SIGNALS WERE NEVER HEEDED

CONNEAUT, Ohio, Feb. 13.-While high officers of the Lake Shore Railway stood hidden behind the company's tracks here the other night twenty-four trains rushed past the signal targets at this place the light of which had been turned out as a warning that the tracks were not clear. Only one train out of twenty which passed through here during the time the railroad officers stood on watch obeyed the signal that there was danger ahead and stopped. Four passenger trains were included in the list, and only two of these even slackened speed. The other two tore past the target with reckless disregard of what might be in store for them further along the track. As a result of this test it is expected that a number of train crews will be dismissed.

POLICE ARRESTED THE SUFFRAGISTS

Lady Agitators Raise a Row Over Women's Rights in London

LONDON, Feb. 13.-The Women Suffragists, whose leaders have sworn not to resist in their violent agitation until Parliament has granted their demands, appear likely to give the authorities considerable trouble. Today they made a more determined and better organized demonstration than ever before in course of which over sixty women were arrested. It was nearly midnight before they were all lialled out. From an early hour this afternoon until ten o'clock at night, a large force of police had their hands full in defending the precincts of Parliament from suffragist raids. Every entrance to the House of Commons was guarded by detachments of policemen, while other officers of the law were engaged in clearing the adjacent streets, and a body of fifty constables was kept in reserve for emergency.

BAD SMASHUP ON THE MAINE CENTRAL

St. JOHN, Feb. 13.-The Boston train, which is due to arrive in this city at five minutes after 12 o'clock, was delayed over five hours yesterday because of an accident on the Maine Central at Yarmouth Junction. The accident which caused the delay was a rear-end collision between a freight train and a local passenger train running between Portland and Bangor. The passenger train, No. 112, was stalled because of a slight accident to the engine. This was on a down grade and the heavy freight train came rushing down, regardless of efforts made to stop it. It crashed into the passenger train, damaging several passenger cars and injuring 10 persons. The impact was so strong that one of the freight cars was badly wrecked.

HIS OWN WEIGHT HIS FOOD MEASURE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.-Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, Chief of the Bureau of Chemistry of the Department of Agriculture, is author of the statement that every man eats every day "one per cent of his weight in dry foods," and it requires one hundred days for him to eat his own head off. If a man eats less he will lose weight, Dr. Wiley asserts, and if he eats more he will gain, which will be good news to the fat who want to get thin and the thin who want to get fat. Dr. Wiley adds that every person should consume four and a half pounds of solids and liquids every day, but in doing the ordinary work of a government clerk this amount is above the average.

SKIPPED WITH HALF A MILLION

NEW-BRITAIN, Conn. Feb. 14. - More than half a million dollars worth of securities were taken from the vaults of the savings bank of New Britain by the missing treasurer, Wm. F. Walker, according to a statement issued by the Board of Directors of the Bank yesterday afternoon following the examination of the collateral in the bank by State Commissioners Kendall and Noble. There is left a surplus of about \$142,000 over and above the amount due to depositors, the actual shortage being \$663,000. The directors believe the greater part of the securities will be recovered.
