Mr. Roter says many of the ranchers were agreeably surprised with the price offered for bright silvers and others keenly disappointed with the low price of dark or skins of good quality. Mr. Roter explained that the fashion just now, especially in New York, is a cape collar which can only be made of skins with a bright sheen and as it requires three skins to make a good cape for full silver and three quarter silver. The poorer quality skins which were only used for trimmings come into competition with other furs and have a very poor sale. Mr. Roter advises the colour is good as that is the important feature of the pelt market at the present time. Also to pelt early as the first sales will see the best prices. The rancher must forget about the very high prices that he has obtained in previous years but remember that the silver fox fur is still the best fur on the market and has more than held its own in the fur markets of the world and is one of the biggest money makers for the farmer at the present time. The farmer that decides to breed only the best silver foxes is going to make good; but the rancher who insists on sticking to the darker skins will go to the wall as each year sees a

CELLOPHANE IS SAME AS ARTIFICIAL SILK

As a result of the phenomenal growth in the use of this unique product one frequently hears the question "How is cellophane made?" Basically, cellophane is the same as artificial silk, differing from it only in the form it takes when it reaches the casting stage, where cellophane is cast in a sheet while the silk takes shape as fine threads. The chief ingredient, spruce wood pulp, is delivered in sheets to the fifth floor of the factory, where it is placed in a press and steeped in a solution of caustic soda. The resultant compound is reduced to a fluffy mass by a shredder on the fourth floor, and then "aged" in the next floor in covered containers. Passing to the second floor this aged alkali cellulose is mixed with a solution of caustic soda in a rotating barrel, where it changes to orange cellulose xanthate. On the first floor the xanthate is mixed with a solution of caustic soda to form an orange-colored liquid called viscose, which is then led to large storage tanks on the ground floor for ripening.

The casting operations begin by forcing the viscose under pressure into an acid bath, where it coagulates and forms a continuous film of material of the required thickness. A set of rollers carries the film through a washing and bleaching process and into a bath containing glycerol, which increases the pliability of the material. The film is then dried over heated rollers and emerges as cellophane in the form which has become so familiar to the public.

OPERATE TANDEM PROPELLERS NOW
RUSHVILLE, Mo., Nov. 29—An airplane motor that operates tandem propellers—spinning in opposite directions—has been developed by Charles L. Brown 37-year-old gasoline dealer whose hobby is aviation. Brown claims for his invention added power and elimination of "torque," the rotating force produced by engines which tends to pull planes off a straight line. Elimination of torque, he says, will reduce the probability of tail spins.

Payrolls Grow

The New South Wales Minister of Labor stated that returns had been received from 200 factories in the metropolitan and industrial areas of the State showing that 52,081 persons were employed at the end of August last, an increase of 865 compared with the previous month, and of 8344 compared with the end of December, 1932.

"The returns now received," said Dunningham, "indicate that there has been an increase of 9344 workers in the 200 principal factories since the present government came into power, and an increase of 14,332 or nearly 40 per cent compared with the last returns supplied during the regime of the Lang government."

KINGSFORD SMITH'S RECORDS

Trying out the new Lockheed-Altair monoplane with which he hopes to win the Centenary England-to-Australia air race, Sir Charles Kingsford Smith, the leading Australian aviator, flew from Melbourne to Sydney in 2 hours 23 minutes, or at the rate of 220 miles an hour. A few days later he flew non-stop from Melbourne to Perth (1915 miles) in 10 hours 26 minutes. From Perth he started on a flight to Sydney, 2175 miles, and accomplished the journey in 9 hours 32 minutes, attaining at times a speed of 270 miles an hour, and averaging 238 miles an hour.

These flights easily broke all Australian transcontinental records. At the time of writing there is anxiety as to whether Kingsford Smith will be allowed to start in the Centenary air race, because of the delay in issuing him the necessary official certificates. Australia's interest in the race depends in an important degree upon his taking his place amongst the competitors.

TIBET THEATRE SEASON ENDS

One of the most successful theatrical seasons in Tibet has just come to an end. The drama was composed of discussions and dialogues, a prologue being spoken by a narrator. The female parts were taken by boys, the male roles by monks. Nobles and monks traveled long distances on horseback to the monastery where the performances were given. ECLIPSE PLANS UNDER WAY

Dr. J. Jackson, His Majesty's Astronomer at the Cape, and Professor Brown of Capetown University, are searching for suitable sites in South Africa from which to observe the eclipse of the sun on October 1, 1940. American and British scientists are expected to visit that country to observe the eclipse, which will be visible along a belt of land 130 miles wide for an exceptionally long period. Conditions for observing it are expected to be the best in 30 years.

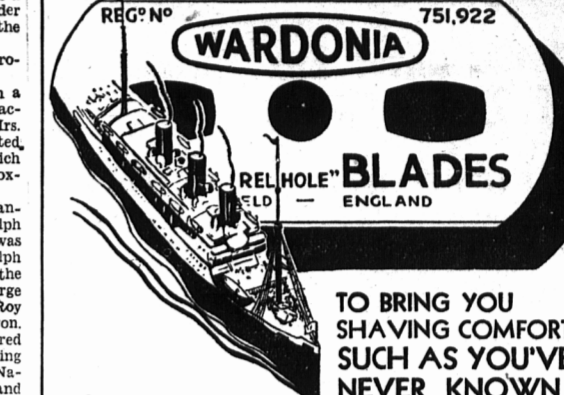
No fewer than 19,779,992 fruit and vegetable packages came under the inspection of the Dominion Fruit Branch for grading and marking during the year ended March 1934. Australian Fliers Cross Canada on Way to Australia

They expect to hop off from Vancouver to bias a trail from this point to the Antipodes. Their next stop will be Winnipeg, and there they will refuel for the treacherous flight over the Canadian Rockies. Captain Uim is a former holder of the flight record between those two points that was recently bettered in the England to Melbourne air race that was won by Scott and Black.
