FARMERS INSTITUTE.—On Wednesday evening, February 2nd, an agricultural meeting was held in the Hall at Murray Harbour for the purpose of organizing a Farmers' Institute. It was attended by Hon. Murdoch McKinnon, Commissioner, and by Professor Ross. Thirty-three farmers signified their desire to form an Institute and organization was very soon completed. David Brooks being appointed president, George Beck vice-president and H. G. Bennett secretary. The Commissioner then addressed the institute, pointing out the benefits of co-operation and spoke of the Short Course and of the Seed Fair to be held week after next in Murray River. Professor Ross spoke briefly on Institute work and the meeting adjourned. The Murray Harbour Farmers' Institute will hold weekly meetings during the winter, the first of which will be on Saturday evening, February 12th, at 7.30 o'clock.

WOMAN'S INSTITUTE.—The following meeting of the Meadow-Bank Women's Institute, which met at the home of Mrs. Freeland, on February 1st, took the form of a very pleasant social gathering. The following is the estimate of P. E. Island contributions to the various Patriotic and Charitable funds in connection with the war, which has been compiled by the Agricultural Department:

APPLE SNOW.—Cook peeled apples until soft in a thin syrup to cover them, and then rub through a sieve; there should be a pint of the pulp.
