Small But Select Field Set For Running Of Kentucky Derby Saturday

By ORLO ROBERTSON Associated Press Sports Writer LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 4.—Eleven three-year-olds forming the smallest but the best balanced field in many years, are expected to fight it out in the 64th running of the \$50,000 Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs Saturday.

Not since Brokers' Tip surprised in 1933 has this blue ribbon three-year-old race been so wide open. One need go all the way back to 1918, the year Exterminator scored, to find a field of less than 12. That year only eight faced the barrier.

But what Saturday's field lacks in size, it makes up in quality. No less than seven of the probable starters figure to be 10 to 1 or less in the mutuels with another slightly more and only three rank outsiders.

Canadian Entry Scratched Wise Fox, the lone Canadian-owned horse among the Derby nominees, was scratched from the race today by owner A. G. Tarn of Winnipeg after finishing seventh yesterday in the Derby trial.

Tarn's withdrawal left Canadian representation in the blue grass classic to jockeys Alfie Robertson and George Wolf. Robertson, the Toronto rider who has been one of the leading United States jockeys for the past decade, gets the mount on Mountain Ridge.

Wolf, the Montana boy who spent considerable of his life in Cardston, Alta., and once was a leading rider on western Canadian tracks, will be up on the favored Howard horse, The Chief.

The Big Six Now the big six in order of their starting are: Maxwell Howard's combination of Stagehand and The Chief; William Warren Wright's Bull Lea; Hal Price Headley's Menow; Herbert M. Woolf's Lawrin; and William Du Pont, Jr.'s Dauber.

Walt, Myron Selznick's hope, is next in line followed by Eoloo, owned by William O'Toole, former Chicago alderman, Bert Friends's Co-Sport and Mountain Ridge, all that is left of what once was a powerful entry from Mrs. Ethel V. Mars' Milky Way Stable.

Hi-Y Grads took a one-game lead in the best-of-five series for the Y. M. C. A. basketball league championship last night when they scored a 52-48 win over the Y-Knots after playing five minutes of overtime.

The Grads were strengthened by Jack MacLean, student at Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario, who annexed a total of 37 points.

Both teams had chalked up 26 points when half time was reached with MacLean scoring 20 of his points within that period. Continuing to play on even terms in the second half the score was tied at the end of regulation time when it was decided to play overtime.

The game was not without roughness. Referee Walter Goss calling a total of 36 fouls, 16 against the Grads and 20 against the Y-Knots.

Dean Ordered Month's Rest



(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) CHICAGO, May 4.—Dizzy Dean, the \$185,000 addition to the pitching staff of Chicago Cubs, will be lost to the team for at least four weeks. For that period he must not pitch. For at least two weeks he must not even try to throw a ball.

These were the orders of Dr. John W. Davis, Cub physician, after an X-ray examination of the star's pitching arm which followed Dean's failure to complete the game against Philadelphia yesterday. Dean's trouble, according to Dr. Davis's diagnosis, is a lingering inflammation of the deltoid muscle at the point of insertion with the humerus—the bone of the upper arm.

After four weeks rest, Dr. Davis hopes that Dean will be able to resume his regular turn on the mound.

Dis took his vacation instructions just as he takes almost everything else—good naturedly. "I'll still win 20 games," was his prediction after taking time out to get back into condition.

In addition to being ordered to rest his salaried arm, Dean also was instructed to run every day and get into physical condition to enable him to pitch.

Manager Charles Grimm was responsible for ordering the X-ray examination. Dizzy has persistently maintained to Grimm that his arm was not sore, but Grimm realized that Dean was not pitching naturally. After a 40 minute rest out today Grimm suddenly decided to send Dean to the hospital.

CHESTER, England, May 4.—(AP)—Jockey Cliff Richards today scored a notable double by winning the Chester Cup on Mr. Grundy, owned by Sir Abe Bailey and trained by Joseph Lawson's Manton Stable. Yesterday Richards rode Cave May to victory in the Chester Vase.

Mr. Grundy, a colt by Son-In-Law from Doro, took the 11th running of the cup by 1 1/2 lengths from M. W. S. Murray's Buitol, De Chicaeur, owned by Rex Cohen, was eight lengths back.

The 1937 winner, Failes Vos Jeux, finished seventh as Mr. Grundy covered the 2 1/4 miles in 3:39.8. The winner started at odds of 10 to 1 in the field of 17. He had been a quiet tip for several days. The Aga Khan's Dharampur, 7 to 1 favorite, was far to the rear at the finish.

24 Britons To Vie For Berth On Cup Team

(By The Associated Press) ST. ANDREW'S, Scotland, May 4.—Britain's 24 best amateur golfers will play four rounds over the Old Course tomorrow and Friday to decide who will face the United States Walker Cup team here June 3-4.

