**MOST LAW-ABIDING IN WORLD**  
(British United Press)  
SYDNEY, New South Wales, Aug. 13.—Referring to exaggerated newspaper reports of crime in New South Wales, the Chief Secretary, Mr. Chaffey, declared that they were "sensationalism run mad."  
"These reports," he continued, "have not only a very damaging effect in Australia, but they seriously injure Australia's credit abroad. It is hard to understand the motives of journals that publish such untrue statements, which are afterwards sent abroad. British people, especially Australians, are the most law-abiding people in the world."  
"We had an illustration of the influence of the police and the law-abiding instincts of Australians in the coal fields recently, when men, with feeling running high, marched in procession to a coal mine against which they had a grievance but were persuaded from carrying out their threats by a single police officer."
