He was a winner of a trotting race and was just nosed out in 2:11 1-4 at Fredericton by Harvest Melody. Now that he is going around and is in real shape he should cut quite a figure either on the ice or track.

Chester Smith, well known caretaker and driver, is training a stable for W. H. Copp, proprietor of the Strathcona Hotel, Fort St. John, N. B. Mr. Copp has disposed of Aylmer Worthy 2.15, that made such an improvement trotting last year, took a new record and was the contending horse in several events. He has passed into the ownership of Dr. L. Jenkins, Gagetown...

The latest addition to the Copp stables is the five-year-old trotter Camello 2.11 1-2. He has been bred in the purple and eligible to a 2.28 class. He is a fine big horse, with plenty of good looks, good legs, good feet and a good manner. He should not be surprised if the name of W. H. Copp figures in quite a number of summaries this season.

Another pacer in the Copp stables trained by Smith is Bill Bailey, a horse with tremendous energy. In fact so much that he is a bit difficult to control. His speed is terrific and when he gets into the track, he will make the slow class pacers in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island aware of his presence. Mr. Smith is interested in getting information as to Bill Bailey's breeding on his dam's side. He believes he is out of the same mare as Captain Jackson 2:15 1-2. Perhaps some of our readers can supply particulars.

A four-year-old mare by Clover Guy 2:07 1-2, out of a well-bred dam, has manners and speed and will be quite a number of events this summer is also in the ownership of Mr. Copp, while the fourth member of the stable roster is what is known as a "dark horse." No name is being divulged at present, but the boys around Port George and for many miles, are anxious to learn his identity. He has all the earmarks of some of the above it looks like a very good year for the Copp stable. Mr. Copp has been a most welcome addition to the ranks of race owners and we wish him the best of luck.

Island Skaters To Take Part In Ch'ships

Three local speed skaters, after weeks of strenuous training leave this morning for Saint John, N.B., where on Monday night they will take part in the Maritime Speed Skating Championships being held in the Garrison City. Two of the trio will be defending Maritime championships captured here last year and they are Mollie Hennigar, reigning Maritime senior queen of the blades, and Clair Archer, 12-year-old champion who this year will be in the 13-year-old class. Making up the small but capable trio is Bill Brehaut, a youngster who was a high point winner in the provincial meet here last year and who so far this season is showing great promise.

Participation of these Island skaters shows clearly just how much speed-skating is coming back into favor among Island boys and girls. Five years ago it was novelty to see a pair of "teasers" on the ice, but this is changed now and it has been due to the efforts of Charlie Archer, Manager of the Forum that the revival in this once popular sport is taking place. It was Mr. Archer who started staging provincial meets just five years ago and in the succeeding years this meet has grown to such an extent that in the past two years well over 2000 people have witnessed them. Last year when the Maritime and provincial meets were run off in a two day show the climax was reached with the above mentioned pair taking Maritime titles, which shows plainly just how much the skaters have improved and how much ability there is among the skaters.

The good Ontario pacer Sir Esme 2:04 1-4, has been sold by Dr. W. L. Meldrum to John Ridley of Detroit. Last season he won \$3,600 and was one of the top flight pacers in Canada.

The news that a syndicate of Truro horsemen headed by F. C. McCurdy, has purchased the pacer stallion Simcoe Harvester 2:04 1-2, will cause a mild sensation throughout the Maritimes. Simcoe Harvester has had a wonderful career since he started on the turf as a three-year-old four years ago. His four-year-old form he was recommended to the writer by a party in Ontario who saw him pace quarters in better than thirty seconds, and predicted that he would be a champion. He has been raced over the clay and over the ice and must be tough to stand the campaigning he has been given, but apparently he thrives on it, and races at good pace without losing speed or class.

In 1937 he started in 26 races and won 14 of them. He took the time of 2:04 1-2 over a mile track and 2:05 1-2 over a half-mile track. Last season—1938—he started in 18 races and won 12 of them. He is charged with winnings of a total of \$4,000 and is eligible to the 2:12 pace.

He is sired by Lee Harvester 2:15 1-2 the sensation of Ontario and because of his breeding many believe he has a chance to join the two-minute list. If the news proves true, and we presume it is, it will be a great thing for the Maritimes to have another high-class pacer brought here. He will in all probability be trained and driven by Johnny Conroy, who is at present located in Truro, and we think he is sure of being well trained and well driven.

His presence in Truro is probably in answer to the Cap-Baton boys who have brought down Rainey G. Henley 2:06, another half-mile ride-wheeler that can really race. Rumors are in the air of two more free-trainers being brought to St. John or Moncton. The outlook for racing in the Maritimes is certainly being improved by the influx of good race horses in the past few months. However, in Prince Edward Island there has not been very much done with the exception of the bringing in of Jane Asott 1:59 3-4, but it is

It was the highlight of another great program that saw Paul Williams take the Star Mfg. race for the senior boys while the West Kent hockey team after holding a lead for two periods against Summerside High School wilted slightly in the final frame to emerge from the contest with a 5-4 draw.

The sports were again successful from every standpoint and the large 22-point programme was run smoothly and efficiently without a hitch marrying the proceedings. Every race was hotly contested and the close finishes predominating and the relay race between Summerside and West Kent was a thriller all the way. West Kent took a slight lead for two periods against Summerside but the latter team overcame to gain a lead of about ten yards but the local school boys regained a 3-yard lead on the third leg that saw the West Kent anchor man hold to the finish line with a driving finish.
