GRAIN

WINNIPEG, Jan. 30 (CP)—Forecast of snow and rain throughout the United States grain belt induced nervous selling on Winnipeg grain exchange Saturday, leading to a decline in wheat futures from 1-2 cent losses and final quotations were 1-4-7-8 cent off, May 1 25 1-4; July 1 17 1-2-5-8 and October 99 3-8 cents.

Disappointment in demand for Canadian wheat and easier Liverpool prices sent buyers to the sidelines. Volume of trade for the day was small and export sales consisted of a few lots of No. 3 northern for shipment from Vancouver.

Although demand for cash wheats continued moderate, sales were light and mostly at unchanged prices. Apart from carload lots of oats and barley sold to domestic interests, coarse grain trading was negligible.

Oats closed 5-8 higher to 1-2 lower, barley 3-8 higher to 4 cents changed; flax and rye 1-4 cents lower.

PRODUCE PRICES

MONTREAL, Jan. 30 (CP)—Prices for butter, eggs and cheese ruled steady on Montreal open market last week while potatoes declined narrowly.

Butter was quoted at 32 1-4 cents a pound for carlots or less of No. 1 with lots to retailers at 33 cents. Graded egg shipments in carlots or less were 25 cents a dozen for A-large, 23 for A-medium, 21 for A-pulleys and 19-20 for B-large and B-medium storage.

Cheese was 14 1-2 cents for western current receipts and 15 1-2 for western summer makes.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30 (AP)—Financial markets hit the toboggan this week and efforts at a rally in Saturday's brief stock session failed to halt the slide.

In the concluding two hour proceedings rails took a turn for the better, along with an assortment of specialties, but steel and air-railroads sidled just before the close and wiped out most of the buying courage that manifested itself at the opening.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks for the day was off 2 of a point at 42, or just 4 above the 1937 low. On the week the composite was down 3 3/8 points, the most severe break since the latter part of November. Transfers amounting to 434,170 shares compared with 405,290 last Saturday.

There was little action among the Canadian stocks. Distillers-Seargrams, International Nickel, Walkers and Lake Shore, gained fractions, while McIntyre, Dome and Imperial Oil eased.

Steels on the final lap seemed a bit depressed by action of the U. S. Steel Corp. in inaugurating cuts in "white collar" salaries and hints, thus reviving the "share-the-work" plan in vogue during the worst of the depression. A slight dip in next week's mill operations was also forecast.

Mild inflation talk buoyed gold mines, with Dome and McIntyre touching new highs in the week.

MONTREAL, Jan. 30 (CP)—The stock market failed to establish a definite trend Saturday as prices mixed in dull trading.

Drawing much of the volume Dominion Steel B fluctuated in a narrow range, closing down 1-8 at 13 1-2. Dominion Bridge worked higher to 3 but United Steel so'd lower. In rails, fractional improvements came out for National Steel Car and C. P. R.

Stoops of as much as a point came out for Price Brothers, Bathurst and St. Lawrence Paper Preferred.

THE MODERN BATHROOM

This is an age of cleanliness, and whilst no one wishes to be a health fanatic, most people realize the wisdom of keeping one room in the house germ-proof, so that the children's cuts and scratches and minor accidents that attend every normal household may be attended to in safety.

The ideal place is, of course, the bathroom, where there are no dust-collecting curtains and rugs, and where walls and floor may easily be kept as clean and hygienic as a hospital ward.

Soap and water is really not enough to cleanse a bathroom thoroughly. A tablespoonful of disinfectant or the use of one of the many antiseptic soaps now on the market will ensure more than a mere superficial cleanliness.

Those housewives who object to the "hospital" smell of ordinary disinfectants will appreciate the new scented antiseptic cleaners. These inexpensive cleaners, in the form of a smooth paste, are delightfully scented with lavender or verbena and are guaranteed not to scratch the most delicate porcelain bath or enamel work.

It is most essential that tooth brushes should be kept entirely free from germ-laden dust and the usual practice of hanging them in the tooth-brush rack is quite useless and unhygienic.

Immediately after use, tooth-brushes should be placed in a glass of water to which a little

stretching-like-a-cat exercises.

Each routine, if done regularly and correctly, makes for long, trim lines. One is advised to stretch and stretch before getting out of bed in the morning, to throw back the blankets, then to fling arms upward, meanwhile trying to touch the foot of the bed with tips of toes.

Being human, mothers and fathers too are subject to change of humor from day to day. But when the pair are absolutely unpredictable as to mood, it makes

reliable antiseptic has been added.

This sterilizes them and does more to reduce those alarming dentist bills than most people realize.

Nailbrushes, too, need scrupulous care if they are to remain free from slime. They should be soaking for two hours in a quart of water to which a tablespoonful of salt has been added, and then hung in the air instead of being left in the soap dish.

A small screw eye in the handle and a loop of tape is quite an effective way of hanging brushes and if kept this way the wood will not rot, but will last as long as the bristles.

Sponges also last longer if they are hung in a net sponge bag, or suspended by a tape from a hook.

Borax is an excellent water softener, and a small bag of oatmeal placed in the toilet basin not only softens the water but is an excellent aid to the complexion.

Finally, a word about which no bathroom chest, without which no bathroom is complete. As it is unwise to keep it locked for cases of emergency, it should be hung high up on the wall out of reach of the children.
