ralia, New Zealand and Canada. The net result was that the self-respect of India shall be maintained by an never worked so incessantly in his life as while in England.

Visit to the Front.

Sir Robert referred to his visit to France. He paid a tribute to the courage and fortitude of the French people. When he was in France in July 1915, there was but one Canadian division at the front, which he reviewed at Plug street. On this occasion there were four divisions at the front, each with a full army corps. With the construction of communication railways, the construction corps and forestry corps, there were forces of a hundred thousand men. It was a compliment to the Canadians that they were selected to make the attack at Vimy Ridge, where many assaults in the past had failed. He saw the rehearsal for the attack. He would admit he was full of apprehension because every attack in the past had been defeated with great loss. He would say that no previous attack in France had ever preceded by the French had ever been successful. At one point they had planned they would reach at two thirty. They went ahead in that fight just as in the rehearsal and at two twenty-six they were able to telephone back by wires laid during the fight that the artillery could lift the barrage as they had already occupied the position they were due to reach at two thirty.

Gen. Stewart's Feat.

Sir Robert said that not only were the Canadian soldiers performing great deeds of valor, but in other operations they were making a name for themselves. He paid a great tribute to the work of General Jack Stewart, who was in charge of the Railway Construction Corps. The general said it was important that a certain line of railway be built very quickly. The experts said it would take six weeks to build it. General Stewart looked at it and said he could build it in a week. He actually built it in four days. (Cheers.)

Sir Robert told of his visit to the scene of the battle of the Somme. He went over No Man's Land, the French land, the light line of railway built by the Canadians. The country was a mass of churned up mud. He visited Concreteville, where the Canadians and particularly the 22nd French-Canadian Regiment, had distinguished itself. There was not a sign of a street or a house. The country was absolutely desolate. He understood how our own men went forward under such conditions when they took Vimy Ridge, or how they brought forward their big guns. Sir Robert added that one of the chief requests of the war office was for additional men for railway construction corps and forestry corps. It was universally admitted that the Canadian Forestry Corps was most efficient.

Sir Robert told of his visit to the Canadian camps. He found the men in good spirit and in fine physical condition. In the hospitals he found only one man with a complaint. This man complained that the Germans did not fight fair they ran away at Vimy Ridge and they could not get near them. He also referred to the kindness of the British people who could not do enough for the Canadian troops.

Question of Drinking.

Sir Robert said that he had made especial enquiries into the charges in regard to drinking among the Canadian soldiers. He would place a report upon the table of the House shortly. He said that stories that there was heavy drinking among the Canadians were absolutely without foundation. General Steele told him there was less drunkenness among the Canadians than any troops in the United Kingdom. As for the war canteen it was felt it was better to permit its use where the men would be under discipline than to allow them to go to the public houses.

Coming to the war itself, Sir Robert said that at the time he arrived in England there had been a great victory in Mesopotamia and there had been the overwhelming use of the Artillery. "A great struggle," said Sir Robert, "still lies before us in this war. This is the message I bring back from the Front."

The Sub Menace.

Turning to the submarine menace Sir Robert said that perhaps its seriousness might not be realized. He believed it would be met. There was enough determination, resourcefulness and courage to meet it, but he would not be doing his duty at the present time if he did not emphasize its seriousness. German confidence in the submarine warfare was supreme. In order to carry it on they risked war with the United States. They believed that before the United States could render help the submarines will win the war. The loss of ships was serious under certain conditions that he could not mention in the House. It was the belief of Germany that they could prolong the war by the western front long enough so that the submarines could force terms of peace which would not be listened to at the present time. He did not believe they could do this, but it was going to require courage and resourcefulness on the part of Great Britain. "I have no confidence that the war will be finished this year," added Sir Robert. The months immediately before us may be decisive, even if the war should not end this year. Germany is bringing

into play during the present season the last ounce of her marshness. What have we done in this war? We have sent 326,000 men overseas in the Canadian expeditionary force, including reservists in British and allied armies, the men enlisted for naval defence, 360,000 men at least have left the shores of Canada. It is a great effort, but greater still is needed.

Voluntary System Fails.

"Hitherto we have depended upon voluntary enlistment. I myself stated to Parliament that nothing but voluntary enlistment was proposed by the Government, but I returned to Canada impressed at once with the extreme gravity of the situation, and with a sense of responsibility for our further efforts at the most critical period of the war. It is apparent to me that the voluntary system will not yield further substantial results. I hoped that it would. The Government has made every effort, within its power so far as I can judge. If any effort to stimulate voluntary recruiting still remains to be made, we had like to know what it is. The people have cooperated with the Government in a most splendid manner along the line of voluntary enlistment. Men and women alike have interested themselves in filling up the ranks of regiments that were organized. Everything has been done, it seems to me, along the line of voluntary enlistment.

All Citizens Liable.

