EVANGELINE TO BE SOLD.—It is expected that the steamship Evangeline will be sold soon, a deposit having been made by a Boston concern representing the prospective purchasers. It is said the asking price was \$600,000. The Evangeline was built at Glasgow in 1912 for the Plant Line service between Boston, Halifax and Charlottetown. She is of 4,360 tons gross, with large accommodations for passengers. Last summer she carried a cargo from Boston to Manchester, and upon her return was laid up at Boston. The Plant Line service to Halifax was suspended with the sailing from Boston Thursday evening, Dec. 28, of the steamer Halifax, and the steamer will be extensively repaired before being put in commission next March. P. H. Chipman, of Boston, will superintend the work on the Halifax.

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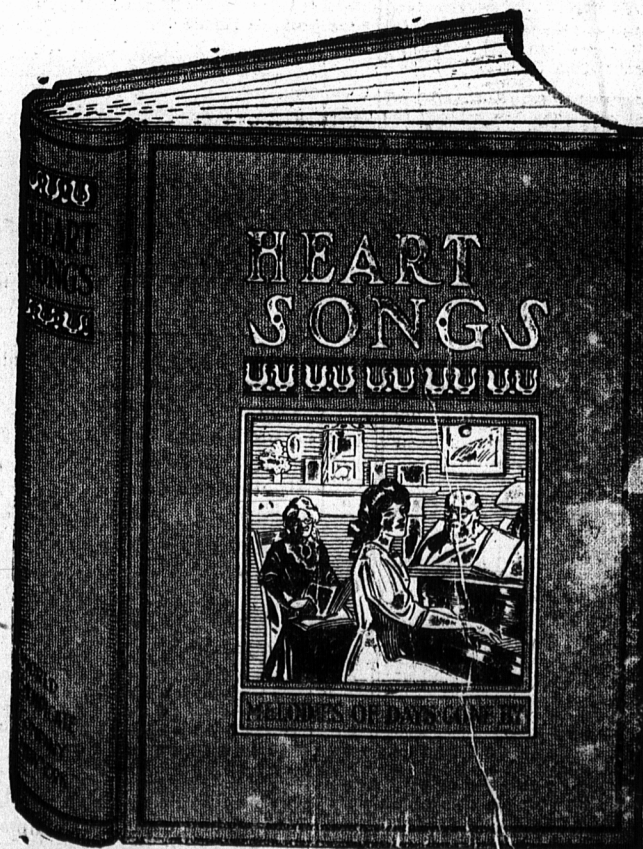
