Since he ascended the throne and Greece joined the Entente the view is generally held that marriage of the young king with a princess of one of the Entente countries would be

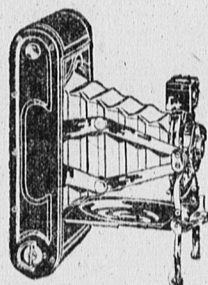

THE SERIOUS BUSINESS AT THE FRONT.

If Men at Home, Married or Single, Realized it They Would Rush to Enlist to Help the Boys in the Trenches.

ST. JOHN, Sept. 24.—"There can be no place at this time with any sort of honor" is the opinion of Rev. Thomas Harrison, a well-known Presbyterian Divine, formerly of St. John and Montreal, who is a chaplain in France. In a letter from him read tonight in the First Presbyterian church by the pastor, Rev. J. A. Morrison, Rev. Mr. Harrison wrote: "If your friends in Canada only knew of the seriousness of this business, I can hardly conceive men (married or single) of the right age to fit, not rushing to join up and take their places by the side of their brave brothers now facing the music of the German guns. The very fact that discussion is still being carried on goes to show how ignorant many are of the real issues at stake. There can be no place at this time with any sort of honor. I hope the conscription bill is in full operation."

A LARGE CUCUMBER.—The Guardian was yesterday shown one of the largest cucumbers of the season, which should really have been among the exhibits at the Fair. The cucumber tipped the scales at three pounds, and was grown in uncultivated land by Mr. John A. McLeod, of Darlington.

BRITISH WOMEN IN THE ARMY.

The use of women in the British Army both in France and at home to release men from the trenches is growing steadily. The exact numbers have not been published, but arrangements have now been made for over 1,000 women in France; over 6,000 cooks and waitresses have been provided for 200 camps at home, for one tent, and about 400 women have replaced men as motor transport drivers in the Army Corps, for another, the Royal Flying Corps, for another.

The London Morning Post gives some interesting figures of economic results resulting from the introduction of women as army cooks. Chiefly, they have been assigned to officers' and sergeants' messes and hospitals. At one mess the daily charge to officers was reduced in a few weeks from 1s 6d to 1s 3d a head, and in addition £100 was saved for the benefit of the mess generally. The charge at the same mess has now been cut to 1d a day. The Army Council recognized the good work by an increase in wages. "Instructresses in cookery" have also been furnished to army cooking schools.

At the bases in France and on the lines of communication women are employed in the following posts: Clerks, typists, cooks and domestic servants, motor drivers, storekeepers, tailors, bakers, shoemakers, messengers, telephone and postal service. The enlistment is for the duration of the war. A uniform has been adopted for all women serving in this women's Army Auxiliary Corps, as it is officially known. Its women are placed directly under the control of the commanding officer of the formation or the officer in charge of the office to which they are assigned for duty.

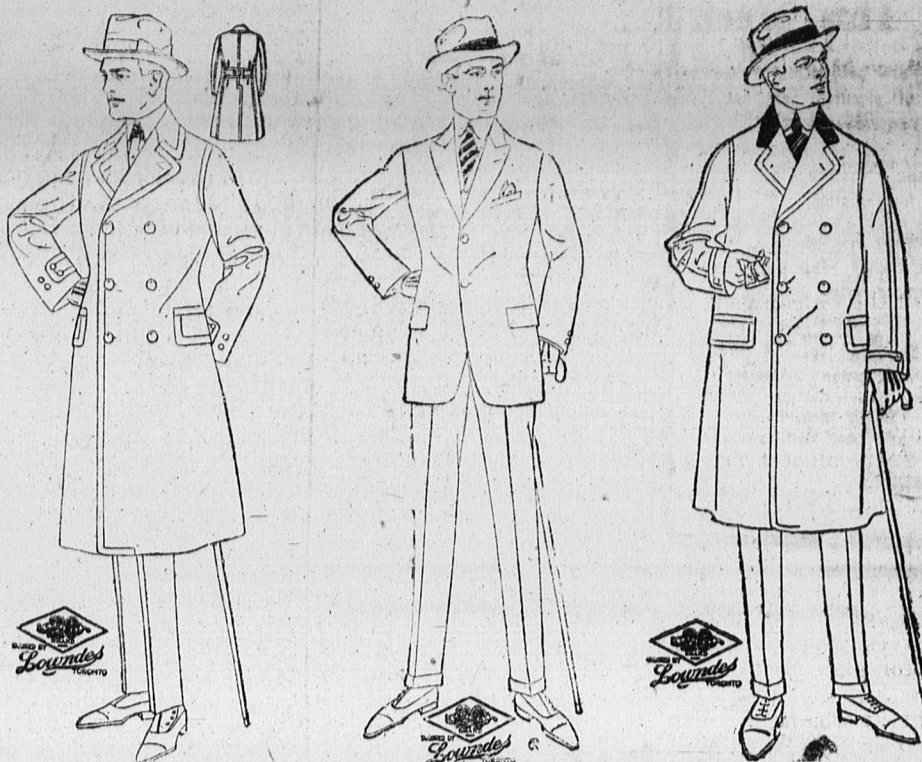

BIG LINER SANK IN FOUR MINUTES.

Survivor's Tale of Sinking of Minnehaha, Says 43 Lives Lost in Disaster.

AT AN ATLANTIC PORT, Sept. 22.—The big Atlantic transport liner Minnehaha, which was sunk by a German submarine Sept. 7, went down in four minutes after being torpedoed, according to Harry Clark, a veterinary surgeon, who arrived here today on an American steamship from a British port. Mr. Clark said the sinking occurred in Bantry Bay a few minutes after noon, according to information given to him by a number of the survivors immediately after landing. Numerous tales of heroism on the part of the captain Frank Claret, commander of the Minnehaha, and 43

other officers were related by the survivors. Mr. Clark said, Chief Officer Albany lost his life aiding members of the crew struggling in the water, after he had given his own life belt to a disabled fireman. C.A. Wills, the purser, was crushed to death between one of the lifeboats and the side of the ship as the boat was being launched.

Captain Claret, Mr. Clark said, personally rescued several of his men by plunging overboard from a lifeboat and swimming with them to safety. He only desisted in his efforts when overcome by exhaustion and he himself was pulled from the water. As a mark of appreciation for his bravery, the survivors of the ship bought and presented to him a handsome clock. Mr. Clark confirmed cable reports of loss of life, stating that the number of deaths were
