In his opening remarks he expressed his thanks to many who had assisted in achieving such splendid results during the past year; to the Home and School Group who helped in the expansion of the Y's Men's Club for its contribution of equipment for the Manual Training Room; to Mr. M.L. Bradshaw, who annually donates prizes for the essay and practical contests and would express sincere regret regarding his recent accident. Mr. Mercer referred to the much needed library in the school and the accommodation for the books in hand as well as those he expected to receive. He wished all the pupils a pleasant summer vacation, to come back safe and sound to start in where they left off. Among the new prizes this year were: In Grade VII to the pupil making the highest marks in Arithmetic, donated by Dr. J.C. Simpson and awarded to Jessie Bingham; to the most aggressive salesman in the school, selling tickets for the School Opera, donated by Mr. Mercer and awarded to Billy Daley; two weeks stay at the Y.M.C.A. Camp at Holland Cove and transportation donated by the Y's Men's Club and awarded to the president, Mr. C. Ross MacKenzie to the following boys: Tommy MacKinnon, Norman Moase, Nelson Johnston, Donald Gay (just completed his fifth year of perfect school attendance), John Fredrick, Buddy Boyle. These boys were chosen by Mr. Mercer on the advice of the teachers. Grades I and II were awarded prizes and proficiency cards were given Grades III to VIII.

Air Cadet Camp Opens Today At Summerside

The Air Cadet camp for Maritime Air Cadet Squadrons opens today at the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, with the arrival of the squadrons which will constitute the first camp. There will be four two-week camps as last year with upwards of a thousand boys in attendance during the summer. One hundred and sixty-two cadets representing Moncton, Grand Falls, Windsor, Stellarton and Dartmouth Squadrons are expected to arrive this evening. The syllabus of training will be about the same as last year with the following subjects being taught: Air-manship, navigation, armament, meteorology, first aid and drill. Perhaps the most important item in the two week camp in the eyes of the cadets is the hour and a half flying time each will get in Beechcraft aircraft. A powerful R.C.A.F. crash boat will also be stationed at Summerside for the duration of the camp and the boys will be taken for trips in the boat. There will also be beach parties and sports activities. It is a full two weeks for the boys who attend. The training is actually divided into four phases. There is an air cadet officers course, a cadet N.C.O.'s course and two courses for cadets: one for first year boys who will get elementary training and one for the boys who have attended camp before which will be a more advanced form of training. Discipline will not be strict but, at the same time, it will be enforced. Some boys will be allowed in Town each night but they will all have to be in bed by a certain hour. S.W. Louder, the commanding officer of the Maritime Air Cadet Squadron will be the officer commanding the camp and has already arrived. The chief instructor is P.L. Ervase of the R.C.A.F. base at F.M.O. and the camp will be held at the R.C.A.F. base at F.M.O. Bennett of Moncton.

Prince County Berry Growers Plan Marketing

This year for the first time practically all strawberries grown in the Summerside area will be marketed through a central agency, the Prince County Berry Growers Association, which was organized last fall. Most Summerside stores have agreed to make their purchases from the association. All growers deliver their berries to the plant of the Polar Quick Freeze Co. Ltd., which is used as a central warehouse. Deliveries are made from the Polar plants to the stores as required. If there is any surplus of berries it is marketed through the association and marketed during the winter months. The association has made arrangements to keep the local market supplied and on any surplus berries there could be a shortage berries to be obtained from the Charlottetown Exchange. It is not anticipated that there will be a surplus of berries in the local market can absorb. Each box is stamped with the name of the Prince County Berry Growers Association. Details of the berries to be marketed by the grower can be obtained from the Charlottetown Exchange. Mr. George Smith is president of the association, and Allison MacLean is secretary-treasurer.

Deep sympathy is expressed to her husband and to her only surviving sister, Mrs. John A. Wilson, of Charlottetown. The funeral was held from her late residence Tuesday at 2:30 p.m. Burial was in St. Peter's Cemetery.
