One sow owned by him gave birth to twelve pigs this spring twelvemonth which he disposed of as follows. Sold a pair four weeks old for \$6.00; sold nine of them last fall for \$127.50; sold this spring the remaining one for \$17.50 and sold the mother last week for \$27.50 making in all \$177.50. Who can beat this.

Even the most casual observer cannot fail to be struck with the fact that the horses of this Province have been greatly improved in late years.
