DIDN'T LIKE HANGMAN

Radcliffe Refused Lodging at Ste. Scholastique.
MONTREAL, March 10.—Radcliffe, the hangman, who undertook the task of sending Cordelia Viau and Sam Parslow to eternity on the gallows on Friday, for the murder of Isidore Poirier, did not meet with a cordial reception in the village of Ste. Scholastique, a few days before the double hanging took place. All the public places of entertainment refused to give him accommodation and the private houses were much less inclined to take him in. The people of the village are exclusively French Canadians and a carpenter who erected a gallows there eighteen years ago has been frowned down on ever since, as the people are of a superstitious nature, and looked upon the money earned in such a manner as Judas money. Radcliffe was compelled to come to Montreal to get shelter and had to ride back and forth between here and Ste. Scholastique every day until after the hanging.

EPWORTH LEAGUES.

Second Annual Convention of the Summerside District.

The second annual convention of the Epworth Leagues of the Summerside District was held in the Methodist church, Kensington, on Thursday, March 9th. The first session opened at 2 p. m. with devotional exercises, led by Rev. John Goldsmith, Alberton. A number of delegates were present and the following officers:—President, Mr. B. M. Gough, Summerside; Secretary, Miss M. Bentley, Kensington; Cor. Sec'y., Miss F. Durant, Margate; Treas., Mr. Lewis Trueman, Searletown. The minutes of last Convention, which was held in Summerside, were read and adopted. The following officers were then nominated and elected for the ensuing year as follows:—Pres., Rev. J. Goldsmith; Vice Pres., Mr. Lewis Trueman; Sec'y., Miss Bentley; Cor. Sec'y., Miss Jessie Strong, Summerside; Treas., Miss Bertie Wigginton, Victoria. The new president then took the chair and called for the reports of League Delegates. The following Leagues reported:—Summerside, through Miss Sprague; Bedeque, through Mr. Lord; Searletown, through Mr. Trueman; Kensington, through Mrs. Lowther; Bideford, through Rev. Mr. Pepper; Alberton, through Miss Emma Wilkinson, who also reported two new Leagues on that circuit, Cascumpec and West Devon. A paper written by Miss Nina Lowther, on "How to develop efficient committees" was then read. She emphasized the importance of getting all the members on the different committees, and getting them interested in the work. It was an excellent paper and was warmly discussed.

Rev. G. C. P. Palmer then gave an address on our personal relationship to Christ. He said that if we would be successful in our missionary efforts, we must have Christ within. We need more of Christ within us if we would teach Christ. We should so live that our very lives may lead others to come to Him. Rev. Charles McKay, of the Presbyterian church, was then introduced and strongly endorsed the words of the last speaker. Just here, a letter was read from Rev. T. Hicks, Tyron, regretting his inability to be present, and giving an encouraging report of the leagues on that circuit—De Sable, Crepaud and Victoria.

Treasurer reported a balance on hand from last year of \$1.20. While collection was being taken up, a solo was sung by Mrs. Gordon Tuplin. Some questions were handed in, but answers were left over for evening session. Adjourned.

The evening session opened with short prayer service led by Rev. Mr. Pepper. President took the chair, and gave a brief address, asking if the Leagues were doing all they should do for the young people, and advocating the formation of Junior Leagues. Addresses of welcome to the delegates were given by Rev. F. A. Wightman, and by Mrs. I. Lowther, Pres. of Local League, which were responded to by Rev. Mr. Pepper. Mr. Alfred Glover sang a solo, Miss Sprague read a paper, written by Rev. A. E. Chapman on "The Epworth Leagues and his neighbor." This was an admirable paper, dealing as it did with a subject, deep, far-reaching, and comprehensive. Namely, how we should so conduct ourselves toward our neighbor that the world may become better and brighter because we have lived in it. A short discussion followed, and "Onward Christian Soldiers" was sung. Miss Jessie Strong read a paper, "Work and aims of the Epworth League." She spoke of the origin of the E. L. and some of the ways in which it may be made useful

in helping people to live more like Christ. A solo was sung by Miss Amy Frizzle, accompanied by Miss Strong. Collection was taken up, while choir sang an anthem.

The questions which had been handed in, were answered by the President. It was decided to have a special time for holding Epworth League Convention each year, namely between haying and harvest—exact date to be left to Executive.

Convention was invited to meet in Searletown next time, which invitation was unanimously accepted.

After the usual vote of thanks to the railway for reduced fares, to the officers of last year, to the church trustees and choir, and to our hosts and hostesses, session closed with a brief consecration service, and benediction by Rev. F. A. Wightman.

McKINLEY FOR ENGLAND.

London, March 10.—Here is an extraordinary piece of news, published by a London weekly paper:

"So President McKinley, as becomes the descendant of Highland ancestors, is coming over to the Glasgow exhibition. We may promise him a regal welcome: indeed his visit will be the grandest event of the opening year of the new century, inasmuch as it will cement the alliance of blood which already is fusing the two branches of the mighty Anglo-Saxon family. It is to be hoped that the court, and the ministry, will rise to this magnificent occasion. We must give him such a naval demonstration, such a public reception, as will throw even the Queen's anniversaries into the shade. We must take him to Oxford and Cambridge to hear how our young Barbarians can cheer; to Aldershot or Salisbury plain for a military display en masse, and to Birmingham as a spectacle of vast industry. Naturally he will be a lion in Scotland, and if he can admire the splendor of Glasgow his avian instincts must be powerful indeed. But the point is—McKinley comes as de facto monarch. He must be entertained as Czar, or Kaiser."

Evidently the writer supposed that a President of the United States on a European jaunt is part and portion of the new policy of expansion. However, everything is American now from a topic point of view, in English conversation and comment.
