WOULD DAMAGES GO TO TRUST COMPANY?

MONTREAL, Feb. 22—It is reported here that Mr. Plummer's visit to Halifax is to interview Premier Murray with respect to certain legislation which may be required by the Steel Company in view of the Coal Company's offer to continue the supply of coal. It is no secret that before finally carrying the case before the Privy Council, the Steel Company decided to abandon all remedies asked for in the statement of claim and ask for damages past and future for breach of contract. These damages have been variously estimated as from fifteen to twenty millions.

The other Province had done this. Sir Wilfrid Laurier had the impression that an undertaking was given to repeal the act, but the minutes did not show such to be the fact. It was being repealed in the best interests of the Province.

MR. MATHIESON said this tax had been much vaunted as a tax that was borne entirely by outsiders. The Opposition opposed it as a tax on trade, and paid by our own people. That view now prevails. The Government was wrong from the beginning and the Opposition right. The unfortunate thing was that the Province could not afford to lose the money. The Province stands alone in this that in the first full year under the increased subsidy we have an enormous deficit. We look forward to another year with a still greater one. Surely this must rest on the consciences of the men who said we should hereafter make both ends meet.

MEMBER HASZARD denied that he had mentioned the travellers' tax at any political meeting. The people had not reached the conclusion that the Government was always right and rather the reverse. He believed the tax restricted the visits of travellers and caused them to speak against this Province. Referring to municipal taxation, it is in vogue in every Province but ours. Had those Provinces that got the largely increased subsidies repealed the municipal taxes? Not at all. And yet we are told by the Opposition that we should repeal the land tax which is imposed in all the Provinces by the municipalities.

MR. MATHIESON protested against what he called the most unparalleled delay in public business. The House had now been sitting three weeks. At 6 o'clock the House adjourned till 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

COURT DECIDES AGAINST CASTRO

CARACAS, Feb. 22—Cipriano Castro has lost his title as President of Venezuela. The High Federal Court having rendered a decision that sufficient evidence has been presented in the suit brought against him by Attorney-General at the instance of Senor Alcantara, Minister of the Interior, on the charge of having attempted to bring about the assassination of Juan Vicente Gomez, the acting President. In its decision the High Federal Court transfers the seat to the Criminal Court, and declares that Castro in consequence of the decision is constitutionally suspended from the Presidency.

The act to bring about the constitutional removal of Castro was instituted several weeks ago, and at the instance of the Minister of the Interior, whose communication to the Attorney-General on this subject was accompanied by a large amount of documentary evidence relating to

Harrison, Hugh Miller, Edward Bell, J. M. Rice, H. H. Chouven, George Orman, F. A. Wightman, W. E. Johnson, L. J. Wason, George Steel, Wm. A. Thomson, John B. Gough, Henry Pierce, Ernest S. Weeks, E. A. Westmoreland. The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. E. A. Westmoreland who gave a short address on Christ and the individual.

On motion the Convention organized by appointing Rev. Elias Slackford, (Supernumerary) Chairman for the First Session, Rev. Wm. Harrison, Chairman of the Charlottetown District) for the Second Session and Rev. George Steel (Chairman of Summerside District) for the third Session and Rev. D. R. Chouven Secretary.

Rev. H. E. Thomas read a paper on the Divine Transcendence and Immanence in their True Relations, which called forth much discussion. Rev. D. R. Chouven read a paper on the Laymen's Missionary Movement and after much discussion the following resolution was passed:—Resolved that we the Methodist Ministers of P. E. Island assembled in Convention having had under consideration the Laymen's Missionary Movement do hereby give it our unqualified commendation, believing that it has the promise of much spiritual good for our work and commend it to all our circuits and congregations and do pledge ourselves to present the movement at an early date to all our congregations.

PRESENTATION TO MICHAEL DOYLE

The presentation was made by Mr. Sharp in a short and appropriate address fully spoken. The recipient gratefully acknowledged the same and expressed his great pleasure in thus meeting so many of his old railway friends. It was the wish of the General Manager that the presentation should be of a public nature but it is regretted that this could not be as Mr. Doyle, for some time past, has been confined to his room through infirmity. He has been retired from the service since April 1907 after a faithful service as a master workman on passenger coaches for more than thirty four years.

LONGEST WIRELESS NOW KNOWN

NEW YORK, Feb. 22—What was said to be the longest wireless message ever caught by a ship at sea was received on board the Mauretania. The message came from the land station at Clifden, Ireland, two thousand three hundred miles away, according to the Mauretania's wireless operator, Philip Davies, who said he picked up the message at midnight on Wednesday. General Manager Bottomley of the Marconi company, when told about Davies' feat, said that he had never heard of a steamer catching a message much over two thousand and one hundred and fifty miles, and there was no official record of that. It was quite possible with atmospheric conditions just right, Mr. Bottomley said, but communication at a distance of two thousand miles was about all expected of wireless apparatus aboard ship.
