At the annual meeting of the
 Charlottetown Teachers' Institute
 here Thursday, resolutions were
 passed commending the provin-
 cial department of education for
 granting second class teachers of 25
 years experience in first class status.
 It was suggested that commensurate
 recognition be given first
 class teachers of similar ex-
 perience.
 The executive of the Federation
 was urged to press further the
 movement to increase salaries,
 especially for rural teachers.
 It was resolved that the Depart-
 ment of Education be urged, in e-
 vent of curriculum changes to give
 more consideration to Island basic
 industries of agriculture and fish-
 ing. The department was also asked
 to consider the activity pro-
 gram for school leading to voca-
 tional training in optional sub-
 jects having a matriculation value.
 Approval was given of the city
 school board in providing refresh-
 er courses for teachers last spring.
 It was urged that these courses
 be continued.

FASHIONS
 Fashions change. After a man-
