STUDENT OF LAW.—In the Supreme Court yesterday, Mr. J. Johnson, K. C., made application to their Lordships Chief Justice Sullivan and Justices Fitzgerald and Haszard for the admission of Mr. Gerald McCarthy as a student of law. Mr. McCarthy is a graduate of La Valle, Quebec, and holds the degree of B. A., which exempts him from the customary examination of admission. His application was granted. He will study with Messrs. Johnson and Inman.

RURAL DELIVERY SYSTEM.—The rural free delivery mail system is being gradually extended over the whole Island. It is estimated in reliable quarters that now fully three-fourths of the province is covered by this system, owing to the extension of which twenty-one more branch post-offices in various parts of the Island were closed during last month. It is not only in this province that the rural delivery method is being developed but all through the Dominion, and it is a system that has been found to work far more satisfactorily than that which it replaces.

SOME FOUNDATION.—There seems to have been some ground for the fear entertained by the trustees of the P. E. Island Hospital concerning the intention of the civic authorities to erect a stone crushing plant in the railway grounds in front of the hospital. Councillor Campbell, Chairman of the Street Committee, had such a work in contemplation and had discussed it with several citizens. That the project has been abandoned, as stated in yesterday's Guardian, will meet with the approval of citizens generally and will greatly relieve the minds of friends of the hospital to the patients in which such a plant would be an intolerable nuisance.

LOBSTER CONSERVATION.—An informal meeting of lobster packers was held yesterday in the Board of Trade rooms, Charlottetown, when the matter of the conservation of the Lobster fisheries was discussed at length, and a committee was appointed to enquire into the best methods of attaining complete conservation, and perpetuating this valuable asset, which is steadily being depleted. The committee comprise the following well-known lobstermen: Mr. John McLean, of St. John's; Mr. John Agnew, of St. John's; Mr. R. N. Cox, of Morrell and Messrs. H. W. Longworth and J. J. Hornby, of Charlottetown. A general meeting of lobster packers is to be called at some date later.

MR. LLOYD GEORGE IN THIRD OF SPEECHES

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George in the third of his speeches in his onslaught on landlordism speaking at Middleboro Saturday evening outlined the Government's policy as affecting towns.

Mr. Lloyd George said it was proposed to organize a complete national survey of housing accommodation including an inventory of all slums and unsanitary streets and districts lacking cheap and quick transit facilities. The Government intends to empower the municipalities to acquire land at its real market value and also to reform the household system and put an end to unjust rating assessments.

IN DRY DOCK.—The Norwegian steamer Bjorgvin, which recently ran aground on Indian Rocks and was re-floated only after a good portion of her cargo of lumber had been jettisoned, is now undergoing repairs in dry dock at Halifax.

Mr. R. McLellan, of the Sydney Mines, is at present in Charlottetown on his wedding tour. He is the owner of the famous horse Da Sharper which broke the record 2.194 trot at Halifax this fall, and about the identity of which there was a good deal of mystery.

GREATER PROFITS IN LAMB.—A decline in the markets of the Dominion and the United States for lamb and sheep, and the removal of the import duty of the States on those articles open up a vista of higher prices and greater profits for the lamb and sheep producers of the province. Having visited the districts of Coleman, West Devon and Bloomfield recently, Mr. W. J. A. Reid, instructor in Animal Husbandry, reports that the lamb crop that was being disposed of then in those sections was of first-class condition, except in the matter of weight, in which regard, owing to the wet weather of the past month, there had been a considerable drop in comparison with last year. The prices being obtained for lamb now, he said, are the highest on record, the reasons accountable being those stated above. It is to be hoped that live-stock breeders will take advantage of the opportunity before them in this respect.

FIRE THREATENED TO WIPE OUT NIPIGON

NIPIGON, Nov. 10.—Fire of mysterious origin menaced the whole of this village, which is sixty miles east of Fort William, Saturday night, and before it was brought under the control of the volunteer village fire fighters and Port Arthur firemen and equipment, which was rushed to the village on a special train, \$80,000 property loss had been sustained and a considerable section of the business centre wiped out. It is generally admitted that but for a shift in the direction of the fifty-mile wind which prevailed along the north shore for nearly forty-eight hours, the entire village would have been wiped out. Flames were leaping towards the International Hotel and the Hudson's Bay store when the gale changed its direction.

The burned block and business establishments were as follows:—Eberst & Dowler Block, M. Nikkin, clothing; Atwill Block, J. Atwill, bakery, pool-room and residence; Sulo Block, D. Rosenthal, clothing; M. Nikkin, barber shop; J. Goodridge, restaurant; J. Fournier, barber shop; McKirdy, general store and residence.

Wm. McKirdy estimates his loss at \$45,000, protected to the extent of \$14,000 by insurance. The fire started at 8.30 last night and continued until 12.30 this morning.

The fire was discovered in a clothing store, and swept west as far as the International Hotel. The business places burned included "three stores, two restaurants, three barber shops, two poolrooms, and two butcher shops. CARRIED EAR IN HIS HANKERCHIEF

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 10.—When Joseph Romaine was taken to the western hospital in the ambulance yesterday afternoon, he carried with him his right ear wrapped in a pocket handkerchief. Shortly after his admission to the institution when the doctors found that the loss of an ear was the only injury sustained in his fall from a scaffold, they sewed the member on its accustomed place. It is thought that the ear will be as good as ever. The ear was cut cleanly from the head when Romaine, in his fall, struck a guy wire.

ADVICE TO NEWFOUNDLAND

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The Times this morning, in an interesting column and a half special article on St. John's, Newfoundland, refers to the election issue there as being mainly one of railway extension, and adds: "There is no traveller who has ever visited Newfoundland but will hope that the issue may include improvement of the existing line. There is no denying that St. John's is difficult to approach, and its historic harbor is frequently closed by fog. Coming by land one finds that the railway a great engineer laid twenty years ago across a desert now means an adventure of excitement rather than rapid and easy motion. "No one, they tell at St. John's, has ever been actually killed, still it is no place for nervous invalids to travel." The article further deals with the Branch, Devonians and the modern city.

MONTREAL, Nov. 10.—At a meeting of the directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, held today, a dividend of two and one half per cent. on the common stock for the quarter ended September 30 last, being at the rate of 7 per cent. per annum from revenue and 3 per cent. per annum from interest on the proceeds of land sales, and from other extraneous assets, was declared, payable January 2 next to shareholders of record at 3 p.m. December 1 next.

BRITAIN WILL TAKE NO PART WITH MEXICO

LONDON, Nov. 10.—(Through Reuters Ottawa Agency)—The Guild Hall mayoralty banquet to-night was attended by the usual brilliant company. Right Hon. Winston Churchill, re-

plying to the toast of the "Imperial forces," said that Great Britain would have a force of 150,000 sailors and marines, the largest on record. General French expressed satisfaction at the presence of so many officers of the Dominions at the autumn army manoeuvres. This, he said, attested to the growth in efficiency and strength of the overseas portion of the imperial army.

The Right Hon. Herbert Asquith, prime minister, was heartily cheered as he rose to reply to the toast of reviewing the year he passed to a consideration of Mexican affairs.

"Mexico," said the prime minister, "was still in the throes of civil war. There never had been and could not be, any question or political intervention on the part of Great Britain in the domestic concerns of Mexico or any Central or South American state. It was no part of Great Britain's right or duty, in that part of the world, to attempt to preclude or control civil war. The utmost that Great Britain could do was to give what protection might be possible to British lives and property in times of urgent danger and crisis. The ru-
