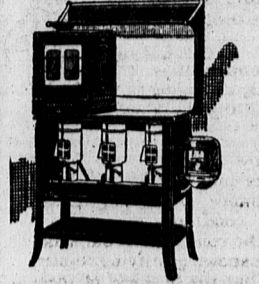
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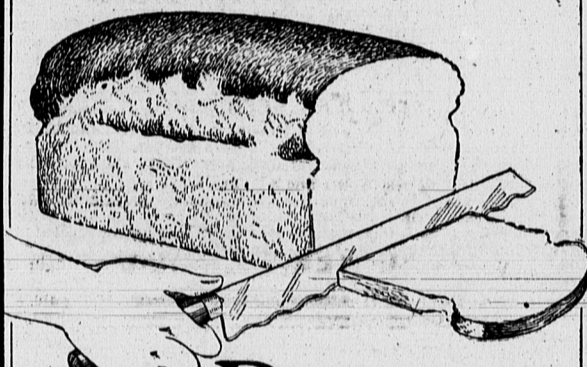

Canada's Per Capita Taxation
Q. What is Canada's Per Capita Taxation?
A. Canada's per capita taxation in 1925 was \$65.25 and that of the United States \$69.94. The National per-capita tax in this country was \$35.34, and in the States \$37.11. The latter, a high-tariff country, gets only 17.5 per cent of its Federal taxation from customs, duties, while Canada, a moderate-tariff country, gets 38.9 per cent. Only 17.3 per cent of her Federal revenue comes from this source, while the United States collects thus 56.3 per cent. In per capita taxation Canada stands below both Great Britain and Australia, as well as the United States. Great Britain stands highest at \$94.42, and Australia second at \$73.20.

New fractional currency coined in Germany for Greece contains 70 per cent of copper, 20 per cent of nickel and ten per cent of aluminum.

Thirty six interchangeable blades resembling those of safety razor is the work of a lawn mower invented by a resident of Portland Ore.

An Englishman has invented an umbrella with a jointed stick that can be bent to hold the device to one side to shelter two persons equally.
