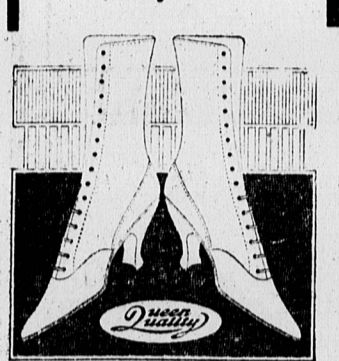

RUSSIAN FEELING TO ALLIES CHANGED

LONDON, April 30.—It is reported that Leon Trotsky, the Bolshevik Minister of War and Marine, has gone to Murmansk, northern Finland, to arrange for an attempt by the Russian forces there to resist the German attempt to push northward.

In this latest respect it is said that the attitude of a majority of the population has undergone a radical change in the past five or six weeks. The general feeling six weeks ago was distinctly anti-Ally, and many places were openly pro-German.

Today sentiment is said to be opposite, and the feeling toward the Allies is declared to have changed from suspicion of the Japanese to friendly attitude toward the British and French, and the warmest friendliness toward the United States.

HANDSOME WOMAN ARRESTED IN N.Y. AS GERMAN AGENT

NEW YORK, April 30.—Madame Marie K. DeVictoria, believed by officers of the Department of Justice to be one of the most active of Germany's agents in this country for the last 15 months, was arrested at a fashionable Long Island hotel, Saturday, and brought to this city as a dangerous enemy alien.

Madame DeVictoria was in a highly nervous condition and was sent to a prison ward at Bellevue Hospital, Miss Margaret Sullivan, her maid, was held as a material witness.

Madame DeVictoria, who also has been known as Madame DeVussiere, is said to have come to the United States, through Norway on January 21, 1917, as a passenger on the steamship Bergensfjord.

Madame DeVictoria, who is 33 years old, is a handsome woman of the German type. She always is fashionably gowned and wears considerable jewelry.

Federal authorities believe her real mission in the United States was to spread German propaganda among the Irish. She is reported to have been chief aide to a Lieutenant Commander of the German navy who reached here in December, 1914, and who has been working among Sinn Fein sympathizers, trying to get them to enlist in the British navy in order to plant bombs on warships.

DETROIT, April 30.—Anita Schmidt, the woman who came to the United States as the wife of Helmut Schmidt, and Greta Darsch, who lived with Schmidt at Lakewood, N. J., were today added to the list of women entangled in the mystery surrounding the man who last Thursday took his own life in the Highland Park jail after confessing that he had buried the body of Augusta Steinbach after she had swallowed poison at his home.

This information developed after questioning by authorities of Mrs. Adele Christ-Braun, who married Schmidt, then known as Braun, at Lakewood, N. J., in 1914, and Gertrude, Schmidt's seventeen-year-old daughter.

Thus far the police have been unable to trace Schmidt's first wife, Margarete Darsch, or Irma Pallathaus, the latter having disappeared after becoming a fugitive.

HOW SOUNDS CARRY

Camille Flammarion, the French astronomer, made many balloon ascents in the pursuit of science, and in one of his journals gives some interesting illustrations of the heights at which sounds from the earth are heard.

The shout of a man was heard distinctly at the height of 1,600 feet, the croaking of frogs in a morass at 3,000 feet. At 3,255 feet a cook's note of a church bell and the moaning of a woman were heard.

At 4,550 feet the rolling of a cart were distinguished; at 4,550 feet the roll of a drum and the music of an orchestra; at 5,000 feet the crowning of a cook the sound of a church bell and the shouting of men and women. Nine hundred feet higher still he heard the report of a musket and the barking of a dog. The noise of a railway train penetrated to a height of 8,200 feet, and the whistle of locomotive engine to nearly ten thousand feet.—Manchester Guardian.

DECLARATION OF WAR DEPENDS UPON GERMANY'S REPLY

BUENOS AYRES, Argentina, April 29.—Reports from London that Germany expects Argentina and Uruguay soon to declare war, have occasioned surprise here. The newspapers agree that there have been no recent developments in Argentina in this direction.

So far as is known the only aspect of the situation which may involve either nation in the war lies in the possibility of an uncompromising reply from Germany to Uruguay's inquiry regarding the reported capture by a German submarine of a Uruguayan mission to France.

HUMANE TREATMENT OF STOCK IN SHIPPING

The high value attached to all live stock as a consequence of the existing market prices has done much to discourage cruelty in handling animals in shipping. But there still are shippers who resort to the use of a club much too readily when a beast shows an inclination to do anything but hurry through the chute or into the pen. The use of a club in driving cattle or pigs nearly always results in the appearance of a certain proportion of bruised or crippled animals on the market, with consequent loss of money to the shipper.

Even without a club the livestock handler can bring about a considerable lowering of the price of stock, if he uses poor judgment in driving and loading. The winter season, with its attendant cold and storms, is a sufficient source of discomfort to the live stock in transit, but when hot weather arrives, it is most necessary that the men who prepare animals for market and those who handle them during their journey should make special provision for their comfort.

Cattle and hogs, especially the latter, move slowly in summer on account of the heat, and patience is needed in handling them. Fagged-out animals are not attractive to the buyer, and the seller is the loser when they are put on the market in such condition. For some years past special laws have been taken by the Humane Society to prevent cruelty to animals going to the stock yards, and conditions in the yards are greatly improved as a result. Continued watchfulness on the part of the original shipper is necessary, however, if the full benefit of this work is to be received by him.

TEVASTEHUS TAKEN

BERLIN, April 30.—General Count Von Der Goltz has taken Tevastehus, on the railroad fifty miles north of Helsinki, after an engagement. On entering the town our troops were enthusiastically greeted by the population.

PEAKING

PEKING, April 30.—For the purpose of ending sensational speculation on the diplomatic situation between Japan and China in the Chinese press, the government has authorized the following statement: "The existing negotiations between China and Japan are included to refer solely to co-operation against the enemy. The agreement will become invalid as soon as the European war is terminated without bringing upon the political or territorial integrity of China. The negotiations are progressing and the agreement will be turned over to the foreign office for final examination in the course of a few days."

A COMMON FAILING

Many Persons Apparently Unable to "Be on Time." (Christian Herald.)

A young Kentuckian has lost a big fortune by being twenty minutes late in keeping a business engagement. He concludes that his time is not worth anything, and that it is coming to him. And there is many a bad scar on our fortunes where he has had to prod us up to the mark.

Time is cheap, and we are apt to think we can catch as we will. But it is always ourselves we rob, not time.

Maybe you can waste your own time by being late in keeping engagements and feel that the loss, if any, is your own affair. But it also is the affair of the man you keep waiting. You waste his time, too. If your time is worthless, maybe his is not. He may conclude that his time is worth more to him than you are.

In many cases it may not matter much. But one never knows until afterward whether it matters or not. And, through false politeness we are usually assured that it does not matter even when it does.

Only the idle and careless whose time is of the least value, can afford to waste it by looseness in keeping engagements.

It may be hard to acquire the fixed habit of always being on time, but it can be done, and it is worth while to do it.

Great business men have this habit. Men of great affairs, whose name is most completely taken up, are usually on time. It is they who know best the value of time and the importance of saving it by being prompt.
