North River Bridge.

SIR,—That serious public attention should now be given to the question as to where the new steel bridge across the North River should be located must be apparent to all intelligent citizens. The matter demands prompt and full consideration; and there is no better medium for discussing the question than the columns of our leading papers. It is by no means necessary that correspondents should append their names to contributions on this subject, since it is a matter which is not to be regarded in the light of individual preference, so much as in that of the general public good. Personalities should be conspicuous for their entire absence from this discussion.

Let us, from the outset, consider for a moment what is the chief benefit derived from having a bridge across the North River? Is it merely to permit of intercourse between the inhabitants of the east side with those of the west on the upper portion of the river? This will surely not be claimed, for there is not a large measure of such intercourse at present, nor is there likely to be such in the future. In case there should be, however, it is clear that abundant facility for intercommunication of this kind is afforded at the head of the river.

But the real benefit of the bridge is in affording the western portion of P. E. Island, especially that portion lying south of the Bedeque Road, the means of carrying on business with Charlottetown, the commercial centre of our Province. We make the Bedeque Road a proper limit for the single and obvious reason that all persons residing north of that road have easy access to the Malpeque Road, which leads directly to the City and to all the great highways going east.

The large and wealthy class of farmers residing between West River and the Bedeque Road, and indeed, the people of the west generally, are constantly carrying on business with Charlottetown. Of these a large proportion are compelled by the present location of the bridge to travel seven miles further than they would have to do if the bridge were placed between Dockendorff's shore and Brighton; whilst the remaining part of the section we have defined is not called upon to travel one yard farther by the new route than by the old one. So far, therefore, as common justice and public convenience are concerned it is unquestionable that the new site proposed is the right one.

The question of comparative cost is the only one fairly deserving of consideration. To some the apparent width of the river at the new site may seem to present a serious difficulty. Let it be distinctly borne in mind, however, that the channel at the new site is not any wider than at the old site, and that the main arches of the new bridge would not be any longer or more expensive in the one case than in the other. Then the abutments at the proposed crossing would not involve a much larger outlay than those at the old bridge, if we take into the account the breakwaters needed to protect almost half the circumference of Poplar Island and the keeping in repair of the second bridge, which forms part of the roadway at the old site.

The argument of one of our correspondents that the present bridge was thought good enough by our ancestors is too amusing to be seriously discussed. Our ancestors thought tallow candles good enough for their day. They used reaping hooks, and built log houses. We do not see sufficient reasons for clinging to everything that was good enough for our grandfathers. The truth is that if those grand old men were living amid the advantages and advanced opportunities which we possess they would be ashamed of our tardiness in pushing forward into larger enterprises. They did nobly in their day, and we should make improvements worthy of the example they set before us.

It only needs hearty co-operation on the part of those who reside in the western sections of our Province to bring about the adoption of the new site. Generous contributions to aid the local Government in meeting the necessary outlay should be cheerfully made and every effort put forth to bring about the contemplated change. We should plan for future generations in this matter. Our Island is rapidly moving forward in commercial prosperity and strength. Let our public works be planned and carried out with a view to the greatest benefit to the greatest number and for the greatest length of time. It would be a serious blunder to continue in old ruts merely because we are in them or for the purpose of saving a few hundred dollars, whilst we lose thousands by our antiquated methods.
