Belfast Church Honors Departing Pastor

At the close of Sunday evening's service, the Rev. D. L. Griffiths and Mrs. Griffiths, and son Kenneth were given a most pleasant and flattering surprise. Notwithstanding the heavy rain of the afternoon, there was quite a large gathering for what was to be the last service of Mr. Griffiths as pastor of this congregation which he said, during his remarks of gratitude was one of the most loyal and kindly bodies of people he had ever worked among, and that the five years' service among them had been truly blessed.

On behalf of the session and congregation Mr. T. W. Morrison, read an address, which referred in most complimentary terms, to Rev. Griffiths' edifying and eloquent sermons as well as his many activities outside the pulpit. He then handed the pastor an envelope, containing quite a handsome cheque. Following this, Miss Flora Gillis on behalf of the Y. P. S. read an address, and also presented the Rev. gentleman with an envelope, containing some bills, intended for the three persons who are now known as "the Manse family." At the close of the morning service Mrs. Griffiths had been presented with an address and a cheque on behalf of the Ladies' Aid Society of the church.

All this was the more surprising to the family, inasmuch, it is only two weeks since they finally decided for family reasons to remove to their new field of Christian labor in the Province of Quebec.

It was evident that not only the pastor himself, but the family, also, had won, not only the respect but the affection of this large and worthy congregation.

During his words of thanks Mr. Griffiths spoke with some signs of emotion, of the continuous tokens of appreciation expressed by the people of St. John's Church in many ways during the last five years, and stated, that he and his family looked forward in happy anticipation of spending a part of next summer's vacation among them. Therefore, he added, he was not inclined to say "good bye."

However, it was not difficult to realize by the kindly atmosphere of the proceedings, that the parting, both on the side of the Manse family, and on the side of the congregation was one which contained feelings of sadness, after nearly five years of sacred co-operation. Apart from the public presentations referred to, the three persons concerned received many personal tokens of regard from different families during the last few days.

There was no sermon at the evening service but a programme of sacred solos and in which the following worthy took part: Solos by Mrs. Eva Murchison and Kenneth Griffiths; recitations by Mrs. Mabel McEachern and Flora Gillis. During the morning service Rev. Mr. Griffiths preached appropriately for the occasion from the words of St. Peter:—"Grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Those words, he said, contained his deepest desire, and prayer, on behalf of the congregation, whose loyalty he could never forget.

Boy Scout Leader Rescues Lad From Certain Death

SIX-YEAR-OLD TAKEN FROM FACE OF CLIFFS 120 FEET ABOVE HUDSON RIVER—HANDED DOWN FROM ONE TO ANOTHER

NEW YORK, November 18.—The screams of a six-year-old boy clinging to the face of the Palisades, 120 feet above ground level near Bullbrook Falls, brought three Boy Scout leaders to the rescue as he was on the verge of toppling to almost certain death.

The child, Jackie Schwartz, of 216 Engle street, Tenafly, N. J., had cautiously worked his way two-thirds down the cliff, following the example of three companions. Suddenly he found himself trapped, his feet resting on a ledge scarcely big enough for them. No crevices or ledges were within reach. Below the Hudson River swirled.

Panic stricken, he cried at first, then shrieked in horror as his young friends dashed away to summon aid. Alone on the face of the rock for 15 minutes, sobbing and calling for help, Jackie was losing his grip when the Scout leaders arrived.

Led by Harold K. Whitford, Scout Master of Troop 472, the Klips Bay Loys Club, 201 East Fifty-second street, came Jerome Solomon, 23 years old, of 615 West 168th street, and William Bryant, 19, of 318 East Fifty-fourth street, both assistant Scout Masters. They were on fire patrol when the boy's cries reached them.

"Forget where you are, son," shouted Mr. Whitford. "We'll have you down in a moment. Just try to keep quiet and forget the cliff—don't yell, don't move, just say quiet a while."

It was 3.30 o'clock. Sunlight still played on the Hudson mid-stream but shadows were deepening in the wooded lane where the Palisades shelved off into the river.

Solomon climbed to a point above Jackie, who watched his progress with deep interest, losing some of his fear as he spoke to him and to those below. Bryant followed up the cliff, taking a position to the right of the boy's legs.

Jackie raised his arms as ordered, and felt Solomon lift him off the ledge and slowly lower him to Bryant. The child clung to Bryant while Solomon skirted them to stand anew to the right and slightly further down.

Again the child was lifted, this time by Bryant, and handed down. Time after time, in a seemingly endless sequence Solomon and Bryant crawled down, down the Palisades, tenderly passing the quivering youngster to each other. Meanwhile Mr. Whitmore directed their steps and spoke soothing words to Jackie.

For many minutes after he set foot on firm ground, the boy stood white and speechless. He was thin, weighing a scant 50 pounds. The full hour occupied for the rescue unperformed him. Finally he began slowly to tell his simple story.

Mollison Must Have Airworthiness Certificate

LONDON, Nov. 17.—(CP)—Capt. James Mollison's monoplane, "Miss Dorothy," flew the Atlantic in record time without benefit of a certificate of airworthiness, the Air Ministry revealed tonight in ruling the flier must obtain one before attempting his projected flight to South Africa.

Capt. Mollison was unable to produce the airworthiness certificate when he brought his plane down at Croydon Airport last October 30, after a 13 hour, 16 minute record hop from Harbor Grace, Nfld., it was learned.

The Air Ministry called United States authorities, asking whether the certificate had been issued. The United States advised that the "Dorothy" had not been recently certified, nor could it now be certified as airworthy. Mollison was then instructed to obtain the necessary document for validation by the Air Ministry.