The Royal and Ancient Walker Cup selection committee—Cyril Tolley, John Morrison, W. B. Torrance, T. J. Thirk and H.M. Dickson—will send the squad out in threesomes for 36 holes tomorrow and pair them up for the final test Friday.

The committee will not necessarily choose the 10-man team on the outcome of these matches. The form of the players, rather than their scores, will be the deciding factor.

Made up of 11 Englishmen, eight Scotsmen, three Irishmen and two Welshmen, the squad will include English—Leonard Crawley, 1931 English amateur champion; Harry Bentley, 1936 English champion golfer; and present German amateur titleholder, K. B. Scott, No. 1 man of Oxford; D. H. R. Martin, E. Bromley Davenport, J. Graham, A. T. Kyle, Charles Stowe, Ivor Thomas, and Frank Pennell, 1938 English amateur champ who won the title for the second time last Saturday.

Scottish—Hector Thomson, 1936 British amateur champion; Gordon Peters, quarter-finalist in the semi-annual meeting of the Maritime Provinces Branch, amateur Athletic Union of Canada by C. C. Gillespie of Moncton, N. B., a former president.

Gillespie was elected president, replacing Tom MacDonald of Halifax who with other officers, resigned to allow a free discussion of the Branch's problems. Ripple Leads Attack To Give Hubbell And Giants 3-2 Victory Over Reds

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 4.—Carl Hubbell came through again for New York Giants today, but he had to have a lot of help from Jimmy Ripple before he subdued the Reds 3-2 in Cincinnati.

Ripple belted four-for-four—a triple and three singles—to lead a 10-hit attack that finally overcame Poaches Davis after he had blanked the National League champs for five innings. Hubbell allowed a total of seven hits, fanned five and walked only two.

End Losing Streak In Pittsburgh, Little Poison Lloyd Waner was big poison to Brooklyn pitchers. He hit a homer, two triples and a single, drove in five runs and scored three to pace the Pirates to a 9-5 victory over the Dodgers.

The win ended a five-game Pirate losing streak. The Dodgers were held to three hits by Russ Bauers and Joe Bowman, but took advantage of Bauers' wildness to take an early lead before Lloyd Waner's bat did its heavy damage.

Phillies Whip Cubs The Phillies whipped the Cubs 6-4 when Chicago handed the lowly Philadelphia fans the two runs which gave them their margin of victory.

Another knocking Larry French out of the box in the sixth, the Phils scored their fifth run in the seventh when Clay Bryant walked Chuck Klein and the latter scored on a stolen base and two errors. The Phils counted their sixth run when Bryant walked three men in a row in the eighth and then uncorked what pich.

The Bees and Cardinals were rained out after five innings with the score tied 3-3.

Indians Will Win Out, Says Gabby Street

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 4.—Cleveland Indians have made a firm believer out of your old friend Gabby Street, who limped into New York with his St. Louis Browns. Barring injuries or tiffs among the players, he thinks they'll win out in the American League.

"The old sarge," it might be pointed out, was not struck off the Washington Monument back in 1908. He caught it in his big mitt, and he still has all his buttons.

"They're a terrific team as they stand now," he insisted. "They've nipped us four out of five times, but they're playing good ball, believe it or not. There's no reason in the world why they shouldn't beat the Yankees if they continue to play heads-up for Omar Vitt."

They're really hustling and their pitching is brutal. All my boys say Bob Feller is harder to hit than ever, and they can't wait until he gets back. They'll throw three him out, and then zip three fast ones right down the middle."

Sixto Escobar Wins Decision

NEW YORK, May 4.—(AP)—World Bantamweight Champion Sixto Escobar invaded the featherweight ranks tonight and was given a sound 10-round beating by Nat Lutfin, ex-Pittsburgh pounder now fighting out of New York Bronx. Both weighed 122.

Lutfin left-jabbed the champion off balance most of the way and, although he was cut and bleeding at the finish, he held a narrow margin. A crowd of 2,630 paid \$5.04 to see the show and cheered the verdict.

Escobar, thus, dropped his second straight decision on his return to United States soil since winning the bantamweight crown from Harry Jeffra in his native Puerto Rico.

The Bronx boy relied almost entirely on his left jab. At the finish, he had the left side of Sixto's face puffed and his left eye partly closed.

Although the Associated Press score card showed four rounds for Escobar, Lutfin earned the verdict by out-boxing his rival. Escobar sought in vain for an opening, but always Nat's spear-like left was stuck in his face.

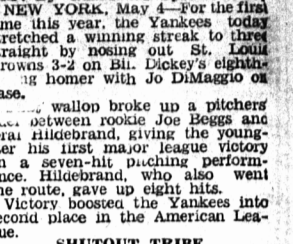
