In Memoriam

MRS. GEORGE MACMILLAN

The sudden passing of Mrs. George MacMillan, late of Alberry Plains gave a painful shock to her large circle of relatives, intimate friends and acquaintances. True, she had enjoyed many happy years, being in her 92nd year, but being blessed with unusually good health the visitor seldom failed to find her in the home when hospitality was supreme. On the 23rd day of September last, 1937, the end came quietly, and burial took place in the family plot at Christ Church, Cherry Valley. Notwithstanding inclement weather, the final scene was witnessed by a large assembly of mourners. The Rev. Mr. Weir of Vernon United Church, officiated.

The pall-bearers were: O. S. McNeill, Wm. Moar, Norman McMillan, Irving Tweedy, Arthur Richardson, and Arden Richards. Mrs. MacMillan's maiden name was Jelima Shaw, being the youngest daughter of the late Robert Shaw of New Perth. The name Shaw, though not among the first settlers of Three Rivers, fills a large and respected place in that community. The founders of the family, Donald Shaw and Christina Amos came from the well known Isle of Colonsay, Scotland, to Pictou, N.S., about the date of the Hector's arrival. After some stay in Pictou County they made their way across the straits into Wood Islands, thence to Brudenell. The means of crossing from Pictou was no doubt primitive and the overland journey worse. The names of their children as ascertained by the writer were John, Stephen, Robert, Donald, Archibald and Margaret. Stephen's son Robert is still living at New Perth in his 104th year, with mental faculties wonderfully bright and clear. Donald was the grandfather of Lloyd Shaw, at one time on our P.W.C. staff, but now filling a high position in the School System of Newfoundland.

Robert, who married Jane Williams of Flat Rivers, was Mrs. MacMillan's father. The members of their family were: Robert, a retired member of our Bar, who died in 1882, and for a term a member of the Legislature; Mary Ann, wife of Mr. Moar; Elizabeth, Mrs. McNeill, K.C.; Jelima, Mrs. McMillan, recently deceased; Cyrus, a farmer, New Perth; and for many years a member of our Legislature. He died in 1906.

The MacMillan family are: R. Shaw, miller and farmer, and also an M.L.A. two terms; Alexander, farmer, on the homestead; George, living at the old home; Victor, a rising barrister at the St. C. Marie, Que. He entered the P.C. when only 13 years of age. After a brilliant course for his years in the P.W.C., he read law with Messrs. McLeod & Bentley.
