THE RELIEF OF KIMBERLY.

Our citizens yesterday in common with millions throughout the Empire realised the truth of the proverb, "As cold water to a thirsty soul so is good news from a far country." The far country was South Africa, and the good news was that General French had entered Kimberly.

The famous "Diamond City" in whose vicinity are the precious reefs, which were producing 98 per cent of the diamonds annually placed upon the world's markets, had been lately reduced to hard conditions of privation. Its population of 15,000 white people and a larger number of blacks, had been shut up and besieged almost from the beginning of the war. Bravely the little garrison and armed townspeople had repulsed the attacking Boers from time to time, but at length disease and scarcity of food were added to the terrors of continual bombardment. Relief has now come to them but it had nearly been too late.

Kimberly was garrisoned with a British force very shortly before the war began. This force was made up of about 700 men of the North Lancashire Regiment with two machine guns, a battery of Royal Garrison Artillery (six 7-pounder screw guns) a party of Royal Engineers with a detachment of the medical staff with ambulances, the whole under command of Lieut. Col. Kekewich. There was also a small body of local Volunteers Rifles, a battery of Volunteer Artillery and 120 Mounted Police. In addition to these some two thousand of the white miners were armed and drilled, and there were several armored trains, while a working body of 10,000 natives were utilised in the construction of earthworks and trenches.

Months ago the Kimberly garrison had hoped for relief, and none more ardently than the great Cecil Rhodes himself who was shut up there. In November last Lord Methuen was advancing victoriously to their aid. On the 23rd of that month he defeated the enemy at Belmont. Two days later he drove them from Gras Pan. On the 27th, still advancing, he captured Honingrest Kloof. On the following day, after ten hours hard fighting, he drove the enemy from Modder River. This was, for the time the end of his advance. On 11th December occurred the disastrous repulse at Magersfontein, followed by Methuen's force retreating to Modder River and entrenching themselves there, where they were gradually surrounded by the trenches of the enemy on the north, east and west.

Here for two months Methuen waited, powerless to advance, but nightly exchanging signals with beleaguered Kimberly. No doubt the situation of the garrison and population at Kimberly was still more critical and anxious. Some may have despaired of relief and indulged gloomy forebodings of surrender. At length they were told that Field Marshal Lord Roberts, hitherto always victorious, had taken personal command of the relieving force and would renew the attempt to reach the surrounded and isolated Diamond City. We can imagine their joyful sensations when on Thursday evening last Gen. French with the advanced guard of the relieving army reached the town.

It does not follow that complete relief has yet been afforded. A flying column has penetrated through the enemy's lines, it is true, but it could hardly have taken with it a sufficient quantity of supplies to afford permanent relief. We are pleased to learn from Gen. French's despatch that the enemy's force immediately south of the city has been completely dispersed. We have no intimation, whether or not Cronje's force is still at Magersfontein, and whether they will offer further resistance at that point or not. The full measure of relief for Kimberly will not be established till the railway line is re-opened and made secure between Modder River and the city.

In Hamilton Ont. a school of domestic science has been opened. It is known by the formidable name of the Young Women's Christian Association and Ontario Normal School of Domestic Science and Art. The school was formally opened by Premier Ross, and letters were read at the opening from Lady Minto, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Charles Tupper, and other notables. Mrs. Hoodless, an active promoter of the movement, had visited the schools of the United States and acquired a knowledge of their working. It is to be hoped that the pioneer school may have many followers in Canada. They may serve to give increased sense of dignity to housekeeping, cookery and home adornment, fields in which there is great scope for scientific improvement.

Montreal, Feb. 11.—Sir Charles Tupper has been invited to deliver an address in the City of Boston in aid of the British South African Patriotic Fund of that city. The chairman of this fund is Mr. G. Hubert Windler, the treasurer Mr. Fred Jones, jr., the secretary Mr. Robert Burnett, while the corresponding secretary is Mr. G. T. Stokes, all of whom reside in the City of Boston, where it is said, "the sympathy for British arms is exceedingly marked. During next month a monster meeting will be held in Boston, presided over by Mr. G. Hubert Windler, and the hall selected for this great demonstration in aid of the British soldiers will contain 4000 people. In looking over the list of Imperial and American statesmen, the choice fell upon the great leader of Liberal Conservatism in the Dominion as the orator of the day, as it goes without saying that Sir Charles Tupper's address will be worthy of the man, worthy of the great occasion and worthy of the country from which he comes.

Farewell to Lieut. McDonald.

It is estimated that nearly 2000 people assembled at the Railway station to witness the departure of Lieut. McDonald who left last night for the scene of conflict in South Africa.

All day yesterday Lieut. McDonald was busy bidding his friends good-bye and a universal expression of regret at his departure was heard on all sides.

Perhaps one of the most pleasing features of his departure was the parading of the Boy's Highland Brigade of St. James' church under command of Major Stewart. The Brigade paraded from St. James Hall—numbering 60 strong—and marched from the main down Queen Street to the Caledonia Club rooms where they were joined by the Caledonia Club, headed by piper Ferguson. After arriving at the station the club and brigade formed up on the platform facing the train. Lieut. McDonald, who has been the Captain commanding the Boys' Brigade passed down the ranks and shook hands with every boy, after which he spoke a few words of farewell, asking them to continue in the future as they had in the past and he hoped that on his return he would find them in the full uniform of the Highland Brigade would be able to give them a few pointers, as no doubt he would come closely in contact with the Highland soldiers of the Queen's army. After which Mr. McDonald took leave of his fellow officers and friends and boarded the train. As it moved out of the station three rousing cheers and a tiger was given him by the Caledonia Club and the Boy's Highland Brigade followed by three more from the crowd.
