A letter thanking the club for the donation of a Gramophone to the Convalescent Home was read from Col. Warburton. Rotarian P. W. Turner read a paper on the Boot & Shoe industry. He traced the development of the boot from the sandals of ancient days, through the wooden clog of southern and eastern Europe to the leather home-made boot made in early days of the travelling shoe-maker. He then referred to the huge manufacturing industry of ready-made boots in Canada which totalled 45,000,000 per pair and gave details concerning the plant necessary to produce this enormous output. Before concluding he mentioned the reasons why the price of boots were high while the price of hides were low, viz increase in cost of various parts apart from the hides, freight and labor. No one can predict when the national reaction will take place but it is certain to be some time before there is any considerable reduction in the price of shoe-wares. Lieut. 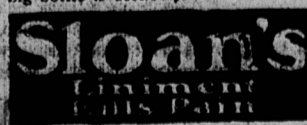
