ROUMANIANS NOW HOLD EASTERN DANUBE FRONTIER

Germans and Bulgarians Thwarted in Their Efforts to Invade Eastern Roumania. Over Six Hundred Prisoners Taken by Russians Besides 500 Wagons of Foodstuffs and Forage.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—Official announcement is made by the Roumanian war office that attempts of the Germans and Bulgarians to invade eastern Roumania have been defeated and that the Roumanians are in possession of all the frontier east of the Danube, along which the attack was directed.

FRENCH MAKE FURTHER GAINS

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Sept. 6.—OFFICIAL COMMUNICATION.—SEVERE FIGHTING CONTINUES AT GHINCHY. Fifty more prisoners brought in today. Eighteen machine guns were captured or destroyed since Sunday by a corps of our first line. A large party of the enemy emerging on Courcellette was caught by our artillery to-day and scattered. Numerous hostile working parties came under our shell-fire and were dispersed. Enemy artillery was active against portions of our front near Thiépal near Arras and between the base Canal and Richbourg. We carried out a successful bombardment. Yesterday our aeroplanes continued their successful operations. One of our patrols consisting of four machines encountered and drove off an enemy patrol of eighteen machines. One of our machines is missing.

RUSSIAN INVASION OF AUSTRIA SUCCEEDS.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, Sept. 6.—The Roumanian invasion of Austria is being carried on with further success. After spirited fighting in the region of Borzeckel the Roumanians captured heights west of that point. The announcement follows: "On the northern and northeastern fronts after spirited fighting in the region of Borzeckel the heights to the west thereof were occupied by us. We captured four officers and one hundred and fifty men. "We possess all the Dobruja frontier (between Bulgaria and Roumania, east of the Danube). An attack south of Basard jik was repulsed. The battle continues on the remainder of the frontier. "The enemy bombarded Isalox and Calafat, on the banks of the Danube. "In an aerial attack on Constant (Kustendje) by three hydro aeroplanes bombs were dropped and several civilians, including children were wounded."

GERMAN TALK OF AN AERIAL VOYAGE ACROSS THE ATLANTIC

(Canadian Press Despatch.) CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 6.—Two "double" Zeppelins, unarmed and each with a carrying capacity of sixty tons, have been built in Germany to carry mail between Berlin and the United States according to statements here by Morris Epstein, agent of the German American Alliance, who returned from Europe yesterday. Epstein stated the Zeppelins had been christened "America" and "Deutschland." He was permitted to view them, he declared. The engines are powerfully equipped and they can make the aerial voyage between Berlin and New York in seventy-two hours.

RUSSIAN CAPTURE 4000 PRISONERS.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PETROGRAD, Sept. 6.—Russia troops yesterday captured a Teutonic fortified position in the region of the Lower Gorodnka, in the direction of Halicz Galicia, and drove the Austro-German troops towards the northwest, says the Russian official statement today. The number of prisoners taken in the fighting on the Lower Gorodnka the statement adds, so far amounts to 4,000 men, among whom were about 2,000 Germans.

STEAMER MONTREAL COLLIDED WITH WARSHIP

(Canadian Press Despatch.) MONTREAL, Sept. 6.—The C. P. R. steamship officials have received word that the freight steamer Montreal, from this port, was in collision with a British warship near the English Coast, but no great damage was done and the steamer is now docked at Gravesend.

NEW YORK STRIKE IS THREATENED.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—A strike seems imminent today on the elevated and subway lines operated by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company in Manhattan and the Bronx. Officials of the company and representatives of the amalgamated association of street and electric railway employees some time ago when a strike first threatened. But president Shonness' announcement late last night that the company would grant the union's demand indicated that today's meetings would fail to bring peace. Labor leaders asserted today that they would stick to their demands and predicted that a strike would be called within twenty-four hours if the company refused to make concessions. The contract which the employees' union wishes to have annulled binds the employees not to ask for advances in pay and improvement in working conditions other than those already granted to them.

AUSTRO HUNGARIANS RETIRING

(Special to the Guardian.) GENEVA, Sept. 6.—Austro-Hungarian troops continue to retire along the Moldava River in the south eastern part of Bukovina, before the Roumanians, according to telegrams received here from Austro-Hungarian headquarters. The text of the statement reads: "North of the Somme there was a violent artillery duel but no infantry actions. South of the Somme in the afternoon we successfully renewed our offensive and carried several German trenches south east of Belloy-En-Santre. In the course of vigorous infantry attacks against the village of Bery-En-Santarre we carried the greater part of the village and advanced as far as the southern projection of the park. Between Vermandovillers and Chilly there was especially stubborn fighting. We carried the northern portion of Vermandovillers as far as the road running from the village to Estree. Further to the south in the region between Chaules and Chilly we captured more trenches and pushed our first line as far as the outskirts of Chaules along the railway between Chaules and Roye. The number of prisoners captured during the day seems large but there is no definite information yet. On the right bank of the Meuse (Verdun front) cannonade was intense at the end of the day in Vaux Chaptre Wood section. On the rest of the front there was no heavy fighting."
