R. pen no. 6 led the contest for the week with 55 eggs. 51.3 points; Mr. Charles MacKenzie's W.L. pen 1 were second with 49 eggs 39.7 points; The Experimental Farm Charlottetown, W.L. pen 4, were third with 46 eggs 38.1 points, and the K.B.C. Hatchery, B.R. pen 10 were fourth with 36 eggs. 36.2 points.

The total number laid for the week was 531 eggs besides 34 which were disqualified for being under weight.

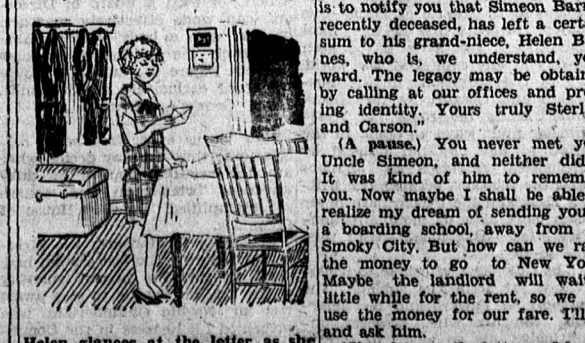
