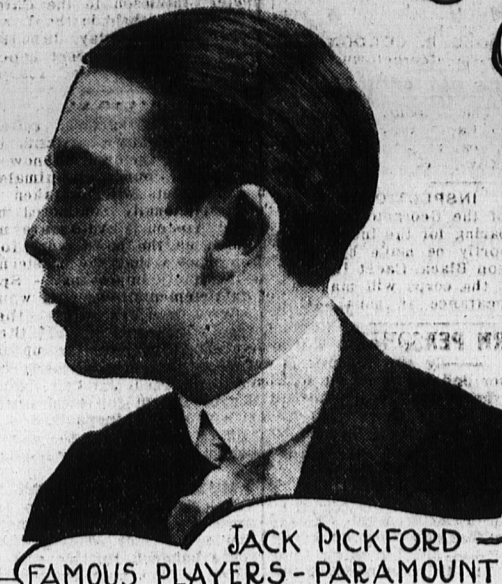

REPLY TO LAW SOCIETY ADDRESS

His Lordship replied as follows: Mr. President, Mr. Secretary-Treasurer and members of the Law Society of Prince Edward Island:

You asked me through your President if I would be pleased to accept an address I was not prepared to give an answer then, because I did not know just what the address would say. I may tell you now, having heard the address read and having seen in what form it is prepared, I am more than pleased to receive such an address. I appreciate very highly indeed more highly than I can express—the kindly thought that has induced your gentlemen of the Bar to thus so favourably calling attention to the honour which has recently been conferred upon me, and I speak from you all that consideration which should always be given to one accepting an office for which he has very much preparation to make before being able to adequately discharge its duties. I would like you to keep this in mind: I say no more upon that point, I felt, at a meeting of the Law Society held some time ago, when the Judges of the Supreme Court were all present, that it was a step in the right direction, and that it was a step that should be followed up continuously—of having a continuous good understanding maintained between the Bench and every member of the Bar. The members of the Bar should all bear in mind that some day they may have the responsibility and care that devolves upon an occupant of the Bench, and the members of the Bench should remember that every member of the Bar has, like the soldiers of Napoleon, a Judge's baton in his sack. I need say no more to you, gentlemen. If I would say more it would be merely to repeat an expression of my appreciation of the kindness that has moved you to your course today.

Having finished his addresses to the Grand Jury and the Law Society the Court adjourned to 4 p. m. when the Grand Jury submitted their report as follows:—

GRAND JURY'S REPORT.

To His Honour the Honorable John A. Mathieson, Chief Justice and Associate Judges of the Supreme Court.

May it please your Lordship:—

We, the Grand Jury for the County of Queen's, beg to report as follows: In the case of James Henry Weeks we find a true bill.

In the case of John W. Stewart we find a true bill.

We have the honor to report that we visited Falconwood Asylum, the Infirmary and Queen's County Jail and Tubercular Hospital. In Falconwood Hospital we found everything in a good condition. We visited the patients in the various wards and found them comfortably situated, their rooms sanitary and everything spotlessly clean. We inspected meat and bread and general stores and found same to be of good quality.

We next visited the Queen's County Jail and found ten prisoners confined therein principally for minor offences.

All arrangements were found to be clean and sanitary. The Jury would recommend that prisoners be given some outdoor employment, say work on the Experimental Farm.

We found the Infirmary to be clean and well managed. We have learned with great regret of the death of Dr. E. S. Blanchard, Medical Superintendent, of Falconwood Hospital, whose loss will be greatly felt, and we beg to tender to his family our most respectful sympathy.

ADDRESS TO CHIEF JUSTICE The Grand Jury also submitted the following address of congratulation to the new Chief Justice:

Grand Jury Room, June 26, 1917. Hon. John A. Mathieson, Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island:

May it please your Lordship:

We, the Grand Jurors of Queen's County herewith assembled, beg to offer to your Lordship our most sincere congratulations upon your accession to the highest position of honor in the Judiciary of this province. Knowing your Lordship's high reputation of learning in the law and zeal in the performance of all public duties we are well assured that you will bring to your new duties as Chief Justice the same high qualities as have hitherto distinguished you in all your public undertakings.

We hope you may be long spared to continue to do valuable service in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the people.

We feel sure you will fill the honorable position with dignity and ability and that you will be a worthy successor to the late Chief Justice, Sir Wilfrid Sullivan, just retired, who occupied this position with such universal satisfaction and dignity par excellence.

REPLY TO GRAND JURY.

Mr. Foreman and Gentlemen of the Grand Jury:

I thank you, first for the attention which you have given to your duties and for the very satisfactory way in which you have reported upon the public institutions. The suggestions you have made with regard to the employment of prisoners will, I am sure, receive special consideration. Touching upon the address with which you have been so kind as to present me, I may say that it gives me not only the greatest satisfaction in the present, but also a great deal more confidence for the future. I thank you very much indeed for what you have said, and now, in dismissing you from further attendance to the Court, I would say, inasmuch as you have each individually signed this address, I will have the best remembrance of it. I again thank you for your attendance and the most satisfactory way in which you have discharged your duties.

In the case of Samuel Morrison charged with larceny of foxes and which case was held over from the January term, the Attorney General directed the Clerk of the Crown to stay proceedings in view of the absence of some of the principal witnesses. The prisoner was accordingly discharged.

Mr. J. D. Stewart, moved that the prisoner Weeks be arraigned on the charge of stealing 22 bags of flour from J. A. Parquharson & Co.

Prisoner pleaded guilty. John N. Stewart on the charge of receiving stolen goods—knowing same to have been stolen pleaded not guilty.

Prisoner said he would be ready for trial on Tuesday.

Mr. C. G. Duffy appeared for prisoner and asked that the same bail be allowed.

His Lordship said further bail would be given as follows: The prisoner himself in the sum of \$1,000 and two sureties in \$500 each, non.

Jury Debt or Damages. Bank of Montreal vs. F. A. Hall and ano. Judgment for plaintiff for \$167.25.

Alex. Horne and ano. vs. Allan Livingston. Judgment was confessed by defendant for \$211.08.

There are seven jury cases to be tried and three trespass and ejectment cases.

The Court adjourned to this morning at 11 a. m.

IN MEMORIAM

WILLIAM McDONALD.

There passed peacefully away at Priest Pond on Sunday, June 3rd, Mr. William McDonald, after an illness of only two days, of peritonitis.

Mr. McDonald was born at Lot 48 sixty-five years ago, the son of John J. McDonald and Christina McCallum and settled at Priest Pond in the early seventies, marrying Margaret McEachern, who survives him.
