N. Y. Stocks

Crack 4 1/2 Year Low

NEW YORK, June 13—(AP)—The stock market today cracked to a 4 1/2 year low while Wall Street hummed the "business blues."

Leading issues dropped from a few cents to more than \$2 a share—some around \$4 to an extreme of \$7.50 each.

The owners of all stocks listed on the exchange were poorer by more than \$1,000,000,000 at the end of one of the busiest days of the year. The drop was just about as steep as any thus far in 1949.

The day's news offered little explanation for the latest slide in a market that has been on the skids for the last month or so.

Wall Street, though, has been moody and blue for months. The pessimistic outlook of the financial district for business prospects was accentuated today by another drop in steel production, approaching wage talks in several basic industries, and another round of reports of price reactions and production cuts.

Start of the scheduled one-week walkout by coal miners was not considered an immediate factor, although the possibility that the week might stretch out longer was not ignored.

MONTREAL, June 13—(CP)—In its annual report issued today for the year ended March 31, 1949, Dominion Textile Company Ltd., announced a net profit of \$4,322,475 equal to \$2.05 a share compared with \$2,834,832 or \$1.05 for the previous fiscal year.

Current assets totalled \$21,956,484 and current liabilities were \$5,979,272 leaving a net working capital of \$16,277,192.

MONTREAL, June 13—(CP)—Directors of Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company Limited, at a meeting here today, declared a regular semi-annual dividend of \$1.50 a share for the six months ended June 30, plus an extra dividend of \$3.50 a share, making a total of \$5 a share payable July 15 to shareholders of record June 20.

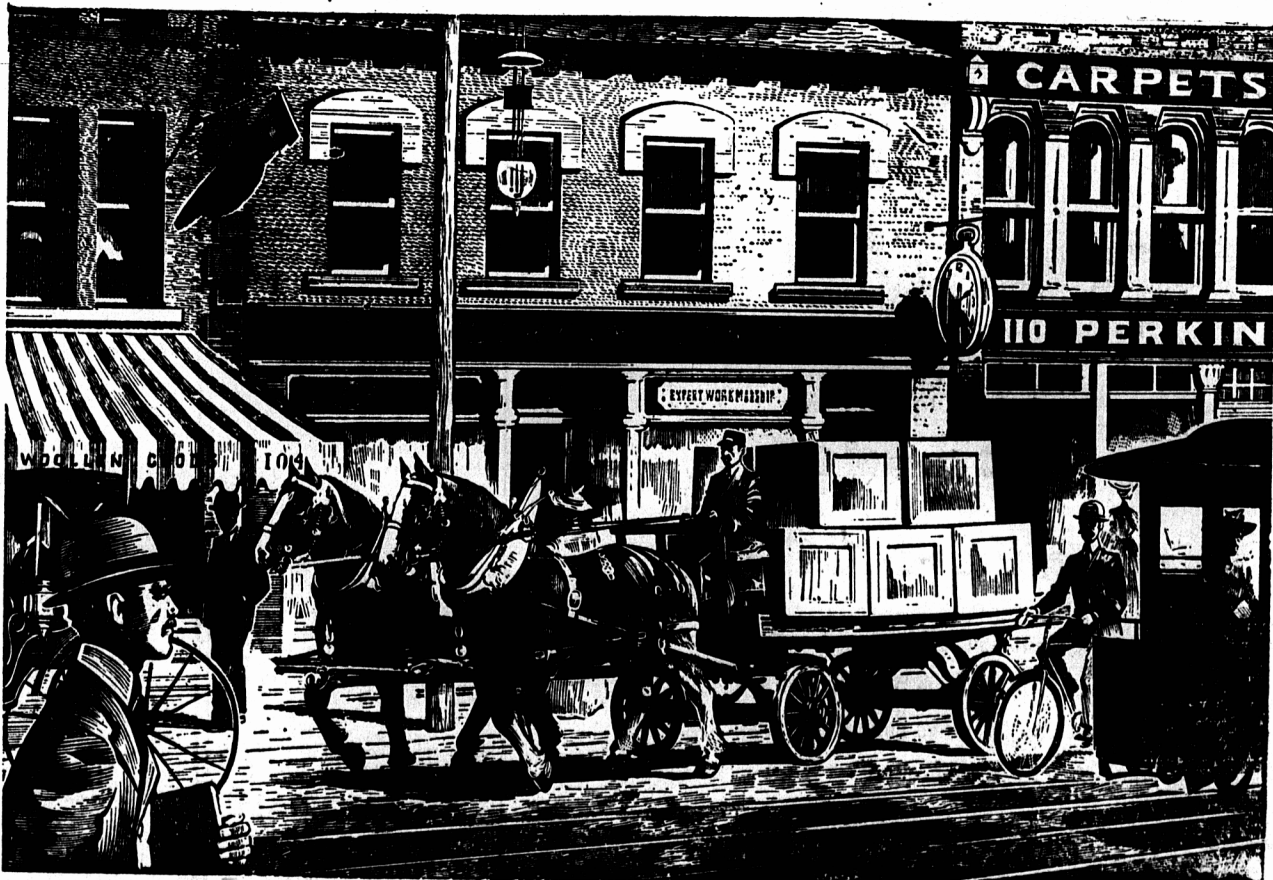

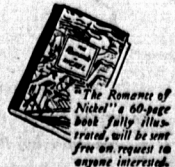
