Wonders Of Travel Appeal To Youth

Boys and Girls From Maritimes on First Outing Find Much to Interest Them.

MONTREAL, Nov. 18.—"It is all very wonderful," was the consensus of opinion of two young misses and two lads who spent Sunday in Montreal as an interlude in their journey from their homes in the Maritime Provinces to Toronto where they are to participate in a Dominion-wide competition at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair against other boys and girls from Quebec, Ontario and the West. The quartette which reached here yesterday morning on the Ocean Limited represented boys and girls swine clubs of Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, who had won provincial honors in judging bacon hogs, and who will have an opportunity on Wednesday and Thursday of putting their opinion as judges in tests with similar groups.

Lottie Austen, of Skye Glen, and Annie Cameron of Mabou, were the Nova Scotia winners in recent competitions, capturing their honors in a contest which included 14 clubs, representing 285 boys and girls.

Harold Smith and Edmund Robertson, both of Pownal, were the Prince Edward Island winners, proving successful in a contest which included nine clubs with a membership of 250.

This morning the Ocean Limited will bring the New Brunswick winners, who proved to be the pick of 12 clubs with a membership of 270 boys and girls.

For Challenge Cup

At Toronto six girls and ten boys representing eight provinces will compete for the W. D. Robb Challenge Cup, presented by the vice-president of the Canadian National Railways, for the purpose of encouraging such clubs. All of these boys and girls are the guests of the Department of Colonization, Agriculture and Natural Resources of the railway the officials of which have done a great deal to further this movement as one calculated to serve a useful purpose in encouraging the breeding of select bacon hogs for the domestic and export market. The gathering at Toronto is regarded as possessing great educational advantages for these youths who are taken from their home environment and enabled to learn something of the size of the country and to meet their fellows from near and distant points.

The party which arrived here yesterday was accompanied by F. W. Walsh, Department of Agriculture, Truro, and A. W. Peterson, Charlottetown. They were met at Bonaventure Station by representatives of the Department of Colonization, Agriculture and Natural Resources and made their headquarters at the Queen's Hotel. During the day they visited points of interest in the city and on the island leaving on the night express for Toronto.

The enthusiasm of the boys and girls was marked. Each one was on his or her own first trip from home, and every item provided a new interest. On the train the mystery of the dining car proved most attractive, while the sleeper provided other problems of interest.

All showed themselves quite alert and capable and indicated that they are well trained in the life of the farm. Each was born on a farm and each comes from a large family, the four representing a total of 40 individuals in the combined families.

Mr. W. D. Robb will be in Toronto during the judging competition, and at the conclusion will present the challenge cup to the successful team.

Mr. H. F. McPhee To Carry Banner In 3rd Kings

The Convention of the Liberal-Conservative electors of the third district of Kings took place yesterday afternoon at Cardigan with a large and enthusiastic attendance all the polls but one being fully represented.

Mr. J. A. McLean of Dundas acted as convenor and called the meeting to order. Two names were put up for nomination, Mr. H. F. McPhee, Barrister of Charlottetown, moved by Mr. J. D. McLean and seconded by Mr. John F. Curran and Mr. Edward Cairns, Baldwin's Road, moved by Mr. John Corcoran, seconded by Mr. Peter McKenna.

Mr. Cairns on consideration of the fact that his name had only been before the people for a short time withdrew from the contest and moved that the nomination of Mr. McPhee be made unanimous.

This was seconded by Mr. Patrick Fogarty and carried unanimously. Mr. McPhee then addressed the convention and expressed his appreciation of the great honor conferred upon him in being called upon to represent the Cardigan district which in the past had been represented by men of much prominence and especially in filling the position vacated by the Hon. John A. MacDonald. Mr. McPhee was greeted with rounds of applause.

Hon. J. A. MacDonald being called upon gave a brief review of the Stewart administration showing how the promises made by them in coming before the people had been literally fulfilled. Mr. MacDonald in concluding warmly thanked the audience for the hearty support given him in the recent Federal election.

Mr. L. A. Hunter then addressed the meeting thanking the people for the support given him on his election and emphasized the great need of organization and co-operation at the present time.

The convention was brought to a close with three cheers for the candidate Mr. McPhee.

Ontario Boys Attract Attention At Royal Winter Fair

(Special to The Guardian.) TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 18.—Of the six girls and ten boys who have met here to test their skill as judges of bacon hogs at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair, Archie Campbell of Ilderton, Ont., has already established himself as the most prominent and that in the literal sense.

Archie is 15 years of age, tips the beam at 225 pounds and touches the scale at the six foot mark and is a real boy in every way, possessing a jolly smile. With Archie Campbell comes Chester Brown, also from Ilderton, and while Chester sizes well up to the youthful standard he is almost dwarfed into insignificance when the pair stand together and they are always together. The pair have been attracting much attention since they landed in Toronto. These boys are the Ontario representatives who are to compete with boys and girls from Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta in a judging and demonstration competition at the Royal Winter Fair.

The contest is to stimulate interest in the best type of bacon hog and is conducted under the auspices of the Department of Colonization, Agriculture and Natural Resources, Canadian National Railways, the director of which department is W. J. Black, is now in Toronto.

The company has maintained a keen interest in this work and through the Colonization Department has done a great deal to encourage the work of the Boys and Girls Swine Club throughout Canada. It has been the endeavor to interest farmers in raising and feeding which is the basis of the importance of the bacon hog in the industry. There is a wide market at home and abroad for good bacon so that a real service is being performed in directing the attention of the farmers to this very staple branch of their calling.

A notable feature this season has been the increased interest shown in these clubs by the girls of the Maritime Provinces, by the fact that in Manitoba, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia teams of girls won out over their boy competitors. To further encourage these Boys and Girls Swine Clubs of which there are several hundred throughout Canada, averaging from twenty to fifty members each the Canadian National Railways undertook to bring these boys and girls from their homes to Toronto in order to give them the educational opportunity which is offered at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair. It also enables these youthful travellers, whose ages range from fifteen to nineteen years, to see something of the extent of the Dominion and to rub shoulders with youths from other provinces. Mr. W. D. Robb, Vice-President, Canadian National Railways, will be in Toronto to see the final part of the special competition and will present the challenge cup which bears his name to the winning team.
