trust will assist us in celebrating the 50th anniversary at the beginning of the new year.

With much regret we have heard recently of the death of the founder of the Young Men's Christian Association, Sir George Williams, London, England. His body lies in St. Paul's Cathedral close by the spot where in 1844 he formed the first Young Men's Christian Association of a dozen dry goods clerks for prayer and praise, and the study of the Scriptures. From his early days to his death, George Williams gave one third of his income to Y. M. C. A. work, and lived to see millions of men enrolled in the work throughout the civilized world. The minute the Young Men's Christian Associations depart from the foundation of prayer and praise, that moment its great influence among men must decline. In our own association death has claimed L. Beer, a former president, Chris McLean, assistant boys' secretary and G. H. Hensard during the year.

We are pleased to be able to report that all current expenses of the year have been met. The directors have thought that the celebration of the half century a suitable occasion to present to the young men of this city and province the Y. M. C. A. building free of debt. A number of citizens have already intimated that they will give liberal donations towards this end. It is therefore with grateful hearts that we thank God, and take courage as we enter upon a new year.

In the religious department 17 men's meetings were held on Sunday afternoons with an average attendance of 105. 20 mixed meetings were held with an average of 136. The open air Gospel meetings during the summer months in Victoria Park were a marked success. These services were addressed by different clergymen of the city and had an average attendance of 300 people. The Military Camp Services conducted by the laymen and clergy of the city at Camp Brighton were well attended by the volunteers in camp. Nine services were held with an average attendance of 150. The reading tent supplied with magazines and writing

materials, games etc, was well patronized and highly appreciated by the soldier boys.

We were privileged to have with us from the 14th to 17th of Sept the 35th Maritime Convention of Y. M. C. A. workers. The convention was an exceedingly strong one, and we had with us several members of the International Committee. This convention composed chiefly of consecrated business men, has been a decided uplift to the workers of our own Association.

Our well equipped reading room and library has been well patronized. 2190 books have been used by members and a number of volumes added.

During the visit of H. M. S. Warships this fall, the sailors gave a concert in benefit of Y. M. C. A. which netted \$127.00.

Herbert Moule, General Secretary for one year of our Association resigned his position Aug 20th and has since secured a position on the staff of the Montreal Association.

L. W. Archibald our present General Secretary came to us Aug 20th, a young man who has had thirteen years experience in various phases of the Y. M. C. A. work. We bespeak for him the generous support and good will of all members and the public in general.

This season's gymnasium classes are very largely attended, and the prospects for an active season's work exceedingly encouraging. Association Hall which is also used as our gymnasium has been thoroughly renovated and improved.

The old seats have been replaced by new chairs and the hall lighted by electricity. New apparatus has been added to the gymnasium equipment. The room, formerly known as the parlor, has been set apart for the use of the boys as a reading and game room in the afternoons.

The boys' religious meetings were held on Sunday mornings at ten o'clock and were well attended. A large students' Bible class was conducted by the General Secretary; a Mock Parliament session was held during the winter months and was enjoyed by a number of members and citizens.

The Ladies Auxiliary has been, and is now, a tower of strength to our Association. They have not only helped greatly in the social side of our work but have collected in the vicinity of \$300.00 during the past year, and have pledged themselves to raise this amount to five hundred dollars as their contribution towards wiping off the mortgage debt upon our building.

To the clergy, the press and all our subscribers, we express our grateful thanks. We would say to all these, in the words of our Master, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren ye have done it unto me."—On behalf of Board of Directors, Yours faithfully

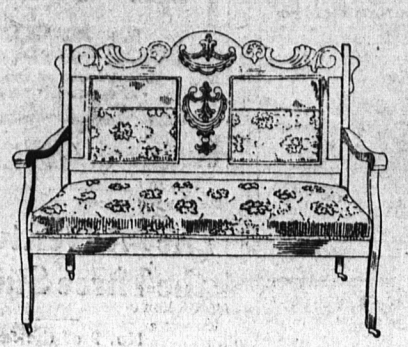

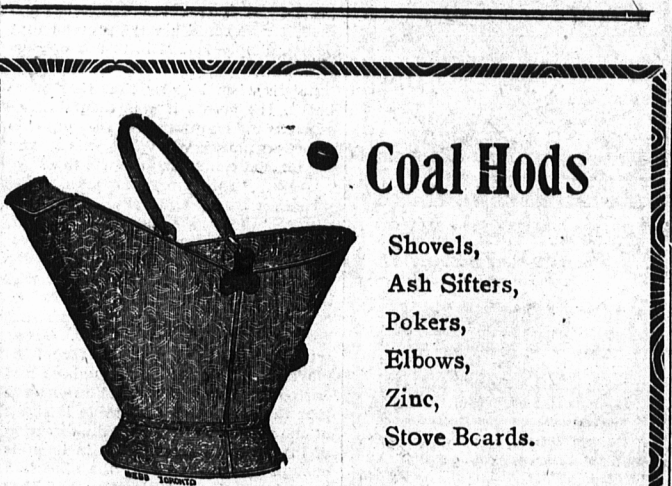
