## Interesting Lecture At The Y. M. C. A.

The usual Sunday evening sing song service was at ended by nearly 400 people, the special attraction being Mr. Herman's lecture on Newfoundland and the Labrador. A very pleasing Duet was rendered by Messrs Ben Acorn and C. L. McKay accompanied by Prof. Tanton.

Mr. Herman in his lecture took his audience with him from Newfoundland right up to the Arctic circle and the land of the midnight sun and Eskimo.

The slides are a wonderful collection and magnificently coloured many of them being taken for Mr. Herman during his years of service in these northern lands.

The speaker was familiar with each slide and told of the work which each slide depicted.

Mr. Herman told of the wonderful work that Dr. Grenfell is doing in Labrador and of his life service for these fisher folk of the north.

The hospitals alone tell of the wonderful work of Dr. Grenfell and of the founding hospitals in many centers of Newfoundland and Labrador.

Mr. Herman gave very graphic details of the people and of their customs, their mode of living, their food and occupation.

The women of Lapland are the people that do most of the work while the men smoke and fish.

Among the slides were many pictures of huge icebergs, of which only one seventh was showing the rest being beneath the surface of the water.

Mr. Herman told of many of Dr. Grenfell's calls to the sick and how he risked his life many times to get to the bedside of the sick or injured.

In closing the speaker gave an earnest appeal for consideration of the north as a field for wonderful service.

At the close of the service Mr. Herman was tendered the hearty thanks of the audience by the chairman.

**HOUSES SCARCE.** The housing problem is a serious one in Summerside just now as it is practically impossible to get any choice in a house. The rents have advanced in accordance with the scarcity. Several new houses will be built this summer on the Breunlan lots.

**CAR SALESMEN BUSY.** The automobile salesmen are very active in Summerside these days and the prospective purchaser has much of his time taken up in attractive propositions. Several autos have already been purchased.

**PURCHASES FARM.** Mr. Adon Mulligan, Newton, one of the prosperous potato growers of King's parish, has purchased the property known as the Hughes farm adjoining the railway at Newton. Mr. Mulligan intends extending his farming operations to his new farm.

**THE MARKETS**  
MONTREAL, Que., April 24.—The foreign demand for grain in the Montreal market was again disappointing Saturday and no new business of importance was accomplished. The volume of business in cash grain in the domestic market was also small, but the undertone was firm and prices were unchanged.

The export trade in spring wheat flour during the past week was more active owing to the increased demand from the United Kingdom for May shipment but apart from this the market was quiet and prices were steady.

The demand for winter wheat flour was limited, but a fair trade was done in all lines of mill feed and values were well maintained. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was inactive, but values were unchanged.

A feature of the egg situation during the past week was the keen demand from the east for both immediate consumption and for storage purposes with the result of a shortage of carlots of Ontario and the prairie provinces found ready buyers.

Brokers found it difficult to secure further offers in consequence of which a much firmer feeling has prevailed in that market and jobbers in some cases advanced their prices one cent per dozen. Fresh extras steady at 35 to 36 per dozen and firsts at 33 cents to 34 cents per dozen. The receipts were 3,154 cases Saturday.

A strong feeling prevailed in the buttermilk market last week and prices closed with a net gain of 2 cents to 3 1/2 cents per pound, which was attributed to the temporary scarcity of supplies. Final sales of eastern townships No. 1 pasteurized were made at 40 cents to 42 cents per pound.

The receipts were 2,299 packages. The cheese trade continued extremely dull but prices were unchanged. The receipts were 152 boxes.

There will be no restraint. Let us welcome the light, let us walk in the light, and let us vote according to the light we have. He who fears the light is already defeated. He who has the light has victory though he may be outwardly vanquished."

The Woodington family are now operating a farm of 112 acres at Burlington and the two young men who accompanied them will work around the district.

It is interesting to note that all these people have always lived on farms in Scotland, operating small holdings of about twenty acres in the Old Country, and have had considerable experience in farming and the children are experts in the care of cattle, etc.

Last Wednesday about fifty-five of the neighbors gathered at the home and tendered the newcomers a rousing and hearty house warming, with presentations of gifts and a well-filled purse. Two of the Misses Woodington who are accomplished dancers gave an excellent exhibition of the Highland Fling and Sword Dances and the entire family are extremely popular in the neighborhood.

Four of those young ladies are coming into the city today where they have already secured employment.

This is the first family to arrive in the neighborhood of the newcomers and it is expected these will be followed by fifteen or twenty more.

Last year families came out too early, on account of the late spring. This year the families are not coming so early and it will probably be the latter part of May before the bulk of them arrive.
