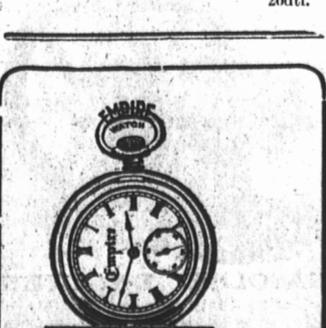

AGRICULTURAL meetings under the auspices of the Federal and Provincial departments of Agriculture are being held in the interests of stock farming at many points on the Island. At noon and evening meetings are held at most places. The afternoon sessions are given up to demonstrations of judging dairy cattle with specimens of animals before the meeting. Talks are also given on the breeding of the correct type of dairy cow. The evening meetings are taken up with talks on the feeding and care of the dairy cow, keeping of milk records, care and handling of milk &c. So far good meetings have been held at St. Columbia, Ho lo Bay, St. Peters, Morell and Mount Stewart. These meetings have been addressed by Thos. Lukleter of St. Eleanor, P. E. I. and W. F. Stephen of Huntington, Que. The former is a successful dairyman and farmer on the Island who gives some interesting talks along dairy lines. The latter is an experienced breeder and a very successful dairyman of Quebec Province, who knows the practical side of farming and dairying from the word go. His practical talks are very much appreciated. The attendance has been fair, but not as large as it should have been. Farmers should not fail to attend these meetings and thereby gain information and knowledge that may be of practical value and thereby further the Agricultural industry of the Island.
