In a short time he began to miss small articles of jewelry, and then his wines began to vanish. Mr. Vanderbilt watched at night when he was thought to be in bed. From a vantage point he saw a man take bundles from the house and hide them in the shrubbery. Having found out who the thief was, Mr. Vanderbilt permitted the man to remove anything that he coveted, merely watching to see that the thief did not take them beyond the hiding place in the shrubbery. When the man had gathered a load of plunder Mr. Vanderbilt took everything back to the house. Then he confronted the man and charged him with being a thief, recounting his acts in the minutest detail. The man was so overcome at the correctness of Mr. Vanderbilt's knowledge that he confessed and pleaded for mercy. HIS PROGRESS

BERLIN, Nov. 19—Hans Miller, a copying clerk in the law courts, with \$7.50 a week, has discovered a new high-road to fortune, his progress along which has, however, been suddenly stopped by the police. To moneyed acquaintances he told a tale of a friendly high official in the patent office through whose mediation he was able to do a profitable business in the exploitation of marketable inventions.

His stories were supported by plausible manners, remarkable readiness in lying, and a number of ingenious expedients. For instance he went to inform the wives of his intended victims that through some mysterious association of which he was a member, he was able to purchase provisions at specially advantageous rates. If they expressed a desire to share in these benefits, he would buy the goods asked for at current rates, pass them on to the delighted housewives at a fraction of the same, and for the time being defray the difference out of his own pocket. He was also profuse with opera and the theatre tickets, which he professed to obtain by virtue of his high connections, but which he really bought at the box-offices, like any ordinary mortal.

By such devices he won the confidence of small capitalists, and induced them to entrust him with money for his patent transactions. The first investments were always prepaid with handsome profits, which increased their avarice, their confidence in their speculations. This system of Muller's proved enormously remunerative, for his takings from it, so far as already discovered, amount to no less than \$100,000 in the course of a single year. When he was arrested he had \$25,000 on his person. A curious feature of the case is that while in the circle of his victims he was, under an assumed name, boasting of his important connections, and spending money right and left, he was at the same time living with his mother and sister, the careful and modest life of a copying clerk.

HERBERT CASE GOES BACK TO THE BEGINNING. MONTREAL, Nov. 18—As a result of the action of Eugene Herbert, in withdrawing from the famous Herbert-Cloutre marriage annulment case yesterday afternoon, the principal at stake in the litigation will not be decided upon by the civil tribunal, involving new developments are forthcoming within short delay.

Lack of funds to finance his side of the proceedings given by Herbert's Attorney as the reason which forced him to withdraw his opposition as they were, prior to the judgment, by which their marriage was declared null in the eyes of the civil law. Herbert announces the rights conferred upon him by that judgment, though seeking to maintain his right to take recourse, if at any future time he desires to do so.

It is likely that when the case comes up Monday, judgment will be rendered in default and the civil status of the marriage, contracted before Rev. Mr. Timmerlake re-established.

As a result in the eyes of the civil law the woman will be regarded as the legal wife of Mr. Herbert and the Catholic Church and of her co-religionists, she will be held as unmarried.

Death was undoubtedly due to heart failure, and the unfortunate man had evidently leaped against the fence for support, and in that position death came to him. He is survived by his wife, a small family and a number of brothers and one sister.

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SHOCKING STORY FROM WINNIPEG

WINNIPEG, Man., Nov. 18—Declaring that by threats of murdering her and driving her children into the streets to starve, she was forced into a life of revolting slavery in the Chinese section. Mrs. Kate Kalk, a slim and pretty white woman, told a ghastly story in the assizes court yesterday. Prince Cleveland, a burly colored barber, is accused of being the woman's driver, forcing her into slavery in the absence of her husband.

She made public a terrible story. Attired in a pale blue striped princess gown, evidently young, although her face was prematurely aged and wrinkled by her dreadful experience, she excited the sympathies of the crowded court-room.

"My husband had left the city to obtain work," she said, "and he rented two rooms from Cleveland. He paid for a month's rent in advance and left me some groceries and a little money. He had not been gone for a day, when Cleveland said that he would not have a woman around the house who would not make money for him.

"I swore that I would not, but when he threatened me, and said that he would also drive me into the streets, I did not know what to do. I knew no person and I was afraid. He said that if I squealed he would fill me. He then took me to a number of Chinese laundries and also had cards printed, which he widely distributed

among the Chinese."

The witness said he would never let her out of his sight, and kept her children locked in a cupboard when any Orientals visited the house. It was also alleged that he beat the little ones severely. She managed to elude the man and succeeded in making a complaint.

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SOCIALISTS MAKE APPEAL FOR AID. ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 18—Alleging that the enemies of organized labor had made Los Angeles, Cal., the battleground of a movement declar-

ed to be designed to crush and intimidate unionism, Socialist delegates today appealed to the convention to help them elect Job Herriman Mayor of the California City. The Socialists submitted resolutions touching on the matter, which were recently adopted by the executive committee of their party, at the suggestion of Congressman Victor L. Berger.

The resolutions sets forth the allegations against the so-called enemies of labor, and declares that a victory would materially help the case of the McNamara brothers. President Gompers assured the socialists that the organization would do all in its power to elect Herriman. The convention of the Federation was in session but a short time today, again adjourning early to permit the committees to work. It is understood that the resolutions committee has declined to report adversely on the motion requesting Gompers and other leaders to resign from the National Civic Federation, and the resolution proposing initiative in electing Federation officers.
