The following extracts from an extended report in the Brockton Times of the 13th inst, will be of interest to many in this Province and especially in Hamilton where the deceased was well known.

The death of Charles McKendrick took place Sept. 13th at the home of his daughter, Mrs W M Dunbar of Hancock Avenue.

The deceased was 84 years of age in August, and the immediate cause for death was cancer of the stomach.

McKendrick was the father of nine children of whom the following survive him.

Mrs Katherine Pollard of Taunton, Mr W M Dunbar of Brockton Heights, Malcolm McKendrick of Shreveport La Boeert P McKendrick of Memphis, Tenn, and

Nathan S McKendrick a professor in the Academy at Exeter, N H. Two sons, William A McKendrick and Ewin McKendrick, passed away at their homes in Brockton last spring, both of these losses proving a hard trial to the aged father.

The deceased was a native of Hamilton P E I, his family being the earliest of the old Scotch settlers, and one of his ancestors being the first white child born on this Island.

He married Catherine McLean, also a native of Prince Edward Island, who became the mother of seven of his children.

During his stay here Mr McKendrick carried on farming to some extent, and also served for some time in the capacity of deputy sheriff.

After the death of his wife Mr McKendrick and children moved to Taunton, Mass., where they took up residence about 35 years ago.

Here he became acquainted with Susan Reed of Lakeville, whom he married a little later, and became the father of two more children, one of whom is Norman McKendrick of Exeter, N H.

About ten years ago he took up residence with his daughter, Mrs. W. M. Dunbar, and since that time has made his home with her, moving to the heights about 1899.

Mr McKendrick had rare eyesight, hearing and mental capacity for one of his years. He found use for glasses only when reading, and could dispense with them even in this for a short time.

His remarkable memory, however, was what distinguished him from other men. Always a great reader and thinker, especially upon religious subjects, Mr McKendrick was enabled to remember facts which other men would have found an entire impossibility.

Having read the Bible through numberless times he could answer nearly any question in regard to it, and could recite long sections until about three years ago when he sustained a bad fall, the effects of which he has not yet fully recovered from.

He could give the names of all the kings and queens of England from the earliest times, the exact date upon which each of the throne, and the relationship in which each of the nobility stood to each other.

This however would mean the additional expense of having a resident agent there. It is earnestly hoped that the efforts being put forth by the Board of Trade and ship owners generally will result in retaining the Agency here.

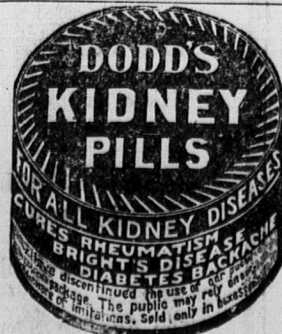
