The Miranichi Presbytery met its quarterly session last week in St James' Hall. A letter read from Rev. L. E. Beaton, of Galedonia (P. E. I.), who has been called to Blackville, (N. B.), has asked for one month to consider the matter.

A St. John exchange says: At the quarterly board meeting of the trustees of the Queen Square Methodist church on Thursday last a unanimous invitation was extended to the pastor Rev. W. C. Gaetz to remain a member of the church for another year. The invitation was accepted. (Rev. Mr. Gaetz is well known here.)

Pictou Advocate:—The freight ship is very busy these days, heavy freight coming and going to Prince Edward Island and the Magdalenes. Hops and oranges make up the bulk of perishable freight from the Island and fish is the principal product from the Magdalenes. The Eastern Canada Fisheries Company has shipped considerable this year.

Pictou Advocate:—Smallpox is a gain reported in some of the country districts throughout the province. It is in the country districts that smallpox holds out, being unreported in many cases. Unless provincial vaccination laws are enforced smallpox will again be rampant in these provinces and be as fatal as ever. With out vaccination the disease cannot be held down to its present mild type. (This would seem to necessitate watchfulness among provincialists lest this disease again break out here.)

The following will be of interest here: The union between the two Baptist Boards in Canada, that for the convention of Ontario and Quebec, and that for the convention of the Maritime Provinces, will be consummated in February under the act of Parliament lately passed providing for the incorporation of a Dominion Board. The first meeting of the new amalgamated board will be held in Toronto in that month. At present the secretaries of the two boards are Rev. Dr. J. G. Brown, of Toronto for Ontario and Quebec, and Rev. W. E. McIntyre of New Brunswick, for the Maritime Provinces. The estimates for the year 1912 have been passed by the Baptist Foreign Mission Board for Ontario, and Quebec to the amount of \$62,500 for the regular work in India and Bolivia. In addition to this about \$15,000 will be spent for completing the High School among the Taugus at Cocanada, India.

A St. John exchange says:—The conference arranged between Arthur Hawkes, special Immigration Commissioner, Premier Fleming, Hon. John Morrissey and the Board of Trade Council and Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island representatives tomorrow afternoon, (Dec. 19) at four o'clock will be of a private nature with the idea of allowing a freer discussion of the problems of immigration, and particularly the extent to which the Federal Government should co-operate with the Provincial Governments. Mr. Hawkes, the representatives of the Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island Governments and the members of the Provincial Cabinet, will be the only guests at a banquet in the evening given by the Board of Trade Council to Mr. Hawkes. Mr. Hawkes is expected to arrive at noon. After the conference in the Board of Trade rooms he will speak to the Women's Canadian Club in Keith's Assembly rooms. He will leave the city again on Wednesday morning in company with the Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island representatives.

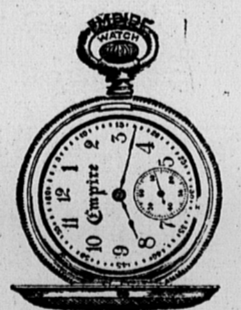
A Moncton exchange says:—It has been currently rumored around among the sporting fraternity that Walter Gregory would not play with the New Glasgow team this year, but would turn out with the New Glasgow team which he captained last year. An exchange, referring to the announced appointment of J. A. Nicholson, M. A., the registrar of McGill University, to the position of superintendent of education for Prince Edward Island, says:—"Mr. Nicholson, who is a native of Prince Edward Island, is a graduate of McGill University and occupied the position here for one and a half years in 1891-1892. After leaving Prince Edward Island he held the position of second master in the Royal Arthur schools for ten years, when he was appointed registrar of McGill. He is now almost ten years in his present position and is popular with the board of governors, faculty, students and all who know him."

Rev. R. H. Stavert, Harcourt, N. S., a native of Wilmot, P. E. I., is still working earnestly in the interests of the temperance cause in his parish and the surrounding locality. A despatch from Dalhousie Jct., N. S., says: "A large public temperance meeting held in the Presbyterian church here recently, was addressed by Rev. R. H. Stavert. At the close of the meeting a division of about twenty-five members was organized for officers installed. Mr. Stavert addressed a meeting at Dalhousie the previous night and one at Campbellton before that. At the close of the meeting in Campbellton about thirty signified their willingness to unite with the Sons of Temperance, when a suitable hall has been secured so that regular meetings can be held." An exchange states that Rev. Mr. Stavert, a Grand Worthy Patriarch of the Sons of Temperance, recently prosecuted four cases of infraction of the license law and in each instance secured a conviction.

WOMEN SUCCEED AS GEM CUTTERS.

Americans, especially American women, seem to be recovering the use of their hands. A rather curious bit of evidence on this point was offered the other day by a New York gem cutting firm, says the Sun.

For some time craftsmen had been resorting to the establishment for stones to be used in hand made jewelry and ornaments. So the manager decided to hazard an advertisement in a publication dealing with handicrafts.

He put up papers and cut and polished semi-precious stones, five papers in all. One contained chiefly lapis (the jewelers do not bother to add the "lazuli") of two kinds, Chile and Swiss.

The latter is much lighter, containing large whitish spots, and is much less expensive. A piece of Swiss lapis often costs less than half as much as the other variety.

Paper No. 2 contains jade and topaz quartz, No. 3 has carnelian and amazonite, No. 4 garnet and malachite, and No. 5 moss agate and amethyst quartz. Each paper contains 15 or 16 stones of various sizes, but mostly in the cabochon form.

Some are round, some oval, some pear shaped, and there are a few flat stones in square and diamond shapes. These were the papers advertised in. The astonishing thing is that on an average ten letters a day are received from all parts of the country concerning these stones. Orders come not only from the cities, but from small towns, little places that nobody had ever heard of.

A few envelopes picked up at random were postmarked Los Angeles, Boise (Idaho), Kansas City, Oakmount (Kentucky), and so on.
