For the occasion, beautiful baskets of Michaelmas daisies and chrysanthemums, arranged with feathery goldenrod, had been placed below the chancel rail. During the ceremony Mr. Stanley Bulley presided at the organ, and as the bridal party arrived at the west door of the Cathedral they were met by the choir, who preceded them up the aisle, singing "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling." Given in marriage by her uncle, Mr. Strangman, the bride made a lovely picture in her wedding gown of eggshell satin fashioned with long-sleeved, close-fitting bodice, with a softly flaring skirt falling from the fitted hipline.
