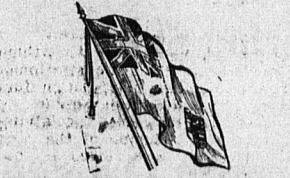

### CANADIAN DENTAL CORPS NOW READY

TORONTO, June 15.—The Canadian Army Dental Corps, the new branch of the service, organized primarily to keep in order the teeth of men who leave for the front, is now ready to begin work, and a dental clinic is to be organized at Niagara Camp to-day. The work at the camp is under the direction of Lieut. Guy Hume, D.D.S., of the C.A.D.C., who will organize the clinic and a staff of dental surgeons, some of whom will be given commissions in the new corps, and will begin work on the teeth of the men of the different units in order as they are likely to leave.

### FOR USE IN THE TRENCHES

With a new pocket periscope that has just been brought out in England it is possible for a soldier to look over the parapet of the trench without exposing himself to the fire of the enemy. The periscope is simple in construction, consisting of only two mirrors, connected by a collapsible framework. Both mirrors are fixed to the framework at an angle of 45 degrees. When the framework is extended and the upper mirror is raised above the trench, the view is reflected by the upper mirror down to the lower one, which reflects the light horizontally to the eyes of the observer. The June Popular Mechanics Magazine contains a picture of the device.

### MATINEE RACES HOTLY CONTESTED

The first of the series of matinee races to be held under the auspices of the Charlottetown Driving Club came off on the Exhibition grounds on Monday afternoon and was an unqualified success. The large number of fine horses that came on the track for races shows that P. E. Island still holds its foremost position for raising trotting horses. All the entries were from Charlottetown and vicinity. Perfect order was maintained throughout the afternoon and everyone enjoyed the sport and outing. The racing was of the most exciting kind, close finishes being the rule in every heat.

The first class started with the trot and pace with four starters. In this race Devilish Dorothy appeared, driven by her owner, the old veteran horseman, Dr. J. T. Jenkins. Hilda S. won the first heat by a length. Hilda also won the second heat but was driven stiffly out by the game trotter, Devilish Dorothy.

In class B trot only two starters came to the wire, the other two entries being scratched owing to having distemper. In the first heat the time was slow, Cap. Cresceus trailing to the half when he came to the rush driving Queen Alto to a break and going on winning the heat. The next two heats were easily won by Queen Alto.

Class C trot, with three starters, Picton S., Dry Cleaner, Upton Prince, was an exciting race, the first two fighting for first position all the way round in both heats. Dry Cleaner was on his good behavior and won out by a small margin in each heat.

In class B, pace three very evenly matched horses faced the starters, Derby, Moth Miller and Dixie Girl. Derby took the pole at the first turn and was never headed, though closely driven by the other two horses. The second heat was a neck and neck race between Moth Miller and Derby, Derby again winning, while the third event furnished the most excitement of the day, the three horses finishing in a bunch with the Derby still with his nose in front.

In class C, pace there were three starters, Commodore Wilkes, Belmont Miller, and Bonny Cap. In this race Belmont Miller was the favorite, but the little chestnut pacer Bonny Cap proved a surprise to the wise ones, going out and winning the first two heats. Belmont, however, won the final two rounds.

In the class D trot and pace Brazilian Tom, Patchen L. and Tipperary started. This race showed the uncertainty of the King of Sports, the first heat was easily won by Tipperary, Patchen L. second, and the spectators considered her an easy winner of the race. However, Brazilian Tom came out in the second heat and carried off the honors Tipperary being in third position. The third and deciding heat was again a surprise Patchen L. coming in and winning the first place and also the first money, having the best average.

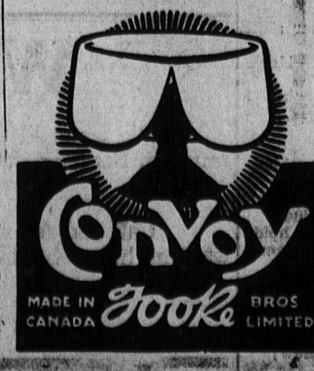

### MISS RUBY STEWART APPEARS IN COURT

(Special to the Guardian.)  
NEWTON, Mass., June 15th.—Miss Ruby H. Stewart, the beautiful young woman from Charlottetown, P.E.I., who on June 5 was shot by Chas. Warren, who at the time killed her employer, Walter G. Green, was able to leave the Newton Hospital, where she has been recovering from her wounds, and qualify as a witness in the murder case, which has shocked the entire section and the fashionable Newtons.

The Prince Edward Island girl appeared before Judge Sisk in the Middlesex Superior Court and entered into recognisance in the sum of \$500 for her appearance at the continued hearings as a witness. The pretty young woman was accompanied to Court by friends, who brought her in a high-powered auto, and who shielded her from newspaper reporters and photographers, the latter being instructed to get her picture at any cost. As far as is known they did not get a good snap of her, however. The friends who accompanied her went on her bond for the amount required. Miss Stewart plainly showed the ordeal through which she had passed. At the hospital it was said that her wounds quickly healed and that she suffered principally from shock.

