INHERITANCE TAX MAY SOLVE BONUS PROBLEM

The struggle over the question of how to raise the funds to meet the proposed bonus for the United States war veterans, has caused a good many members of Congress to give serious thought to the inheritance tax, along with a tax on gifts calculated to prevent evasion of the inheritance tax.

This has led to a study of the British inheritance taxes, and it is found that if Congress should impose rates on estates on the same basis as the British rates, it would be possible through this source to raise about \$750,000,000.

The British government raises \$23,000,000 in this manner from estates, which in the aggregate are far below the value of the estates in the United States which would be subject to this tax.

Advocates of the inheritance tax say it could be imposed without hardship, and without serious political protest. It is pointed out that there is little evidence of public opposition in the United Kingdom

to the inheritance tax, whatever may be the feeling toward it of a small percentage of the wealthy.

Shelby Sales Tax
President Harding's recent declaration that the bonus question had been shelved unless the money is raised through a sales tax has met with a mixed reception.

In spite of Mr. Harding's recommendation, and a great deal of talk, many from advocating of the sales tax to the effect that it works well in Canada, it is distinctly unpopular with many legislators in Washington and is bitterly opposed by the farmers and the laboring men. It is doubtful if a sales tax can be forced through, and if it were, it would undoubtedly prove hurtful to the party in power.

Talk is current of an alliance of the farmer, labor and Democrats in Congress to drive through an inheritance tax. Representative Ramseyer of Iowa, has introduced a comprehensive bill under which the rates on estates would range from 1 per cent on estates above \$20,000 to 10 per cent above \$100,000. Any such plan is sure to encounter bitter opposition from the eastern states which have the greatest wealth.

With the majority of the voters, it would be popular. Unless a practical plan is soon found or meeting the bonus question which may be shelved but will not down, it is not unlikely a determined drive will be made to force the inheritance tax through.

In time of course, that under present law there is a mild estate or inheritance tax in the United States, but what is now proposed is a tax of such proportions that it would actually have important effect in leading to hold down great family fortunes.