"All citizens are liable to military service for the defence of their country, and I can see that the battles for Canadian liberty and economy is being fought today on the plains of France and Belgium. There are other places besides the soil of a country itself, where the battles of this liberty or the existence for its institutions can be fought; and I venture to think that, if the way should end in defeat Canada in all the years to come would be under the shadow of German military domination. That is the very lowest to which we can put it. I believe that fact cannot be gained.

"Now the question arises as to what is our duty. I repeat once more a grave responsibility rests upon those who are intrusted with the administration of public affairs. But they are not fit to be intrusted with the administration of public affairs if they shrink from any responsibility which the occasion calls for. It is cannot yet realize what the life in involved are those which have been repeatedly declared by all our public men and in all the press of Canada, I believe the time has come when the authority of the State should be invoked to provide reinforcement necessary to sustain the gallant men at the front who have held the line for months, and who have proved themselves more than a match for the best troops that the enemy could send against them, and who are fighting in France and Belgium that Canada may live in the future.

"No one who has seen the positions which our men have taken whether at Vimy Ridge, Concreteville, or elsewhere can realize the magnitude of the task that is before them or the splendid resourcefulness which its accomplishment demanded. Nor can anyone realize the conditions under which the war is being carried on. I have been somewhat in the midst of things at the front. Yet I know that I cannot yet realize what the life in the trenches means and I can realize it better than those who have not been as near the front.

"I bring back to the people of Canada from these men a message that they need our help, that they need to be supported, that reinforcements must be sent them. Thousands of men have made the supreme sacrifice for our liberty and preservation. Common gratitude apart from all other considerations should bring the whole force of this nation behind them. I have promised in so far as I am concerned that this help will be given. I should feel myself unworthy of the responsibility devolving upon me if I did not fulfil that pledge. I bring a message from the men in the hospitals who have come back from the very valleys of the shadow of death, many of them who had lost both legs pretty well up to the hip, and he was as bright, as cheerful as any one of the members of this House, a splendid bravo. But is there not some other message, is there not a call to us from those who have passed from the shadow into the light of perfect day from those who have fallen in France and Belgium, from those who have died in Canada may live—is there not a call to us that their sacrifice shall not be in vain?

THE CONSCRIPTION

"I have had to take these matters into consideration and I have given them my consideration. I realize that the responsibility is a serious one, but I do not shrink from it. Therefore it is my duty to announce to the House that early proposals will be made on the part of the Government to provide by compulsory military enlistment on a selective basis, such reinforcements, as may be necessary, to maintain the Canadian Army to-day in the field as one of the finest fighting units of the Empire.

"The number of men required will not be less than 50,000 and will be probably 100,000. These proposals have been formulated in part and will be presented to the House with the greatest expedition that circumstances will permit. "I hope that when they are submitted all the members of the House will receive them with a full sense of the greatness of the issue involved in this war, with a deep realization of the sacrifice we have already made, of the purpose for which it has been made and with a firm determination on our part, we will do our duty in this great struggle to the very end, whatever it may be."

that when an Imperial Conference was announced in January the Liberals had decided at once to offer no objection to the absence of the ministers. Or the country, they decided so far as it lay in their power, to facilitate the business of the House in order to permit. Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues to go to England. They did this, although they did not see the immediate object of the conference. They reflected that there might be questions such as the organization of the armies, construction of ships, production of food, and the supplying of munitions of such consequence as to make it necessary or advisable for the Government of the Mother Country to confer with the Governments of the Overseas Dominions. If he had any criticisms to offer it was simply this, that the Prime

Minister did not exercise the best of judgment in the selection which he made of his colleagues who were to accompany him. In accordance with the fitness of things, two members of the Government were indispensable in the midst of war for such a conference—the Minister of Defence—the latter (Sir Edward Kemp) was left behind, and was replaced by the Minister of Public Works (Hon. Robert Rogers).

"Now," said Sir Wilfrid Laurier, "the Minister of Public Works may be a warrior bold but he did not show that he had any experience in that line. The Minister of Public Works once said on the floor of this House that his specialty was winning elections, which was not all winning the war." Sir Wilfrid added that in his judgment the presence of the Min-

ister of Militia was necessary in spite of the fact that there was an Overseas Minister of Militia.

EMPIRE REORGANIZATION

Referring to the announcement that the matter of the reorganization of the Empire had been left over for a conference to be held after the war, Sir Wilfrid expressed the opinion that no conference could bring about better results than those demonstrated by the present plan. One thing had been gained as a result of the conference, he said. It had been decided that the consultations of the future would be based upon the principle of equal autonomy, and will not involve any infringement of the powers of the overseas Dominions. In this connection, Sir Wilfrid referred briefly to

the revolution in Russia, declaring that the people of the British Empire were well satisfied with the existing monarchical institution. The form of Government, he said, did not matter, so long as the people were free, and had the right of representation. Sir Wilfrid then dealt with the question of the admission of India to a seat at the Imperial Council board. He noted that this involved a demand for equality of treatment in such matters as emigration, Hindu labor in future, Australia, and South Africa. This was really an economic problem, and presented greater difficulties than any of the other prob-