Warren is not only under indictment for the murder of Green, but is also held for the attempted murder of Miss Stewart. The case will probably be postponed from time to time, and it may be weeks or even months before Warren goes on trial for his life. Warren will be taken to the Middlesex County Jail at East Cambridge, Mass., to await his trial, and the trial will be in the same court room where Chas. Tucker was found guilty of the murder of Mabel Paige in New England's greatest crime, and where Hattie LeBlanc, the little woman from the Canadian provinces, was tried for killing her employer's husband, Glover, the laundryman at Waltham, a few years ago, and acquitted. While Warren's trial will not prove as sensational as the Tucker or LeBlanc cases, it is thought nevertheless that it will attract widespread attention.

### SIR EDWARD GREY AT BUCHAREST TO INFLUENCE RUMANIA

NEW YORK, June 15.—A despatch from a staff correspondent in London to the American says: "Sir Edward Grey, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, who, according to official announcement, is taking a vacation to rest his eyes, is not likely to get much rest, it reports current in diplomatic circles here are based upon truth.

"It is said Sir Edward has gone to Bucharest to bring about the intervention of Roumania in the war on the side of the Allies, exactly in the same way that he went to Rome about Easter time to bring in Italy, although it was then announced he had 'gone fishing.' He landed a big fish on that visit, and is expected to be equally successful in his present venture.

"It is a safe prediction that in a week or so something will be heard from Roumania that will be pleasant news for the Allies."

### ARREST GERMAN RESERVISTS ON PERJURY CHARGES.

NEW YORK, June 11.—A Federal grand jury investigation to determine whether there was a conspiracy "to defraud the United States" in connection with the affidavits submitted by the German embassy to the State Department to prove that there were guns aboard the steamship Lusitana was begun here today by the Federal grand jury. It is specifically directed against Paul Koenig, also known as Stenler, who according to the Federal authorities, is the head of a secret service department maintained by the Hamburg-American Steamship Line.

The first result of the investigation was the arrest today for perjury of Gustave Stahl, a German reservist, who made one of the affidavits submitted to the embassy and who is alleged to be closely associated with Koenig. The warrant on which he was arrested alleges that he committed perjury in an investigation by the jury against "Paul Koenig, alias Stenler and others," under that section of the Penal Code which forbids to defraud the United States. He was taken into custody immediately upon the conclusion of his testimony, and sent to the Toms for lack of the \$10,000 bail demanded by the government.

Stahl, in his affidavit, which was made before a city notary public, swore that he visited the Lusitana on April 30, the day before she sailed and saw four guns on her deck concealed by leather covers. The repetition of this story, when he was called as a witness in the investigation of Koenig's activities, was the basis of the perjury charge. In addition to the statement by Dudley Field Malone, collector of the port, and by officials of the Cunard line, that the Lusitana was unarmed, the government authorities said tonight that they had evidence by which they would prove that Stahl was not on board the Lusitana, either on April 30, or any other day before the departure of the Lusitana on her fatal trip.

### WILL NOT SUBMIT TO CONSCRIPTION

LONDON, June 15.—In reply to the continual demand of a large part of the newspapers for conscription, a committee of the non-conscriptionists has been formed and is organizing what they called the "no conscription fellowship." The leaders of the new movement are mostly officials of the independent labor party of the allied union of democratic control. Their organization, they state, is "a fellowship or common council and action of the kind of the anti-slavery society, not prepared to bear arms in the event of conscription, whatever the penalties for refusing."

### GERMANS FLED FROM BRITISH

LONDON, June 15.—The Danish schooner Marie, which has arrived at Leith, reports that last Thursday, while on the passage from Christiansand, she was held up by a German submarine, forty miles off the Isle of May, Scotland. The crew of the schooner was ordered to their boats, and the Germans hoarded the Marie with the intention of setting fire to her, according to the story, but on the appearance of two British patrol boats the men returned to the submarine, which disappeared. A patrol boat towed the Marie to Leith.

### CHURCH UNION GOES TO CONGREGATIONS BY BIG MAJORITY

KINGSTON, Ont., June 9.—By an unprecedented vote of 368 to 74, the Presbyterian General Assembly agreed this afternoon to send the question of church union to the congregations and presbyteries. Great enthusiasm was manifested when this decision was announced. The return as compared with those of the last assembly, show a large gain for church union. The best vote secured at last year's assembly against union was 29 per cent., this year the "antis" got only 18.7 per cent. of the assembly on their side.

### WILL HOLD THE TRENCH

Rev. Dr. McLeod said: "We who represent the minority, like our brave Canadian soldiers, propose to hold the trench that has been committed to our keeping."

### DID NOT BELIEVE IN TRUCE

Rev. Dr. Herridge, the retiring moderator, said he did not believe in a truce. This war time was the best time to bring the question to an issue. He had started out on his tour of the Dominion last year as an opponent of union. That tour would have converted him. He had learned of churches which were a disgrace to Christendom where the ministers exalted on a mere pittance. Present congregations were not merely a waste of money but a waste of men. The decision was announced. The return movement would not destroy Presbyterianism; they would not only hold the trench but would advance to another trench. "We must think," he said, "of the possible larger unity of which this is but the precursor, for all the churches shall be one when God's hour strikes the world." (Loud applause.)

### Principal McKay, of Vancouver, in moving a resolution denouncing the political patronage system, said that there were old men in the church who ought to be expelled on account of their corrupt practices in politics and business.

### A resolution was also passed commending the progress of temperance in the western provinces and expressing regret that the governments in the east have not gone further in this direction.
