

More P. E. I. Strawberries To Boston By Plane

Two more plane loads of fresh strawberries consigned by the Mount Stewart Strawberry Exchange, left the local airport yesterday for Boston, Mass. The first plane with a gross load of 8,000 pounds left Charlottetown at 4:30 p.m. and the second, with a similar load, took to the air at 9 p.m. Both loads were consigned to the Moses W. Alger Fruit Company.

Want Berries Ripened

It was learned yesterday that while the Boston buyers are pleased to be able to get those berries from the Province, they are not altogether satisfied with the quality. Their chief complaint was that the fruit is not sufficiently ripened. It is understood they informed the representatives of the Exchange who accompanied both loads on Wednesday that the three and a half hour trip from Charlottetown to Boston is negligible so far as affecting the ripeness of the berries is concerned, and that they would like further shipments to be in a more ripened condition.

Two more planes will be loaded today by the Mount Stewart Exchange for Boston. In the meantime, other growers are getting together with the object of supplying Boston with additional plane loads the first of the week. So far, the exports by plane have had no appreciable effect on the local market since strawberries were retailing yesterday at two boxes for 35 cents, and some house-to-house canvassers were selling them at 14 cents a box.

man to set out a summer trawl, took a puncheon of pickled fish—between 1,000 and 1,200 pounds of dressed fish—from 600 hooks.

Big Price Disparity

The price being paid by buyers to fishermen for cod "from the knife" is reported to be the same all along the North Shore—two and a half cents per pound. It is understood that many fishermen are complaining about the great disparity between the price they get and the price—ranging between 32 cents and 36 cents—which the consumer pays for a pound of boness cod.

Another reason which they give to justify their dissatisfaction at the prevailing price is that the Danish and Norwegian fishing fleets have not taken more than half the quantity of fish this season that they had taken for the corresponding period of 1947.

Filling Silo At Experimental Farm

The local Dominion Experimental Farm began filling its silo yesterday but not with the usual fodder corn. Instead, it is using grass and clover composed of red clover, alfalfa, and alfalfa.

Thirty pounds of molasses per ton of grass and clover is being added to assist in the process of fermentation.

Mr. R.C. Parent, superintendent of the Farm, said that the yield of two acres of clover, which was cut at the Farm yesterday, was 26 tons, or about three tons of cured hay to the acre. Mr. Parent said that while this is a good crop it is not unusual this year and that many farmers in the Province have as good a growth.

Work Completed On Exterior Of Church Buildings

This work is not expected to commence before the middle of August. The repainting and re-decorating of the Church will be carried out by the firm of Weeks and Langille, local painters and decorators.
