to assure the continuance of our present form of Government by the will of the people.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Prince Edward Island Command of the Canadian Legion of the B.E.S.L., assembled in convention at Charlottetown on August 7th, 1940, hereby places on record, for the information of all concerned, its unqualified determination to protect to the limits of its ability, the rights of all members of any of His Majesty's armed forces, whether within or without this Province, from being disfranchised or originating from any source whatever.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Convention of the Canadian Active Service Force, by reason of absence on His Majesty's service, do not present to assert their rights.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the opinion of the Convention of the Canadian Legion, B. E.S.L., representing the Temperance Federation, in attempting to deprive members of the Canadian Active Service Force of the right to vote, constituted a positive, though probably unintentional, breach of the Defence of Canada Regulations in that this action might be considered as calculated to belittle those serving and thus discourage recruiting, and therefore should be brought to the attention of the Minister of Justice, in order that his department may take whatever action may be necessary to prevent offences against these Regulations.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The following report was presented by Lt.-Col. Chandler, Mr. Chairman and Comrade MacNutt, in presenting a report of the activities of the Prince Edward Island Command of the Canadian Legion, B. E.S.L., for the period commencing Thursday, July 27, 1939, to the day of the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Legion on August 7th, 1940.

One of the first items of business was the submission of a report dealing in some detail with our activities, both of a normal character and as extended by the outbreak of the present war, or speaking in very general terms of our activities, which has just passed into history. Though not disagreeing with those who believe that a reasonable amount of detail should be incorporated in all our reports as a matter of record, for the information and possibly guidance of those who follow us, I suggest that a report of that nature, to be at all comprehensive, should be of a general nature, and attempt to avoid detail, and speak in very general terms of our activities, and of our progress as President of the Prince Edward Island Command of the Canadian Legion.

Soberly, yet cheerfully, and executive assumed office when Great Britain declared that a state of war existed with Germany, and the thoughts of the world, including the Legion turned from the war of 1914 to 1918, to the new war. This, of course, made it necessary to re-examine the aims and objects of our Legion, as well as our activities, both of a normal character and as extended by the outbreak of the present war. We found that questions of interest to veterans of the last war, which had once seemed of paramount importance, had now become subordinated to the one question of winning this war. We found, too, that our young men, who are now being trained, should I say new men, caused a very considerable change in, and enlargement of, our activities.

New Activities

With your permission, I should like to speak very briefly of these new activities, because I believe it will be with activities of a similar nature that our successors will be most concerned. With the outbreak of this new war, the Canadian Legion, through the anxious and energetic part as the age and abilities of its members permitted, organized an auxiliary service, the Canadian Legion War Services Inc. The object of this Legion organization was to provide educational opportunities, recreation and such activities and assistance as old soldiers could supply to those who now serve.

Following organization on the first step was to secure the funds necessary to allow this organization to pursue its objects. A Dominion-wide campaign was planned, and carried to completion. In this campaign an allotment was made for the Prince Edward Island Command, and the chairmanship of our chairman, Mr. MacNutt, this province succeeded in securing some of the largest amount allotted. This generous response to our appeal, I consider one of our greatest accomplishments, ever paid this command of the Canadian Legion, and would like again to express our thanks to Comrade MacNutt for his efficient conduct of the campaign, and to the citizens of Prince Edward Island for their generous response and expression of confidence in this Canadian Legion.

Following this campaign, we made representation to the Canadian Legion War Services Inc., through our representative on the Board of Directors, Comrade D. J. Johnson, and were gratified to have

Trotsky Fortifies Estate in Mexico

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Leon Trotsky, Russian exile who escaped machine-gunning by would-be assassins May 24, is transferring his estate at suburban Coahuacan into a veritable fortress, and better organized than any other attempt on his life.

Workmen are erecting three brick and concrete towers equipped with narrow slits through which riflemen could dominate the walls enclosing the estate. Another tower atop the residence is being remodelled along similar lines. Windows across the street have been barred, and the guards have been equipped with floodlights. Trees and shrubbery have been trimmed or removed to offer an intruder little cover.

There is only one entrance to the estate. Visitors admitted through the one gate by a guard-secretary, find themselves in a steel case, the inner door of which may be opened only by an electric switch controlled by another guard inside the grounds.
