THREW PIEPER IN POLICEMAN'S FACE

LAWRENCE, Feb. 27—No attempt to export children will be made as had been planned, according to a statement made by the textile strike committee of the industrial workers of the world. This decision was reached in view of the possibility of a congressional investigation and the fact that the cases of the mothers and children arrested Saturday morning when an unsuccessful effort was made to send a party of children to Philadelphia had not been disposed of by the court.

As an aftermath of one of the most riotous days since the inception of the strike seven weeks ago, the late last night, Judge J. J. Mahoney, the presiding justice, heard 68 cases, the majority of which had a direct bearing on the strike situation. Only jail sentence was meted out. This was imposed upon Julia Yulka, who was charged with throwing paper in the face of Patrolman O'Brien. The others were fined from \$3 to \$10 each.

TIMBER WOLVES HUNT A CONSTABLE

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., Feb. 27—A pack of timber wolves gum-shoe a man for over a mile, not so far from the wilds as paved streets and electric lights would lead one to suppose. And then, it is no pleasant experience for the man. In this case, it happened to Constable Stringer, who on Wednesday was on his way to Rowan, came on a pack of five wolves in a rock cut. They were fighting over the remains of a rabbit. Immediately they saw him, and hopped up over the rocks out of sight.

The constable chased them and found the five snuggled into the snow and watching him. He took a couple of shots at them, "but I might as well have thrown stones as use the little gun I had," he explained, in relating the experience.

Continuing his journey, he felt that they were watching him, and every now and then he could see a gray form slinking through the brush on each side, just a little ahead. Just before reaching Rowan he had to cross a huge trestle and there they came in sight again. He made the section man's shack in safety, but took good care to travel back in day light. Hunger and darkness will do much to heighten the courage of the wolves.

It is said that the animals are more numerous in that neighborhood this year than they have been for a long time. They prey on the red deer, catching them as the blind-legged frightened creatures flounder through the deep snow.

HAD HIGH LIFE DIED FROM WANT.

PARIS, Feb. 27—A party who has just returned from Munich tells a story of the last days of Helen Racowitz, the beautiful and romantic admirer of the socialist Lassalle.

It may be remembered that Helen Racowitz, after a life of splendor, adventure and notoriety, died in the greatest poverty towards the close of last year. So poor was she that there was no money forthcoming for her burial, and, in accordance with custom, the authorities agreed that the body of this former playmate of a Bavarian King, should be handed over to the faculty of medicine. Only a day beforehand, however, a registered letter came addressed to "Frau von Schevitch." Frau von Schevitch was "Helen Racowitz's" last name, coming from her third marriage. Von Schevitch had died some years before, more from starvation than from any other cause.

The letter was from Siegwart Kreiman, the second husband of Helen Racowitz, from whom she was divorced. In her last moments of despair she had written to implore him to help her, and here in the envelope was a handsome cheque—too late to be of any use to her, but too late to save her emaciated corpse from the scalpel of the anatomy class. Thanks to this cheque she received a decent burial.

SCOTTISH RITERS SHOW SYMPATHY.

LONDON, Ont., Feb. 26—The Toronto and Hamilton Scottish Ritters, whose special train struck and killed a milkman named Drake, his sister-in-law and the latter's baby, a few miles east of here, have contributed a purse of \$3,000 to the relatives of the victims.

CHICAGO PACKERS MET TO FIX PRICES.

CHICAGO, Feb. 27—Evidence that nine of the ten defendants met every Tuesday afternoon between 1907 and 1910 behind closed doors in the directors room of the National Packing Company was given by two witnesses in the packers trial today.

The defendants charged with attending these secret meetings are: J. Ogden Armour, Arthur Meeker, Thomas F. Connors, Edward Morris, Louis F. Swift, Edward F. Swift, Charles H. Swift, and Edward Tilden.

Francis A. Fowler was the only defendant the witnesses were unable to identify as having attended the Tuesday afternoon sessions. The government contends that it was at these meetings that the indicted packers or their representatives exchanged information in regard to their business and agreed upon shipments, selling prices, margins and a division of territory in violation of the criminal section of the Sherman Act.

BIG INTERNATIONAL CARNIVAL ON TAPIS.

SARANAC LAKE, N. Y., Feb. 27—Arrangements are being made for an international carnival of winter sports, with Canada and the United States as the contestants, to be held early next year. Skiing and skating competitions will be held, but the main events will be toboggan and bobbed races, the winners of which will be sent complete for the world's championship.
