SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

ODD COMPLICATION IN HYPNOTIST'S CASE

S. S. LESSON. November 21. PAUL'S STORY OF HIS LIFE. 2 Cor 11:21-12:10. GOLDEN TEXT. "My grace is sufficient for thee: for My power is made perfect in weakness."

POINTED SUGGESTIONS. By Rev D. W. Snider. Though Paul was somewhat ashamed of himself for giving it, we are thankful for what his indignant pen has revealed of his ancestry, of his life and labors, of his visions and Satanic buffetings, and especially of the grace by which he triumphed over all.

It was forced autobiography, but none the worse in the telling for that reason. The apostle calls it "boasting" and "glorifying, not after Christ." Perhaps he would permit it to be said that it flavored of fool's spice. So let it be. Let him have his way. But let us, while his back is turned, say that it was a flashlight, panoramic and marvellous, of the greatest and most heroic life of which the world has any record, in all the honor-roll of God's servants.

What provoked Paul to the recital, with words like half-battles, of who he was and whence he came, and why he suffered and saw and prayed and received? Ah, greatness and generosity are too often the mark for the arrows of the jealous and little and defeated. And the apostle had, therefore, to suffer the stings of such as they shot against him, to the righteous exasperation of his great soul, even such charges as meanness and insincerity and fickleness to the limit of untruthfulness.

Under such unwarranted charges he also learned of the havoc they wrought among those whom he had won for Christ—his Corinthian converts, for whom he entertained a "godly jealousy." These were being prevented and turned out of the way. It is necessary, therefore, that Paul should utter his defence, for if a character, continuously assailed, is never defended, it comes to be considered incapable of defence.

But the apostle retains his modesty. He does not become the victim of the ironical telling of his own right to respectful consideration. See how quickly he passes from under the shadow of the spot of light, which is self-praise, to warm us in a sunshine testimony to the Lord's provision of sufficiency of grace!

He admits that ancestry counts with some, and it ought, perhaps, to count with him. He believes that office should be proved by service, and is prepared to submit to the test. Loud-speaking claimants to honor will also step up and be measured. So he says, thus and so by way of a starter. If that is not enough, perhaps, a word or two may be added about "visions and revelations"—the "bridal hours of the soul."

It is to be noted that Paul refers in his autobiographical outburst, not to what he accomplished, but to what he suffered and endured. Perils and punishments and deprivations are the kind of evidence that insincerity or fickleness or self-seeking can put in.

It may be easy to measure to the stature of men and to meet the demands of their self-centred judgments. When you are may be met satisfactorily by the relation of who I am, but there is another, to whom both of us stand related. The question is, how do we measure by the measurement of Him? What of His greatness, and ours? What of His holiness, and ours? What of His love, and ours? What of His life's purpose and its accomplishment unto the death, and ours?

What wonder Paul said, "I am less than the least of all saints." But what is there left for us to say?
